Funeral services for Willie Isaac Tubb, 82, will be held at 10:30 a.m. Thursday (today) at the Robert Lee Baptist Church, with the Rev. Roy Epperson, pastor, officiating. Burial will be in the Sanco Cemetery under direction of Newby Funeral Home.

"Mr. Will," as he was called by many who knew him, died at 2:10 p.m. Tuesday, June 17, in West Coke County Nursing Home where he had been a resident since April 1971.

He was born June 28, 1892, in Coke County, in the Cedar Hill community, near Silver. He was the son of the late Rev. and Mrs. George W. (Sarah Tullis) Tubb. He grew up in the Silver community and lived there most of his life. He lived in San Angelo for several years but continued looking after his ranch at Silver until his health failed.

He was a World War I veteran, having served in the U. S. Infantry in France. He was a prominent rancher and was also a school teacher for several years, serving schools in Coke and Nolan counties.

Mr. Tubb is survived by several nieces and nephews.

Local club members are loud in their belief that everyone enjoyed the tournament and there will be no trouble in getting together the 64 teams needed for the 1976 tournament.

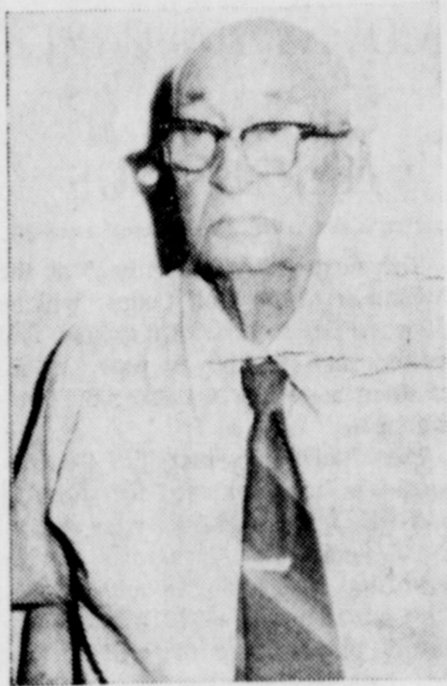
STEER BAND TO HAVE CAR WASH, BAKE SALE

Cleve Casey Among Honorees Over 90

Grover Cleveland "Cleve" Casey was born in Arkansas Nov. 3, 1884. His parents were Jesse James Morrow Casey and Elizabeth Irvin Casey. His father never used the full name "Morrow." He signed his name as J. J. Casey. Both the father and mother were born in Arkansas.

The Caseys left Arkansas when Cleve was two years old and came to a place 18 miles from Waco Tex., where Mr. Casey's brother, Marion Casey, lived.

They moved to a little place 15 miles west of Merkel in Taylor County. While there, Cleve and the other Casey children attended Butman School in District 28. His teacher was O. E. Templin. A prized possession of Cleve is a souvenir of the school (given to him by the teacher) which contains a picture of the teacher and a list of the students. There were 73 enrolled with 66 of those who had remained in school all year listed in the neat folder. Cleve says the average daily attendance was 63.

The Caseys moved to Coke County when Cleve was 13, arriving "the 19 or 20 of December—a few days before Christmas." Cleve attended the Valley View School, a one teacher school with a large number of students. His teachers at Valley included N. C. Brown, Miss Lou Wilkins and Henry T. Carter.

Cleve remembers that Henry Carter had the children practice writing for 30 minutes each morning, and Cleve won the award for making the most progress in penmanship. Carter had speaking every Friday afternoon and sometimes had students to diagram sentences on the blackboard during the speaking. Carter often had

Gas Officials Ask For Rate Increase

Robert Lee, June 12 — Lone Star Gas Company's local representative, H. K. Russ, today requested that Robert Lee city officials enact an ordinance increasing residential and commercial gas rates 10 cents per thousand cubic feet. The adjustment, he said, is requested to offset the increase in the city gate rate to 94.19 cents per thousand cubic feet which

was authorized by the Texas Railroad Commission on May 1. The increase in the city gate rate authorized by the Commission is consistent with the position taken by the cities in their testimony at the hearing in March.

The cities' presentation indicated that Lone Star needed an increase in this amount to provide a reasonable rate of return.

Mr. Russ explained the city gate rate applies to natural gas delivered by Lone Star's Transmission Division to its distribution division for sale to residential and commercial users.

Russ said the increase will raise the average residential gas bill in Robert Lee by about 8 per cent.

Lone Star officials noted that the latest figures available show that in February 1974, its average cost of gas was 36.68 cents per thousand cubic feet, and that it more than doubled to 72.29 cents by February 1975.

Farmers Asked to Return Forms

Letters appealing to 99 thousand Texas farmers to return completed report forms for the 1974 Census of Agriculture are being mailed by the Bureau of the Census. In January, 323 thousand forms were mailed to Texas farmers and residents associated with agriculture and so far, 69 per cent have been mailed back or otherwise accounted for.

Bureau officials say this is the last in the planned series of follow-up letters, as collection data is scheduled to be closed out June 30. In addition, telephone calls are being made to selected farmers who have not yet returned the forms in order to obtain information about their 1974 agricultural operations.

Everyone who received a form

should return it, even those not actively engaged in farming, such as landlords or those no longer farming. That information can be noted on the form which should be mailed back in the envelope provided.

Response to the census is mandatory by law. By the same law, all information about individual farms is confidential and can be used only for statistical purposes.

Farmers can refer to farm business records for many of the figures called for in the form. When records are not available, reasonable estimates are fully acceptable, Bureau officials said. Return of the completed forms is essential in order that published statistics on agriculture for each county and for

the state will be accurate.

Results of the census will affect farmers and ranchers in many ways. Major agricultural suppliers and marketing organizations base their decisions on census statistics. Thus, they can affect the availability of goods and services in many farming communities.

Any future allocation programs for such critical production inputs as fuel and fertilizer will bear a direct relationship to the crop acreages and animal units reported in the census.

Farmers and ranchers have filled out and returned the forms from a low 59 per cent in Louisiana to a high of 77 per cent in West Virginia.

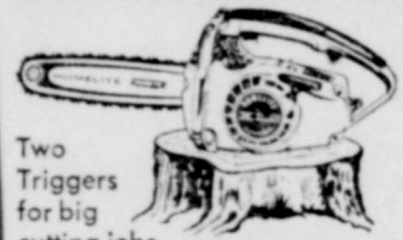

(Editor's note: This simplistic definition might give you some insight as to what you are, if you really want to know.)

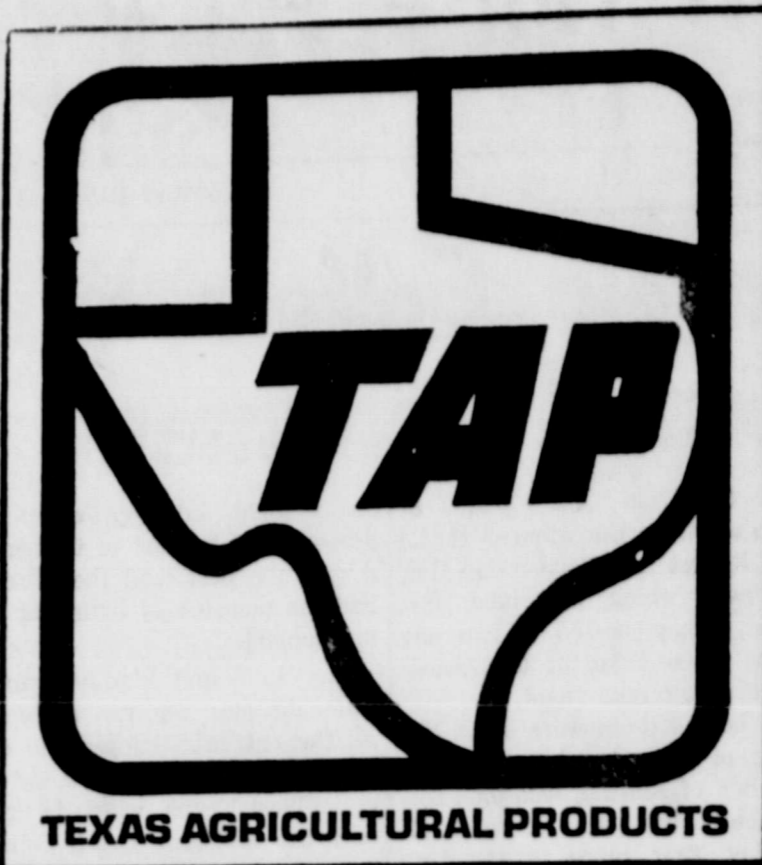
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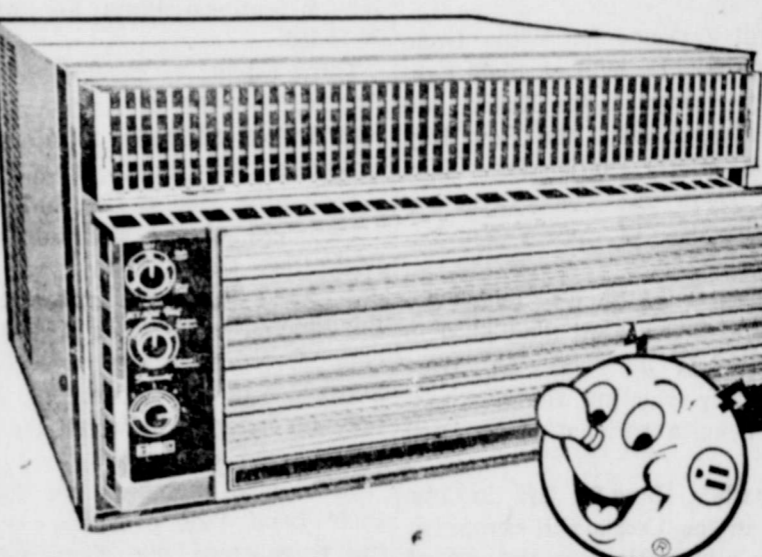
