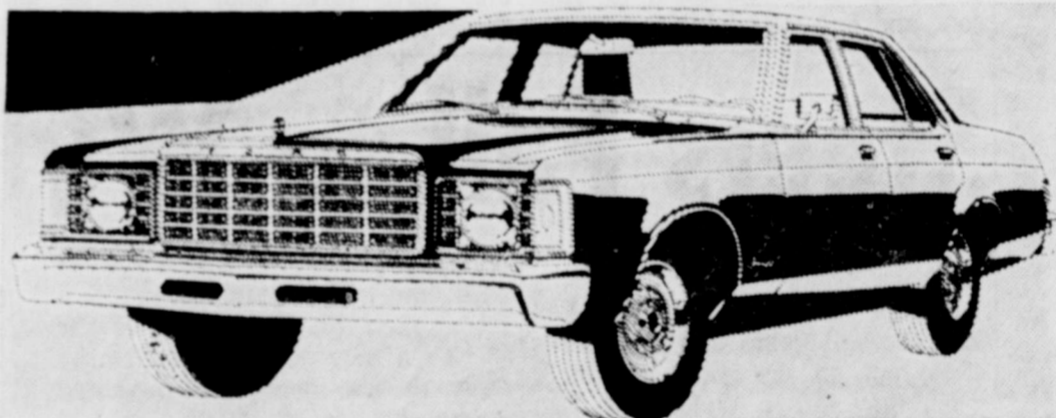

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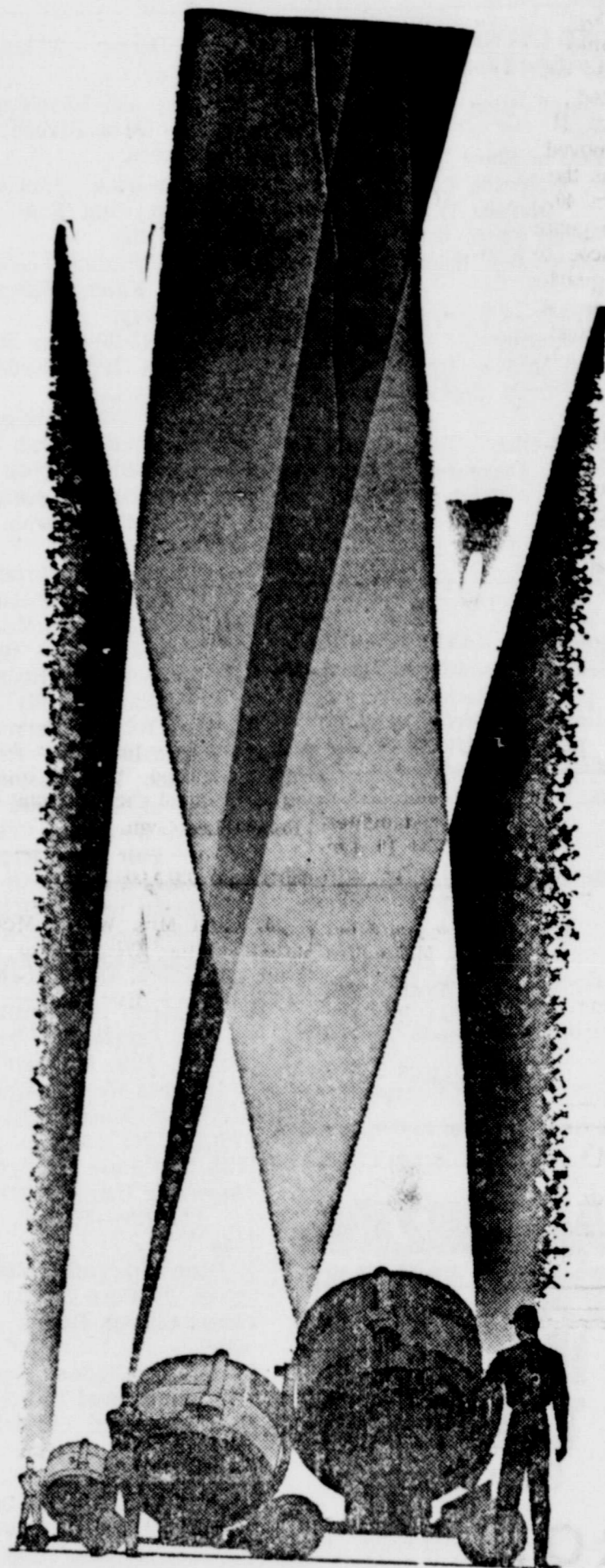

# Dogies Trample Clodhoppers 14-8

It took the Robert Lee Dogies awhile to get up steam in last Thursday evening's ball game with Roscoe's Jr. High Clodhoppers, but once they got going, they rolled on to a 14-8 victory and their fourth win without a loss this season.

The Dogies received the opening kick, made one 1st down and suffered numerous penalties before punting to the Roscoe 39. After drives which netted two 1st downs to the Dogie 42, the Clodhoppers were stymied by a determined Dogie defense and several penalties, and punted, with RL returning to their own 33. On this drive the Dogies moved well and after two 1st downs the Roscoe lads held on their own 40. Quarterback Kerry Gartman punted into the end zone and Roscoe took over on the 20.

First quarter ended with the Clodhoppers on their own 36.

The second quarter went much the same as both teams made good runs but lost as many yards because of penalties. Saul Saucedo intercepted a Roscoe pass at mid-field but the Dogies punted after failing for 1st down, to Roscoe 34. The Dogie defense held and Roscoe kicked to the Dogie 35. Brett Clark returned to Roscoe 35 but penalties pushed the Dogies back to the 50. Edwin Wilson made

good gains but penalties continued to take their toll. Then Gartman tossed a pass to Clark who carried for a TD only to have it called back on a clipping penalty. The Dogies had to punt and half-time came with no score.

Roscoe took the second half kick on their 30 and moved for a 1st on RL 49, but then were pushed back and punted to the Dogie 38. On first play Wilson ran to Roscoe's 24 and from there Clark went over to score. Wilson ran 2 extra points to set the score 8-0.

The Dogies executed an on-side kick and covered the ball on the Clodhopper 47. Wilson carried to 38 on two tries and Gartman drove to the 27. This time Wilson carried for the TD. EP try failed. Score: 14-0.

Clark's kick carried to the end zone and was placed on the 20. The Clodhoppers managed to move for three 1sts to Dogie 38 before giving up the ball. Again the Dogies, on good runs by Gartman, Wilson and Clark, pushed to Roscoe's goal line and had another TD nullified by penalty. The ball went over on downs and Roscoe's John Piper got away for a scoring run from his own 25, and carried for 2 extra, as the game ended with 14-8 on the scoreboard.

The Dogies will travel to Eden this afternoon (Thursday) where they will take on the Eden Bulldogs at 6 p.m. Everyone is invited to follow the Dogies to Eden and to attend the Jr. High pep rally at 10:30 this morning in the Robert Lee Gym.

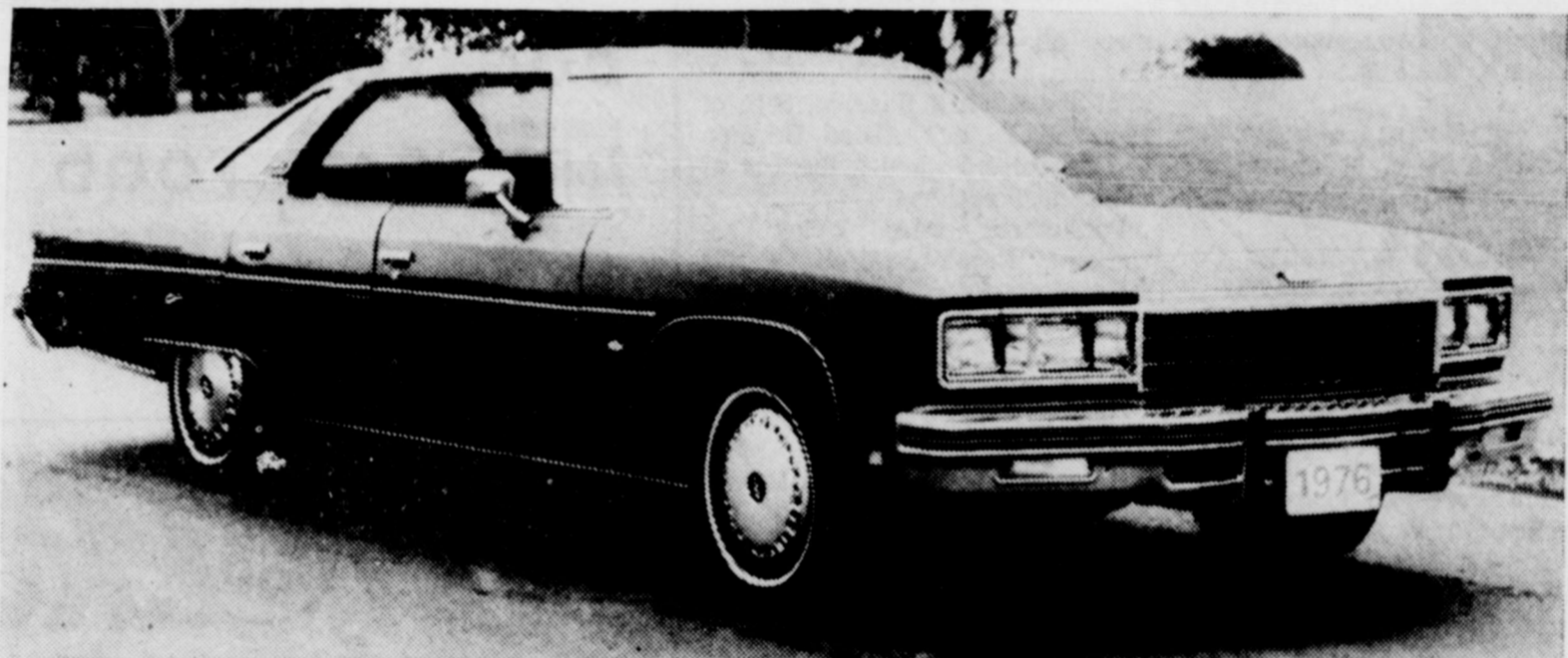

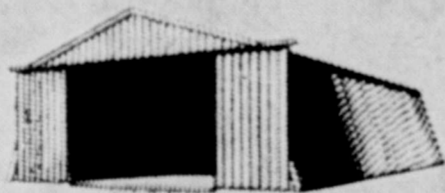

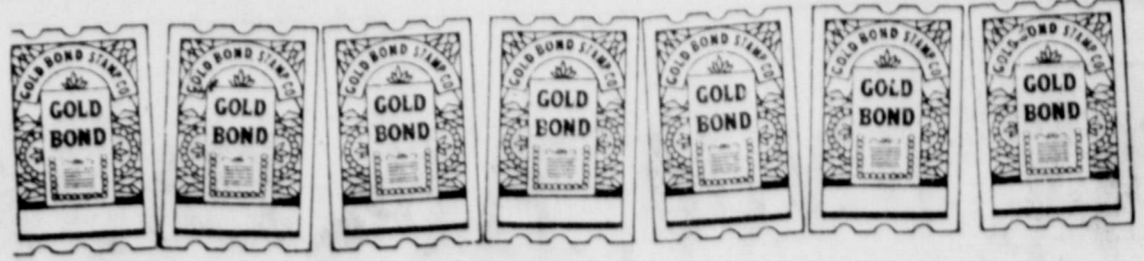
