Rural Water Needs Discussed at Meetings

Two meetings, Oct. 2 and 9, have been held for the purpose of discussing and initiating steps toward securing treated water for the rural areas of Coke County.

Attending the meetings were Don Fields, rancher of Robert Lee; Bobby Roberts, stockfarmer and gas plant operator of Robert Lee; Fred McCabe Jr., rancher and farmer, Divide Route, Robert Lee; Alton Pyburn, county supervisor, Farmers Home Administration,

Coke and Nolan counties, of Sweetwater; J. E. Quisenberry, county executive director, ASCS, Coke and Sterling counties; County Judge W. W. Thetford, Robert Lee; Sterling Lindsey county extension agent, of Robert Lee; Mayor R. T. Caperton of Bronte; Floyd Harmon, committeeman, Robert Lee; and William E. Fox, engineer, San Angelo. Following the second meeting, an application was made through Pyburn to FHA for a loan to finance the project.

The name of the organization formed is Coke County Water Supply Corporation. Fields was elected chairman and Lindsey was requested to serve as recording secretary.

Purpose of the organization is to supply good water to the rural areas of Coke County.

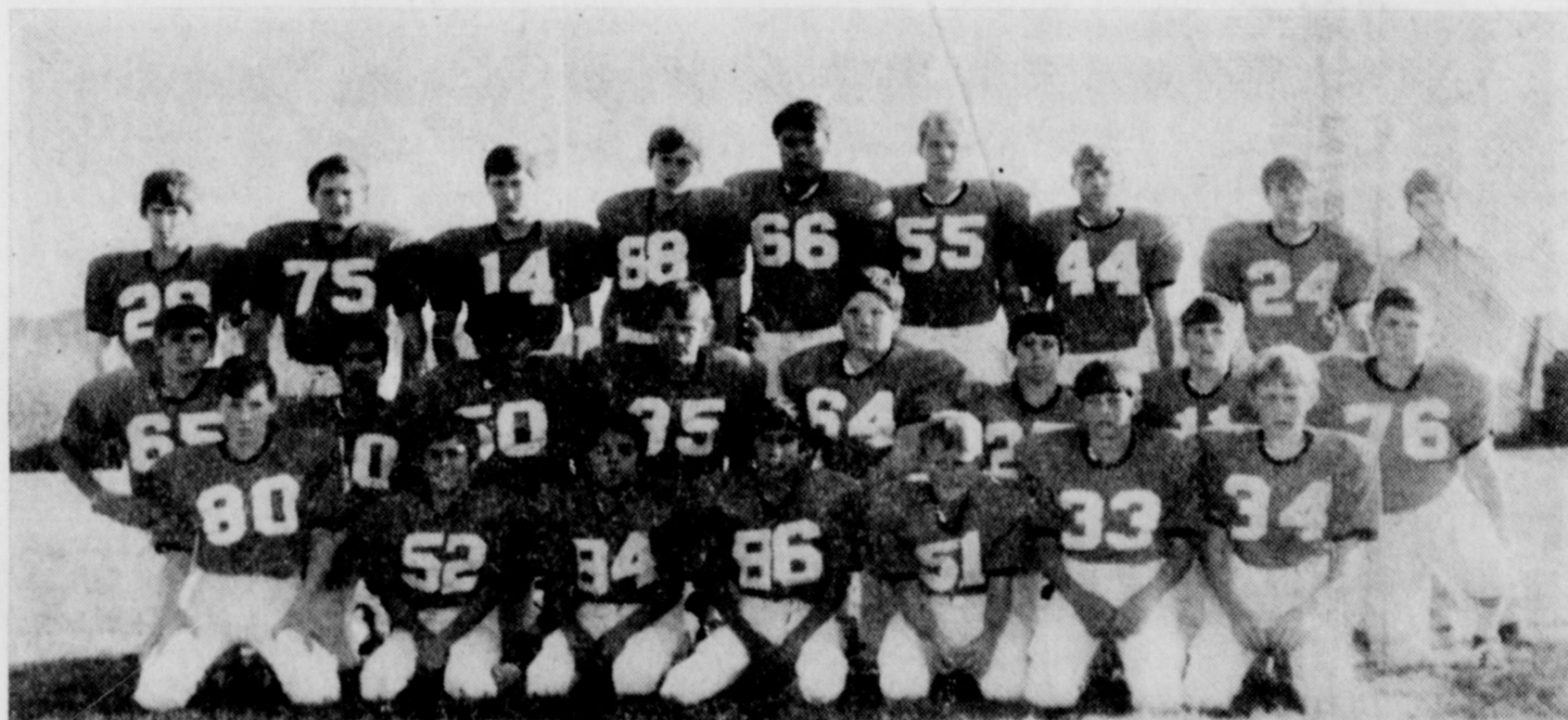

TEACHERS TO HAVE FALL CONVENTION IN BROWNWOOD

Teachers from Bronte, Robert Lee and Sterling City will be among the educators of this area who will attend the annual fall convention of District XV of the Texas State Teachers Association in Brownwood Oct. 26 and 27.

Bronte and Sterling City students will be dismissed Oct. 27 to allow faculty members to take advantage of the in-service training which will be provided at the meeting.

The district convention will include a general session for all educators in the 18 county district, section meetings for those in various subject matter areas and interests, and a meeting of the District XV House of Delegates. This district government is composed of elected representatives (one for each 25 members) from each local association in the district.

Elected delegates from the Coke-Sterling County Bi-County Unit will be Bobby Dodds, president, Sterling City; Martha Dodds, Sterling City; and Jerry Gibbs, Robert Lee.

ANTLERLESS DEER PERMITS AVAILABLE IN COKE IN NOV.

Parks and Wildlife Department zoologists have finished their deer census work and antlerless deer permits for the forthcoming season will be available to land owners in Coke County on Nov. 3 and 4 at the County Courthouse in Robert Lee.

Wildlife officials at the P&WD urge land owners to pick up their permits at the designated place and time since the officials will be on hand to answer questions they may have regarding the new permit system and issuance rate.

Permits this year are based on current deer censuses by designated compartments in the county. Maps outlining the compartments and rates of issuance will be available to the public at the county Courthouse prior to the issuance dates.

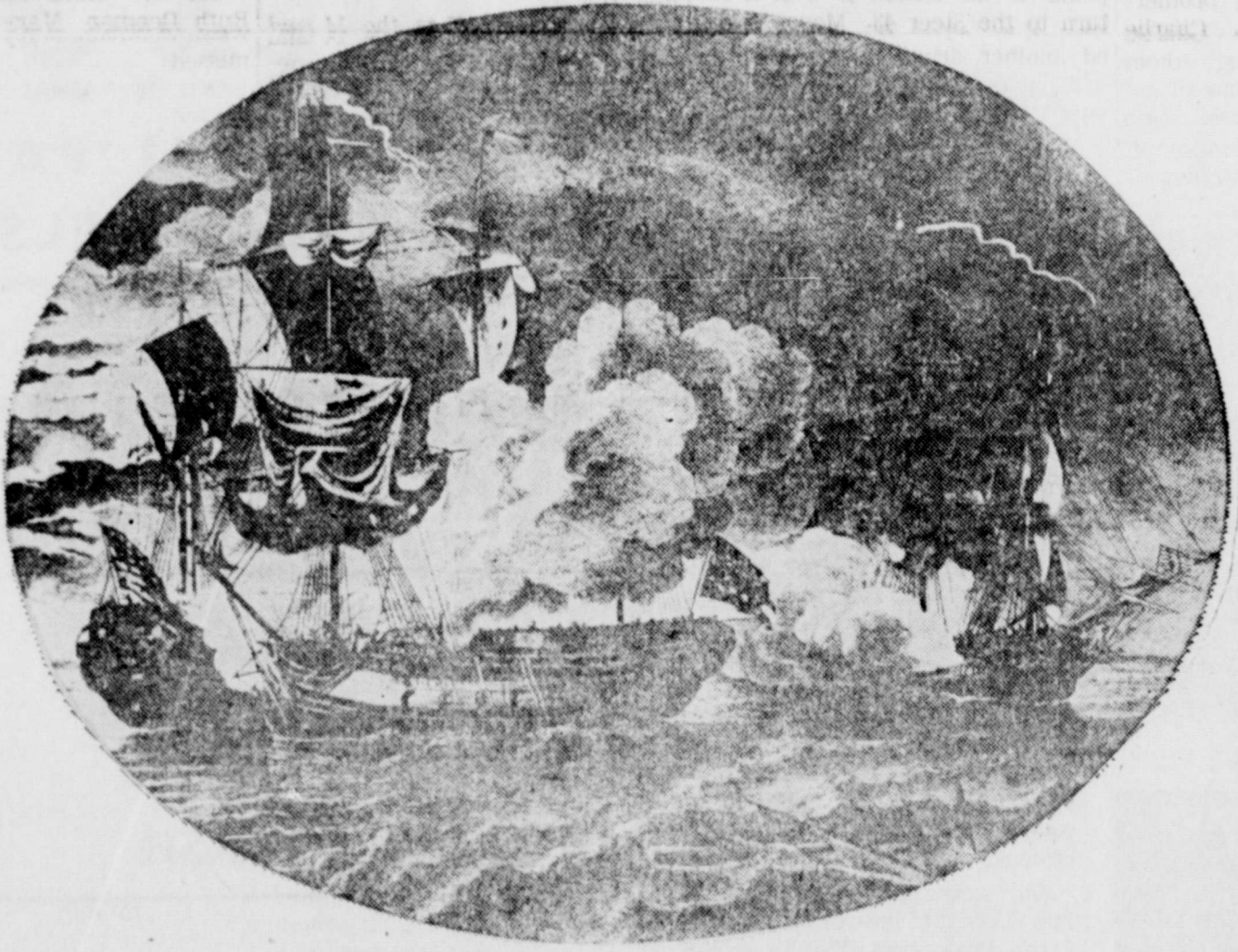

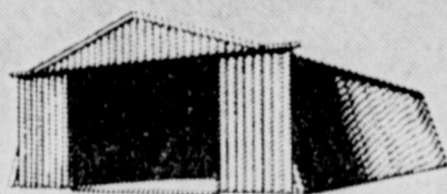

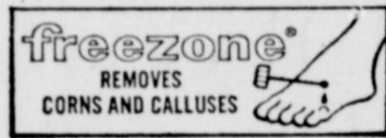
