R-Lee Girls Drop Playoff Game to Eldorado, 41-35

district play-off game was played at Big Lake last Friday night and Eldorado came out District 9-A winners by defeating the local girls 41-35. The two teams were tied for district after Eldorado's 55.54 win over Robert Lee in their second round of action. Robert Lee won over Eldorado 45-34 in the first half of the district play.

The clock ran two minutes, 25 seconds before scoring began Friday night and Eldorado, who had taken the ball on the tip-off, hit for 2 points. Robert Lee soon put 2 points on the scoreboard. Each team added 2 points more but then Eldorado went ahead and kept the lead to end the first quarter when the score was 9-6.

Second quarter play saw the score tied three times, 11-11, 12-12

and 14-14, but at halftime Eldorado downed a 22-14 lead, having made 9 of their second quarter points on free throws.

With almost half of the third quarter gone, Eldorado was 12

points in the lead, but at the end of the third quarter the RL girls had pulled up within 7 points of the Eaglettes. The score read 30-23.

The Eaglettes had the lead all through the fourth quarter. With 1:35 left in the game and again with 17 seconds left, RL came within 4 points of Eldorado but with 5 seconds left on the clock Eldorado scored their final basket and won 41-35.

Points by quarters were: RL, 6-8, 9-12 for 35; Eldorado, 9-13, 8-11 for 41.

Scoring for Robert Lee were Vickie Gartman for 19; Stella Bickley 10; Brenda Cooley 6. The guards, Cindy Ash, Carla Wojtek, Audrey Williams and Janice Bloodworth turned in a good defensive performance.

Robert Lee completed the season with a 21.9 record and a 9-2 district record. They are coached by Ronnie Ruff.

In commenting on his team's successful season, Coach Ruff said that the girls wish to express their appreciation to each of the fans who supported them throughout the season.

Ruff also stated that this is one of the youngest and most talented teams in the state and said, "we expect them to be stronger next year because they will all be back."

Fans who have watched the team perform will certainly attest to these sentiments, having seen them play repeatedly against teams consisting mostly of juniors and seniors and come away winners.

Eldorado met De Leon Tuesday night in Santa Anna for the bi-district game and won over the 10-A champions 43-36. The Eaglettes advance to the Region II-A tournament and will play their first regional game Friday afternoon.

One senior girl, Carolyn Collins, will enter the Project Show. She is in Creative Art and will be showing articles she has painted.

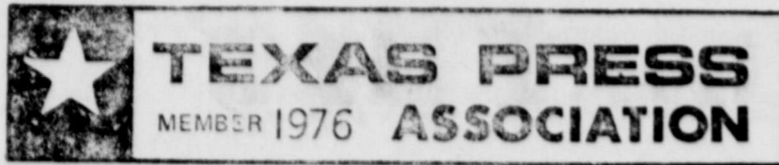
Other 4-Hers planning to attend the District Show are Martha Gonzales and Carol Cervenka. They will assist as needed during the

State Representative Mike Ezzell of Snyder has announced that he will be a candidate for re-election in the May 1 Democratic Primary.

Ezzell during the last session of the legislature served on the State Affairs and Health and Welfare Committees. During the interim he is serving as chairman of the Mental Health-Mental Retardation subcommittee, chairman of a special committee studying the feasibility of creating a Commission on the Status of Women, member of Welfare sub-committee, and member of Appropriative matters sub-committee of Health and Welfare.

In announcing his candidacy Ezzell stated, "I appreciate the opportunity of serving the people of Coke County in the Legislature and look forward to continuing to provide effective representation for the citizens, if elected May 1. I would appreciate your suggestions on how I could more effectively serve and would appreciate your vote and support on May 1."

Representative Ezzell is completing his first term as Representative of the 63rd District which is composed of Borden, Coke, Dawson, Howard, Scurry and Sterling Counties.

"Term" is defined as a limited period of time. Term insurance is protection for a certain (limited) period of time which usually may be renewed for another period of time or converted to permanent insurance . . . provided you and your agent arranged for this privilege when you bought the policy. Permanent insurance will last as long as you want it and will accumulate cash value and paid-up values . . . which may later be used as cash or collateral. Term insurance costs less in premium but the policy will expire after its term . . . unless renewed. Since term insurance does not accumulate cash value or paid-up values, many feel, while cheaper in the short run, it is more expensive in the long run and when possible provisions should be made to convert it to permanent insurance.
