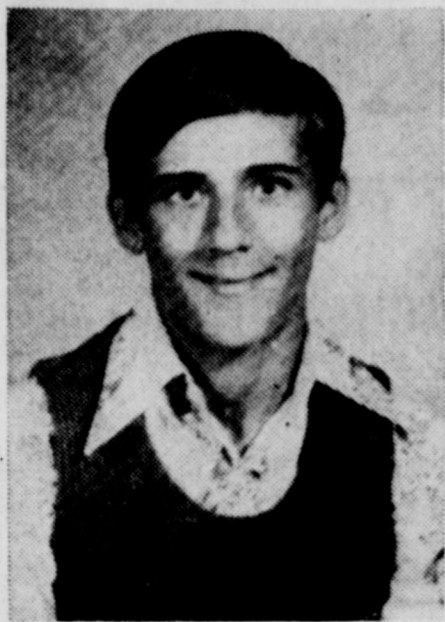

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BICENTENNIAL COMMISSION REPORT

(Progress Report of Robert Lee's Bicentennial Committee by Fern Havins, chairman of Horizons '76 Division.)

The purpose of Horizons '76 is to challenge every American acting individually or with others to undertake at least one principal project which manifests the pride, priorities, and the hopes of his community.

Every group, especially our youth and those young in spirit, is urged to pool resources and talents in a constructive effort to demonstrate concern for human welfare, happiness and freedom.

Projects begun under this division are permanent in nature. Some have been our city's policy in the past, and projects will continue to multiply as future generations follow today's examples into tomorrow's.

Projects planned and their chairmen are:

Bicentennial Business Beautification Campaign, W. T. Roach, chairman. Each owner of business or business property is urged to clean, paint, repair and beautify as he sees it, maintaining unity of color with neighbors as feasible; alley and other surrounding area maintained; weeds and trash disposal controlled; display of U. S. flags in uniform manner; for safety and appearance, repair broken, rough sidewalks; parking stripes on downtown streets. Eventually, planters and other beauty objects desired; cultivation of old trough at courthouse corner.

City Clean-up and Beautification Campaign, Sherman Williams, chairman. Rid vacant lots of brush and weeds, leaving trees where feasible; each citizen to clean and beautify his own property; encourage cultivation of blue bonnets, other wild and domesticated flowers in all residential areas and vacant lots; urge erection

of bird houses and humming bird feeders; planting of trees by homeowners, clubs, school groups, churches, etc.; involve all citizens in anti-litter campaign, including profitable disposal of recyclable materials, with W. T. Scott as chairman; rid town of condemned shacks; fill hazardous depressions reported to the City Hall such as wells, etc. Williams urges people to create ways to beautify and clean the entire city, and asks that everyone call him for suggestions.

Bicycle Trail, Gene Hinnard, is chairman. A trail to begin in Fern Havins Park; improvements of existing trails plus others.

Improvement of hospital and nursing home grounds, Victor Wojtek, chairman.

Hayrick Lodge Cemetery Association, Fern Havins, chairman. Assistance is needed to mark numerous Civil War Veterans' graves; citizens are urged to care for family lots; all may become paying members of Hayrick Lodge Cemetery Association. Dues and/or gifts to this and the Survey Committee are tax deductible.

Landscape ground of Coke County Recreation and Show Center. Robert Lee-Silver Lions Club is working with Coke County Commissioners Court.

Survey of street lighting to determine adequacy of city lights, especially considering danger areas related to vandalism and/or crime, Don Lloyd, chairman.

Voter Awareness Program, involving youth, clubs, etc., Mrs. O. B. Jacobs, chairman.

Improvement of Fern Havins Park, Robert Lee Park Board and Robert Lee-Silver Lions Club. Additional picnic facilities; overnight camping facilities; improve approach to river for fishing, especially for children; toilets; improved irrigation systems; landscaping, flower beds cared for by specified groups upon request or appointment; trees donated as memorials, etc.

Suggestions and volunteers to work are solicited by all Bicentennial committees.

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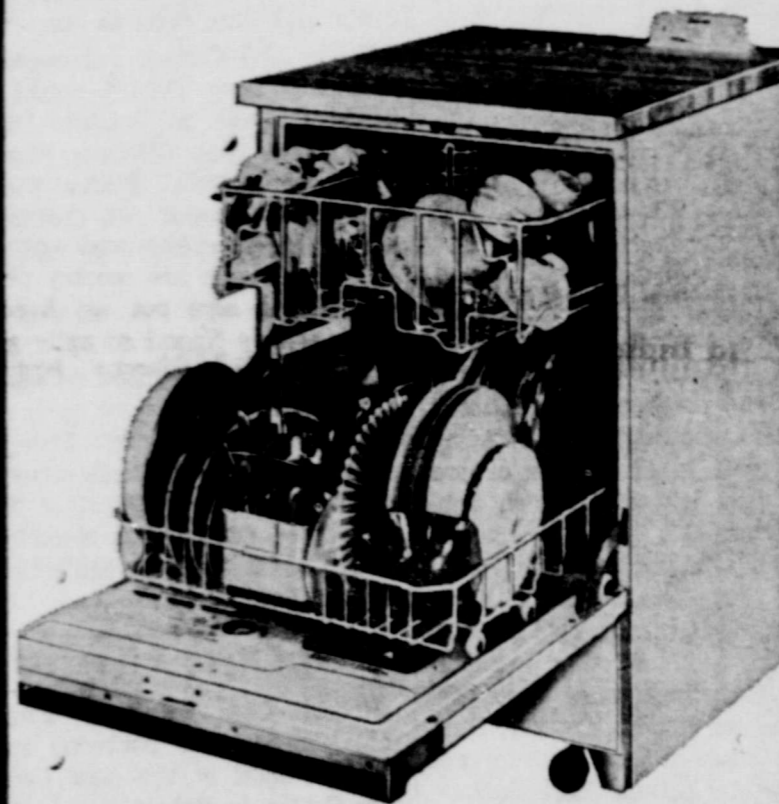

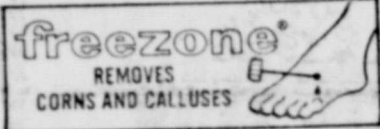

History and Operation of the Highway Dept.

In the 1890's there was legislation passed empowering counties and other political subdivisions to issue road bonds and levy taxes to finance road improvements. Many were hesitant to do so at first.

Between 1902 and 1917 several attempts to pass legislation creating a state organization for building roads failed. Finally on April 4, 1917, Gov. James E. Ferguson signed a bill creating this state agency. A tentative network of 8,865 miles of improved roadways was outlined. The first order of business in 1917 was to register the vehicles in Texas. By the end of the year they had registered 200,000 vehicles.

There has been a rapid growth since then. In 1970, Texas had a population of 11,197,000 with 6,693,000 vehicles being driven 68,031 million miles. Projecting to 1990, Texas will have a population of 14,314,000 registering 9,800,000 vehicles which will be driven 134,178 million miles.

Texans in 1923 saw their first gasoline tax of 1 cent per gallon with three-fourths going to build roads and one-fourth going to the available school fund. This ratio continues today. It was on Jan. 1, 1924 that the Highway Department began maintaining all of the highways.

From March 1927 to September 1928 the tax was raised to 3 cents per gallon, after which it was reduced to 2 cents per gallon. This was short lived, however, and in 1929 the registration fee was reduced but the gasoline tax was raised from 2 cents to 4 cents per gallon. It remained at this level until September 1955 when it was raised to the present 5 cents per gallon—the lowest of any state in the United States.

Until 1932 the counties built the roads with aid and assistance from the state, but mainly with the state paying part of the construction costs. In 1932, the legislature passed the State Assumption Highway Bond Law. One cent of the gasoline tax was earmarked for refunding county and road district bonded indebtedness. Financing the construction of highways became exclusively a state responsibility. It was the

county's responsibility to furnish 100 per cent of the right of way. To help relieve the counties and cities of some of the financial burden, in 1968, the state started sharing the ROW costs with the cities and counties on a 50-50 basis, except Farm to Market Roads which remains 100 per cent county responsibility.

Most projects are let to private contractors by sealed bids.

The Texas Highway Department has had a policy since 1930 to save as many of the trees on the ROW as possible. The department also has planted trees and flowers to enhance the beauty of the roads. Have you ever noticed that the department does not start mowing in early June like you do your lawn? Mowing is delayed to allow the native flowers and grasses to seed out before mowing in order that there will be seeds to bring forth vegetation again the next spring.

The first Farm to Market Road was built in 1936 "to get the farmer out of the mud." In order to insure that this program would continue to be expanded the Colson-Briscoe Act of 1949 provides that \$15 million annually from the general fund be used for the construction of FM highways. These are the only funds the Highway Department receives from the general fund. But the 5 cents per gallon gasoline tax, which was passed primarily for road building, contributes one-fourth of its revenues to the school fund. In 1974 this amounted to more than \$95.7 million.

At the present time, there are 71,655 miles of designated highways, of which some 40,847 miles are Farm to Market or Ranch to Market Roads. Highways, streets, roads and even alleys in Texas occupy only .29 of one per cent of the total land area.

RODENT CONTROL SPECIALIST TO SERVE COKE COUNTY

Coke County is one of 19 area counties selected to be serviced by an area Urban Rodent Control Specialist, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Texas A&M University co-operating.

Larry J. Killgo, a native of Snyder, will be stationed in the County Extension Office in Abilene. He has a B. S. degree in Wildlife Management from Texas Tech University.

As an Urban Rodent Control Specialist, Killgo will work to help persons in urban areas with rodent control problems. He will work with groups who wish to rid their areas of such pests as rats, mice, sparrows, starlings, skunks, armadillos and racoons.

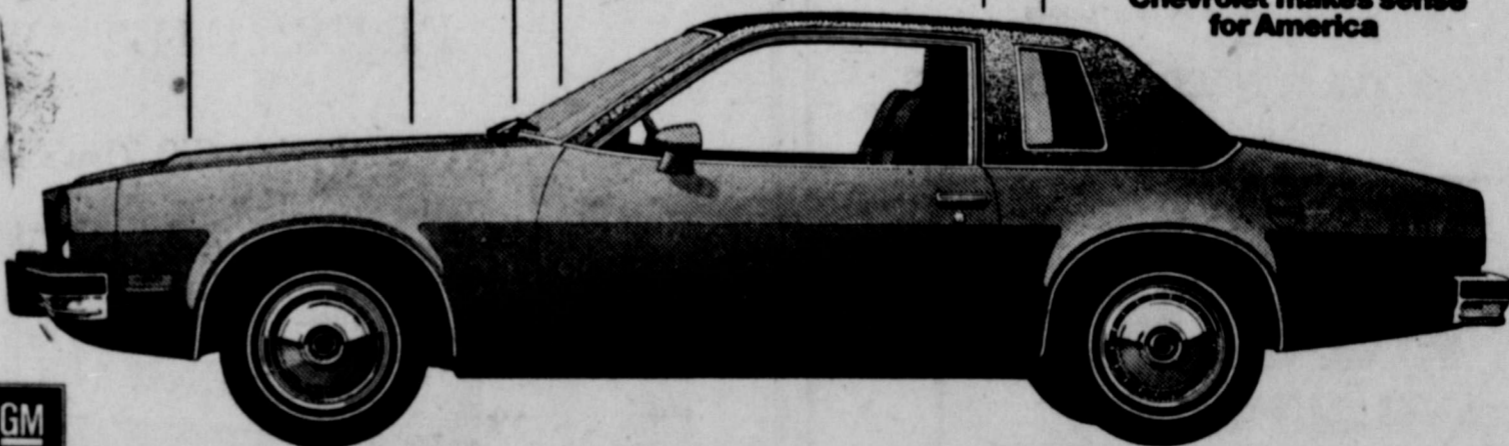
