PROGRAM SCHEDULED AUGUST 21 TO DISCUSS ARTHRITIS CONDITIONS

Dr. Wm. A. Riley, rheumatologist at Malone and Hogan Clinic of Big Spring, and Mrs. Savannah Belcher, a Bronte native and chapter representative of Odessa, will be on

the program when the West Texas Arthritis Foundation holds a Public Forum in the Robert Lee School auditorium Aug. 21 at 7:30 p.m.

Physical Therapist Kirby Horton, who is with the Dora Roberts Rehabilitation Center in Big Spring, will also be one of the speakers.

Sponsored by the Coke County Family Living Committee and HD Council, the program is under the direction of the West Texas Chapter of the Arthritis Foundation and literature and displays will be provided by the chapter.

The program is open to the public and all interested persons are urged to attend.

Tumlinson Funeral Funeral Rites Held

Funeral services for Melvin M. Tumlinson, 60, of Slaton, were held Aug. 1 at 2 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church at Slaton. The Rev. Merriell Abbott, pastor, officiated and burial was in Englewood Cemetery.

Tumlinson died at 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday at Central Plains General Hospital in Plainview as a result of injuries he received when a pickup he was driving was in collision with a car driven by Mrs. Don Bybee of Lockney. The wreck occurred in downtown Plainview shortly after noon Wednesday. Tumlinson, an engineer for Santa Fe Railway Company, was returning to the depot during the lunch hour.

He moved to Slaton in 1948 from San Angelo. He had served as a railroad engineer for Santa Fe since 1947.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, "Corky" of Brownwood and "Skip" of Slaton; three brothers, Wallace of Lubbock, Earl of Slaton and Wilmer of California; two sisters, Mrs. Perry (Laverne) Smith of Robert Lee and Mrs. Willie Marie Perrot of San Angelo; and six grandchildren.

Lynn Gulley Shows Cattle in Oklahoma

Screwworm Case Reported in Coke

Coke County had its first case of screwworms in 1975 one day last week. A sample submitted by James Counts from his ranch 14 miles southwest of Robert Lee was confirmed as being screwworms. Previously a case was found on the Mendenhall Ranch on the county line and west of Counts' place.

Statewide, following the recent weeks of abnormally wet summer weather, the numbers of cases is increasing. The program officials are very concerned and ask that ranch operators be on the alert for screwworms. The situation could become more serious before the year is out, they say.

In this area, several cases have already been reported from adjoining counties. Regular and close observation of all animals plus spraying with a systemic insecticide may help to avoid a screwworm seige.

MAN KILLED IN RIG ACCIDENT**

Funeral services for Marcos Mendez, 35, of Coahoma, were held Monday at 9:30 a.m. in St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Coahoma. Burial was in the Coahoma Cemetery.

Mendez, who was a nephew of Santos Tijerina of Robert Lee, was pronounced dead on arrival at Malone-Hogan Hospital in Big Spring Friday afternoon following an accident on a drilling rig about 12 miles south of Big Spring. He was taken to the hospital by members of the drilling crew.

He was born March 11, 1940, in Ozona and was an oil field worker.

He is survived by his wife, four sons, four daughters and his mother, all of Coahoma; four brothers and five sisters.
