## Annual Homecoming School Calendar Released Held for Edith People As 1975-76 Term Begins

Forty persons attended the 42nd annual Edith Homecoming Sunday. The gathering, which featured a basket lunch, was held in the old Green Mountain School House, now used as a community center, since the school was consolidated with Robert Lee several years ago. Most of the persons attending were oldtime residents of the

community and are descendants of the early settlers who came to the area in the 1880s.

First Edith Homecoming was held in 1933 at the old Edith Tabernacle, which was sold and razed several years ago.

The homecoming was skipped one year during World War II.

Dave King and Finis Harmon, both natives of Edith, have served as president and secretary-treasurer of the homecoming for several years.

During a brief business session, the association voted to hold the next meeting in the recreation and show center in Robert Lee. The decision was made reluctantly but was agreed upon because of the theft of air conditioners and cutlery during the past year.

Among those attending were persons from San Angelo, Big Lake, Sterling City, Lamesa, Abilene, Hamilton, Goldthwaite and Robert Lee.

The Rev. Charles Reuben Blake, 71 of Bronte died at 9:30 p.m. Friday at St. John's Hospital in San Angelo. Services were held at 3 p.m. Sunday in the First Baptist Church of Bronte.

Officiating were the Rev. Cecil Harper pastor, and the Rev. Harry Morris, former pastor. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Newby Funeral Home.

The Rev. Mr. Blake was born Aug. 10, 1904, in Gary. He served as pastor of the First Baptist Church in Bronte from 1944-1948, and had pastored the Tennyson Baptist Church for five years until his retirement this year.

He came to Coke County in 1944. He married Velma Lee Smith on Sept. 26, 1926, in Lubbock. He was a member of the Masonic Order, Post 962.

During his long career as a Baptist preacher he served churches in the following order: Petit, Cobelland, Tecula, Jacksonville, Rusk, Attoyac, Longview, Seal, Anton, Morton, Bronte, Sylvester, Woodrow, Wells, Welch, Pecos, Fort Davis, Miles and Tennyson.
