



H D Agent's News Dept.

Americans have loved cranberries since the first Thanksgiving feast when Indians gave the bright red berries to the Pilgrims

Recipes for many cranberry desserts are available in the "Christmas Times at Home" bulletin, for 35c, from Fay C. Roe at the County Extension office. Order by mail or drop by the office in the Courthouse. The booklet has many luscious recipes other than the ones listed below:

Cranberry Salad

1 quart cranberries

½ cup sugar

2 Tbls. granulated gelatin1 cup diced unpeeled apples

½ cup orange juice

1 cup finely chopped celery 1 cup nuts

Grind cranberries, using fine blade; add sugar, mix and let stand for at least one hour, stirring occasionally. Soften the gelatin in the orange juice for five minutes; then stir over hot water until dissolved. Mix gelatin with cranberries, celery, apples and nuts (Miniature marshmallows can be added.) Place ingredients in individual molds or flat dish which has been rinsed in cold water. Chill in refrigerator until set. Unmold (or in dish cut in squares) serve on crisp lettuce leaf, with

mayonnaise (if desired). Cranberry Quick Bread

2 cups flour

1 teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon salt 34 cup sugar

1 egg

1 cup halves or coarsely chopped raw cranberries

1/3 cup orange juice

3 tablespoons white vinegar plus water to make % cup

1 teaspoon grated orange rind

1/4 cup melted shortening

1 cup chopped nuts
Sift together flour, soda, salt and sugar into mixing bowl. Beat egg; add liquids orange rind and melted shortening. Add all at once to flour mixture; stir until flour is ljust dampened. Add cranberries andd nuts; stir just enough to blend well. Turn into greased 8¾ inch by 4½ inch loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 60 to 70 minutes. Remove from pan; cool several hours or overnight before slicing.







Notice is hereby given that the Colorado River Municipal Water District, 400 East 24th Street, Big Spring, Texas 79720, who holds License No. 76-5 of the State of Texas, issued December 18, 1974, and renewed September 1, 1975, intends to engage in an operation to change or attempt to change by artificial methods the natural development of atmospheric cloud forms for and on behalf or the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P. O. Box 869, Big Spring. Texas 79720, and will conduct the program of weather modification designed to increase precipitation by means of the aerial application of silver iodide or other artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The area over, or within which, equipment may be operated shall include the counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Dawson, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Martin, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan, Glasscock, Sterling and Coke.


