Last Rites Held For Mrs. Smith

Mrs. Hugh (Maude) Smith, 85, died at 2:10 a.m. Wednesday, Nov. 26, at Shannon Hospital in San Angelo where she had undergone emergency surgery Monday night.

Services were held Thursday at 3 p.m. at Robert Lee Baptist Church with the Rev. Roy Epperson, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Robert Lee Cemetery under direction of Newby Funeral Home. Minnie Maude Jones was born March 7, 1890, in Florence, Miss-daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Evans (Emma Virginia Blasingame) Jones. She came to Texas when a small child and was raised in Falls County, later moving to McCulloch County. She was married to Hugh Smith Oct. 14, 1908, at Milburn. They came by wagon to Coke County in December 1909, stopping for a short time before going on to Reeves County. They returned to Coke County the next year. They lived in Hominy, Okla., from 1918 until 1924 and again returned to Coke County, settling in the Wildcat Community eight miles southwest of Robert Lee where they made their home until 1959 when they retired and moved to Robert Lee.

Mr. Smith died March 2, 1975. Mrs. Smith had been a resident of West Coke County Nursing Home since Aug. 22, 1974. She was a member of the Baptist Church and a housewife.

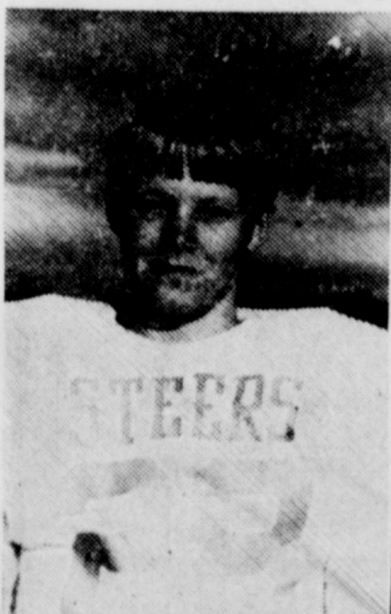
KONNY SERVICE IS LISTED IN WHO'S WHO

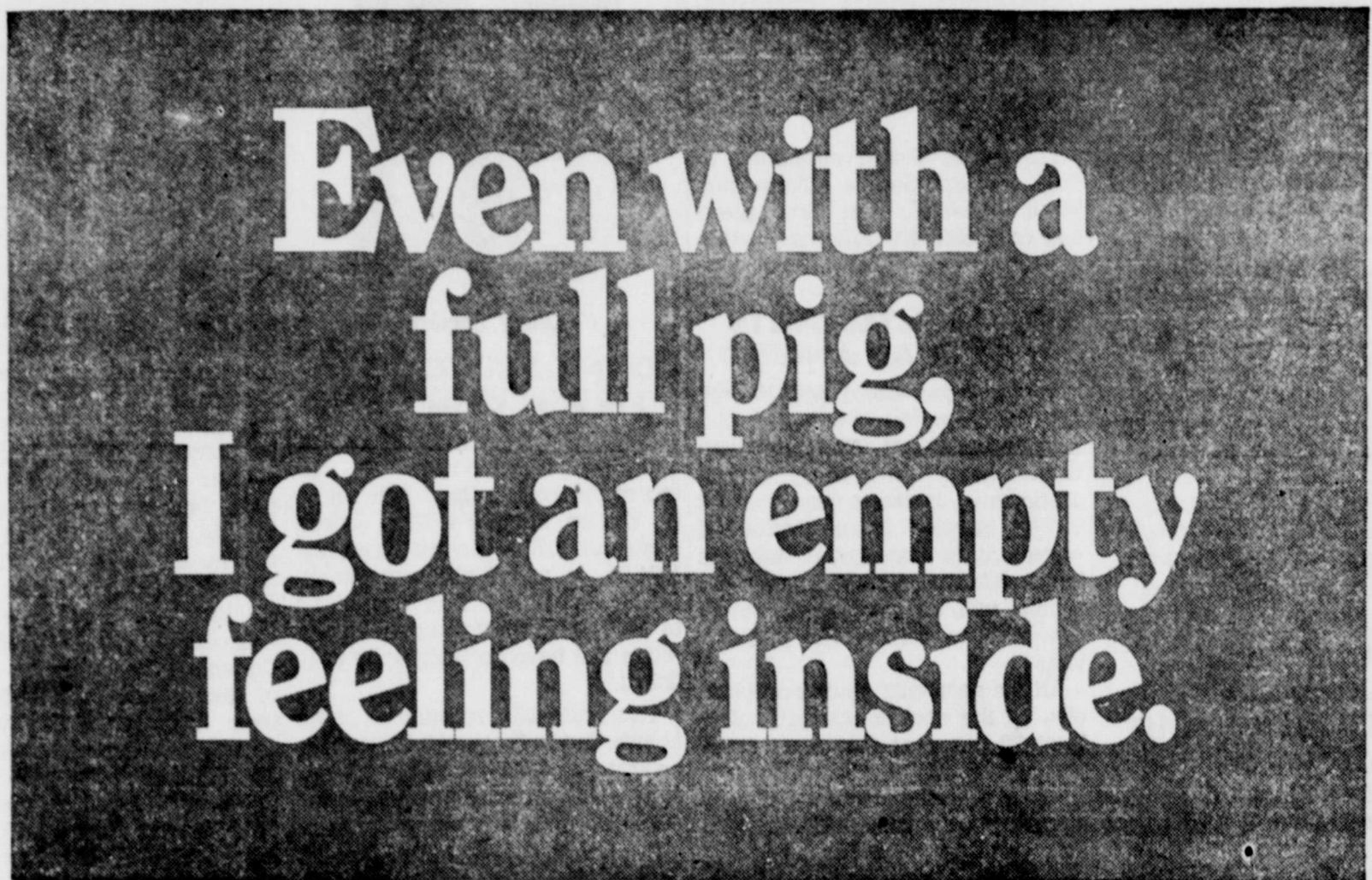

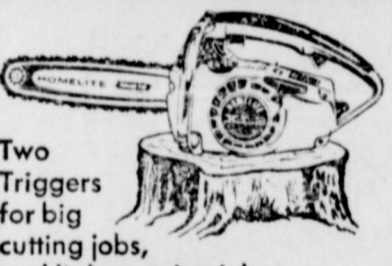

Americans have loved cranberries since the first Thanksgiving feast when Indians gave the bright red berries to the Pilgrims

Recipes for many cranberry desserts are available in the "Christmas Times at Home" bulletin, for 35c, from Fay C. Roe at the County Extension office. Order by mail or drop by the office in the Courthouse. The booklet has many luscious recipes other than the ones listed below:

Cranberry Salad

- 1 quart cranberries
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 Tbls. granulated gelatin
- 1 cup diced unpeeled apples
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1 cup finely chopped celery
- 1 cup nuts

Grind cranberries, using fine blade; add sugar, mix and let stand for at least one hour, stirring occasionally. Soften the gelatin in the orange juice for five minutes; then stir over hot water until dissolved. Mix gelatin with cranberries, celery, apples and nuts (Miniature marshmallows can be added.) Place ingredients in individual molds or flat dish which has been rinsed in cold water. Chill in refrigerator until set. Unmold (or in dish cut in squares) serve on crisp lettuce leaf, with mayonnaise (if desired).

Cranberry Quick Bread

- 2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 cup halves or coarsely chopped raw cranberries
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 3 tablespoons white vinegar plus water to make 3/4 cup
- 1 teaspoon grated orange rind
- 1/4 cup melted shortening
- 1 cup chopped nuts

Sift together flour, soda, salt and sugar into mixing bowl. Beat egg; add liquids orange rind and melted shortening. Add all at once to flour mixture; stir until flour is just dampened. Add cranberries and nuts; stir just enough to blend well. Turn into greased 8 3/4 inch by 4 1/2 inch loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 60 to 70 minutes. Remove from pan; cool several hours or overnight before slicing.

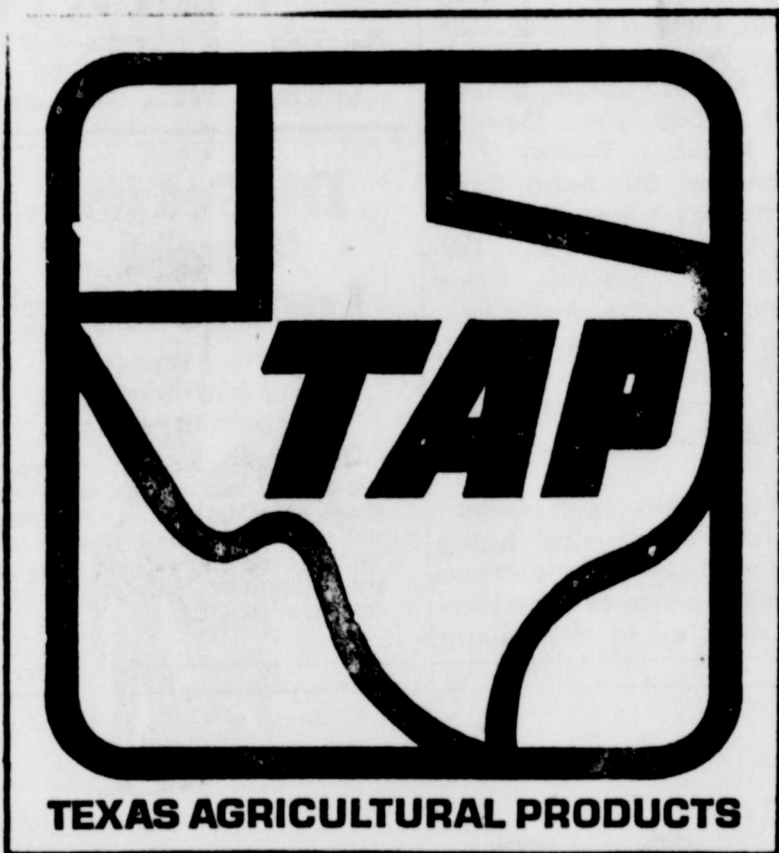

Notice is hereby given that the Colorado River Municipal Water District, 400 East 24th Street, Big Spring, Texas 79720, who holds License No. 76-5 of the State of Texas, issued December 18, 1974, and renewed September 1, 1975, intends to engage in an operation to change or attempt to change by artificial methods the natural development of atmospheric cloud forms for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P. O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79720, and will conduct the program of weather modification designed to increase precipitation by means of the aerial application of silver iodide or other artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The area over, or within which, equipment may be operated shall include the counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Dawson, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Martin, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan, Glasscock, Sterling and Coke.

2. The target area, within which the precipitation is intended to be enhanced, can be described as follows:

The boundary may be described by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa, thence north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County, thence east along the north border of Dawson, Borden and Scurry Counties to Highway 84; thence southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence south-southeast to Maryneal; thence southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence south-southwest to Highway 87 at at point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

3. The materials, equipment and methods to be used in conducting the operation within this area of approximately 3500 square miles include a 3 cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice, nuclei hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.

4. The person in charge of this program shall be Owen H. Ivie, Colorado River Municipal Water District, Big Spring, Texas.
