Workers Burned In Oil Rig Fire

Robert Lee Volunteer Firemen were called to a rig fire at 3:45 p.m. Wednesday of last week on the J. D. Burk place west of Robert Lee. Pierce and Sibert of Midland are owners of the well and Jolly Well Service of Sweetwater had a workover unit at the site.

A hydro-testing firm, Buddy's Testers of Sweetwater, was running a test on the well when the fire broke out. It was reported to the Observer that sparks from tools against tongs was apparently the cause of the ignition of the natural gas flowing from the well.

W. H. Jones was operator of the unit and floor hands on duty were J. L. Toland, B. W. Evans and Ronnie Covington, all of Sweetwater. Ronald Dale Chance of Sweetwater was running the test.

Evans and Chance both received burns and were taken to West Coke County Hospital. Chance, who was reported to have third degree burns over most of his body, was taken to a Dallas hospital Wednesday night by Newby ambulance.

Fire Marshall Buz Sawyer told the Observer one fire truck was out for one hour and 800 gallons of water was used.

The Steers received at their 37 but they fumbled and Junction had the ball again. They tried a quick pass but Tim Rowoldt intercepted and returned it to the Steer 38. The Steers made a 1st at their 49. Junctions then held and Williams punted into the end zone and Junction got the ball at the 20.

An Eagle back broke for a 55 yard run to the Steer 25. They made one 1st down, then scored again. The kick was good and the score was 14 to 0.

The Steers received the kickoff at the 15 and returned to the 35. Junction then intercepted a pass and returned to the Steer 18. The Steers got it back as Jim Craig intercepted a pass at the 20. Then, quickly, Micky Baker connected on a 44 yard pass to Craig for a 1st at the Eagle 35. They made another 1st at the Junction 24 as the 1st Quarter ended.

Second Quarter

In two plays from the 18 yard line, Baker hit Craig again, this time in the end zone for a Steer TD. Craig kicked the EP and it was 14 to 7.

Junction received the kickoff on their 13 and returned to the 37. On the first play they broke through the middle and went for another touchdown. They kicked the PAT and the score was 21 to 7.

The Steers received at their 11 and returned to the 21. Junction held them and took over on downs at the Steer 30. Junction moved the ball for a 1st at the 3, then scored against from behind their big line. Extras failed and the score was 27 to 7.

The Steers received again and returned to their 30. Junction intercepted a pass at the 46, but they fumbled it back with Poly Abalos recovering at the Junction 46. The Eagles got the ball right back on another pass interception at the Steer 43. The Steers held and the Junction punter kicked to the Steer 32. The Eagles held the Steers for no gain and Williams punted to the Junction 30 with a return to the Steer 35. Junction drove for four 1st downs to the Steer 11, where they kicked a field goal to bring the score up to 30 to 7. The Steers received and returned to their 32. They moved to their 44 for a 1st down as the first half ended.

Third Quarter

The Steers received the second half kickoff with a return to their 48. They made two 1st downs to the Eagle 27. There a fumble turns the ball over to the Eagles and they carry for a 1st at their 40. From there they unleashed a long dash for a TD. The kick was good and it was 37 to 7.

The Steers received at the 20 and returned to their 36. Junction held and Williams punted to the Eagle 27, no return. The Steers held and Junction punted to the Robert Lee 27. The Steers made a 1st at the Junction 41 as the third quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

The Steers moved on for another 1st at the Junction 29. Then in a big play Baker connected on another scoring pass to Poly Abalos that covered 29 yards. The kick failed and the scoreboard read 37 to 13.

The Eagles took the kickoff at their 10 and returned it to the Steer 40, but a penalty put them back to the Eagle 16. Junction started another drive that carried to the Steer 21. Then they got a break on a debatable interference call which gave them a 1st at the Steer 2 yard line. They scored from there and kicked the extra point and the score was 44 to 13.

The Steers received the kickoff at their 19 and returned it to the 35. Then, with an exchange of penalties, Junction held and Williams punted a good one which George Abalos killed at the 1 foot line. The Steers held and on the punt attempt Randy Bessent crashed through and blocked the punt in the end zone. An Eagle fell on it and the Steers got a safety which made the score 44 to 15.

The Steers received the free kick at the 30 and returned it to the 50 as the game ended.

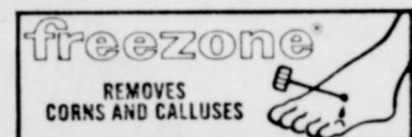
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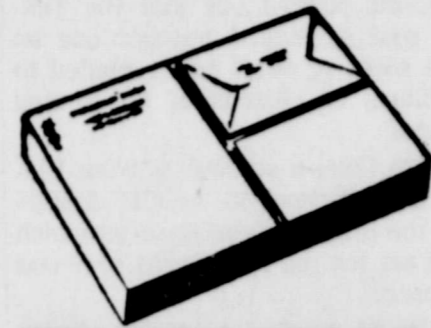

GRADE SCHOOLERS PAINT SCENES FOR CHRISTMAS SEALS

Christmas Seals—An annual tradition in America's fight against lung disease for almost seven decades—have a youthful "new look" this year. Mrs. Billy Joe Luckett, Lung Association board member, revealed to the newspapers of Coke County that for the first time, they've been designed by school children throughout the United States.

The board of the Big Country Lung Association of Texas got a preview of the 1975 seals at their area meeting in San Angelo. Mrs. Luckett pointed out that the Texas seal is located number one on the sheet of seals being mailed to millions of citizens of the United States.

Tim Cole, a student at Winn Elementary School in Austin, designed the original painting from which the art for the 1975 Texas seal was chosen.

The 54 original paintings chosen for the seals have become the property of the American Lung Association and will hang in a special exhibition in the National Collection of Fine Arts in Washington, D. C., from Nov. 14, 1975, through Jan. 4, 1976.

Mrs. Luckett said this week, "I was glad to see something like this children's art project done with the seals. We were the first voluntary health association in this country, and we've always been interested in healthy lungs for people, particularly children. We've always been involved in school health; this is the place to develop good health habits.

"Our main work is in education, educating the public and professionals. Since our goal is the control and prevention of lung disease, I think it is also important that we are involved in programs to get rid of the causes such as smoking and air pollution.

"Of the funds raised through the Christmas Seal campaign, 90 per cent remains in Texas. The other 10 per cent supports the national organization with a sizeable portion of that earmarked for medical research and training.

"No outside professional fund raisers are involved in the drive and all donations are tax exempt under IRS rulings."
