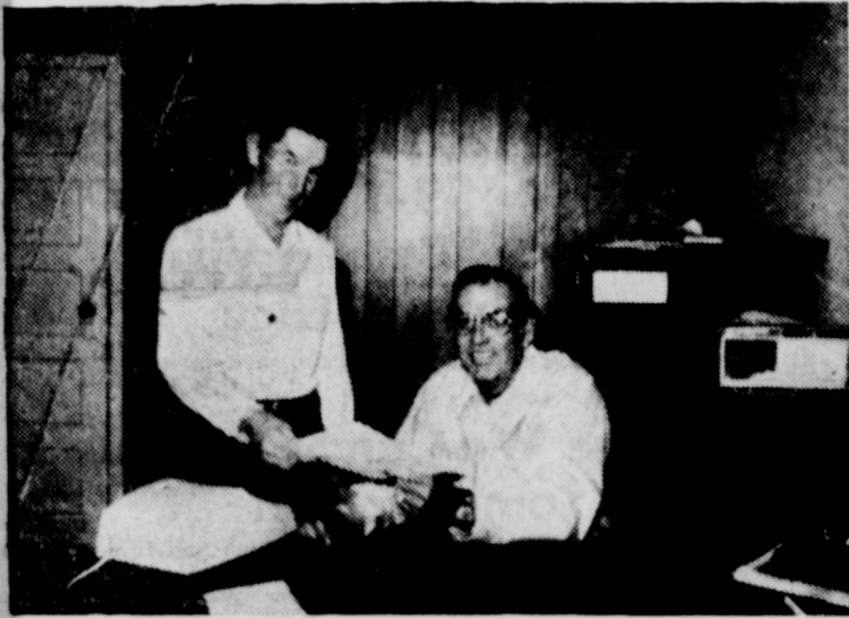

## Two Employees Killed In Silver Gas Plant Explosion

An explosion about 10:45 p.m. Sunday at the Union Texas Petroleum Plant near Silver took the lives of a Robert Lee and a Bronte man who were employees of the company. The plant, located at Silver, 19 miles north-west of Robert, processes natural gas from the Jameson Field as well as smaller fields in the area.

Killed in the blast were James Thomas Deen, 38, of Robert Lee, and Delbert Ray Coalson, 48, of Bronte. Deen had worked for the company for 19 years, while Coalson had been an employee for the past 20 years.

### Bronte Rites for Delbert Coalson

Funeral service for Delbert Ray Coalson, 48, were held Tuesday at 4 p.m. at the Bronte Church of Christ, with the minister, Bob Adams officiating. Burial was in Bronte's Fairview Cemetery, under direction of Newby Funeral Home.

Mr. Coalson was killed Sunday about 10:45 p.m. in an explosion at the Union Texas Petroleum Co. gas processing plant at Silver where he had been employed for the past 20 years.

Mr. Coalson was born July 25, 1927, in Coke County. He was the son of Ray Coalson of Bronte and the late Bernice Scott Coalson.

He was a process operator for Union Texas Petroleum. He was a member and deacon of the Bronte Church of Christ. He had been a member of the Bronte School's board of trustees for the past six years and was a member of the Selective Service Board for Coke County. He served in the military service, first in the Navy, and later served in the Army during the Korean Conflict. He was a member of the Lions Club.

Mr. Coalson was married to Charlotte Bussey Dec. 21, 1955, in Colorado City.

He had lived in Coke County all his life.

Survivors include his wife, Charlotte; two daughters, Sherrie and Beekie; one son, Wayne; his father, Ray Coalson of Bronte; and one brother, Cecil Coalson of Bronte.

Pallbearers were Raymond Bloodworth of Silver and Gerald Sandusky, Horace Taylor, Jack Geist, James Allen and Noah Pruitt Jr., all of Bronte.

Deen, compressor generator operator, had 19 years service with Union Texas Petroleum, having served one year at Gainesville before he began employment at Silver.

Survivors are: his wife, Joydell of Robert Lee; three daughters, Kathy, a junior in high school; La Johnna, a sophomore, and Vallery, a freshman; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas R. Deen of Gainesville.

### Notes From The Oil Field

Remuda Oil & Gas Co. of Midland will drill No. 2 Ellwood Estate in the Jameson Field of Coke County.

The planned 6,500 foot venture is located four miles northwest of Silver on a 640 acre lease.

It has been spotted 100 feet from the northwest and 1,320 feet from the southwest lines of Section 13, Block 15, SP Survey.

Sun Oil Co. completed No. 25-D Jameson Reef Unit as a Coke County producer four miles southwest of Silver.

Location is in the Jameson (Strawn) Field, spotting 2707 feet from the south and 1,299 feet from the east lines of W. L. Brown Survey 3, A-1003.

Daily potential was 586 barrels of 47 gravity oil, plus 508 barrels of water. Flow was through a 24-64 inch choke with packer set on casing and 440 pounds tubing pressures.

Production is from perforations at 6,151-73 feet, treated with 2,600 gallons of acid. Operator set the 7 inch casing on bottom at 6,400 feet.

**LEGAL NOTICE**

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Mohair Council of America, 516 Central National Bank Building, San Angelo, Texas 76901 proposes a referendum election on February 10, 1976, under provisions of Article 55C, Vernon's Civil Statutes on the proposition of whether or not mohair producers in the following counties shall assess themselves an amount not to exceed 2½ cents per pound on all mohair sold to be collected at the first point of sale, and to elect members for a 12-person commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for advertising, promotion, market and product development, education and research programs designed to encourage production, marketing and use of Texas mohair.

Counties included in the referendum are: District 1 - Terrell, Crockett, Pecos, Brewster, Presidio and Jeff Davis, District 2 - Val Verde, Kinney, District 3 - Edwards, District 4 - Bander, Real, Medina, Uvalde, District 5 - Mason, Llano, Gillespie, Kerr, Kentdall Comal, Blanco, District 6 - Schleicher, Menard, Sutton, Kimble, District 7 - Mills, Hamilton, San Saba, Coryell, Lampasas, Burnet, Hays, Travis, Williamson, Bell, Dis-

trict 8 - Irion, Sterling, Coke, Tom Green, Concho, McCulloch, Coleman, Runnels, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, District 9 - Brown, Eastland, Comanche, Erath, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Jack, Parker, Hood.

The referendum and election will be held by physical ballot with voting place to be at each county ASCS office in the referendum area or in the county courthouse in counties that do not have ASCS office facilities. Polls will be open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Producers who will be away from their particular voting box location on election day may obtain an absentee ballot from county agent office, wool and mohair warehouses or from the Mohair Council of America. Absentee ballots must be mailed in the self-addressed envelope to the central balloting place at P. O. Box 222, San Angelo, Texas 76901, before midnight three days prior to the election date.

Any person within this referendum area engaged in the business of producing or causing to be produced mohair for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of ranches and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

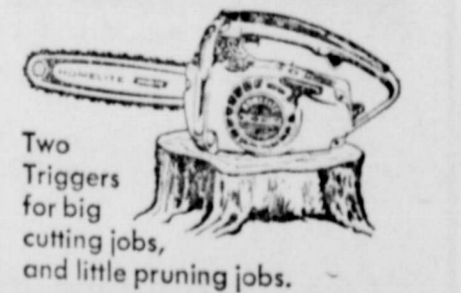
