



Highway Dept. Gives Safe Driving Awards

The new Texas Highway Department Maintenance Building in Robert Lee received a sort of informal house-warming recently when District Engineer D. R. The men are all Coke Countians. Driver No Accident Awards are presented to those who operate State vehicles in the course of their duty, and represent the number of accident free years achieved. Those driving vehicles lighter than two ton trucks have only been eligible since a rule change in 1970.

A stringent set of rules established by the Highway Department Insurance Division governs the awards and extends even to accidents caused by poor loads and mechanical failures, which means the entire department must work as a

Looking forward to the new era of service in Coke County, Watson commented, "This is a new team, made up of proven men. The awards given total 42 years of accident free driving. With a beginning like this, we look forward to a great deal of accomplishment in Coke County."




