

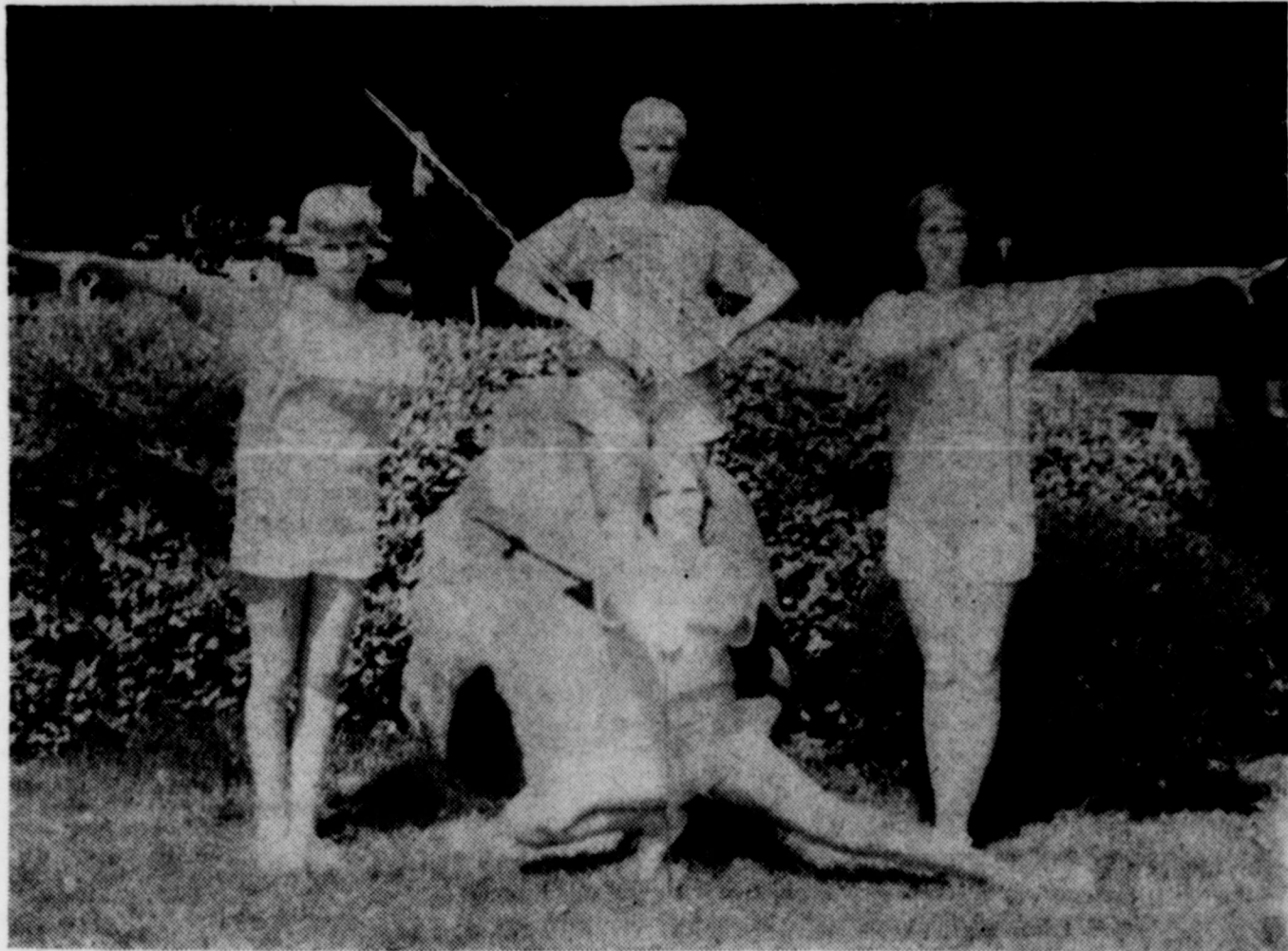

Recent good rains in the local area as well as in the vicinities of Colorado City and Snyder have pumped millions of gallons of water into Lake Spence.

## Flag Presentation Program To Be Held August 15

An American flag which has flown over the Capitol Building in Washington, D. C., and a Texas flag which has flown over the Capitol Building in Austin will be displayed Aug. 15 at 7 p.m. in Robert Lee.

The flags will be flown in conjunction with the certificate and flag presentation ceremony on the Coke

County Courthouse lawn.

This flag display is one of the projects of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in commemorating the 200th birthday of our nation.

Upon completion of displays at local activities in West Texas, all sets of the American and Texas flags used in the 12 Congressional districts of West Texas will be presented to each two senators and each of the 12 congressmen representing parts of West Texas. The flags will be presented in a specially constructed display case and carried by a delegation of West Texans to Washington, D. C., for presentation in the nation's capital.

Accompanying the flags will be commemorating material bound in a permanent diary for each flag set, thereby creating a unique segment of West Texas activities.

West Texans will be creating a personal Bicentennial memento for each of the West Texas Congressmen and Senators reflecting West Texans' pride in their nation, state and regional heritage.

special program to be held on the Courthouse lawn, Aug. 15 at 7 p.m.

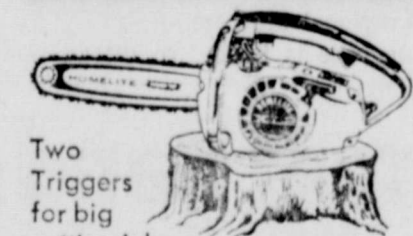

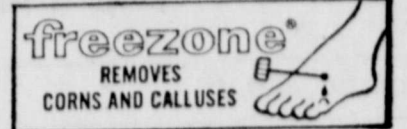


