#### NOTICE AFFORDING OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC HEARING CORRIDOR AND DESIGN (COMBINED HEARING

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is planning the reconstruction of State Highway 208 from 5 miles north of the Coke/Tom Green County Line south to F. M. 2105 in Tom Green County.

The proposed reconstruction will include improvement of the horizontal and vertical alignments, 2-13 foot lanes with 9 foot paved shoulders.

The present 100 foot right of way will generally be increased to a width of 150 feet.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design environmental studies, and other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's Office, at 2802 Armstrong Street, San Angelo Texas.

Also, the drawings showing the proposed geometric design have been placed on file with Tom Green and Coke Counties.

There will be no relocation of dwellings or business establishments; however, information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services, as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right-of-way and construction can be obtained at the Resident Engineer's Office.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for this highway project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's Office on or before October 11, 1975.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.

Voting by the people in all elections must be by secret ballot, and the legislature shall provide by law for residence, registration, and absentee voting




