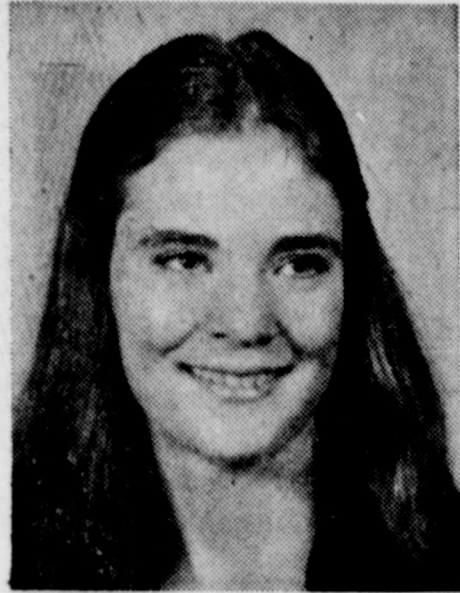

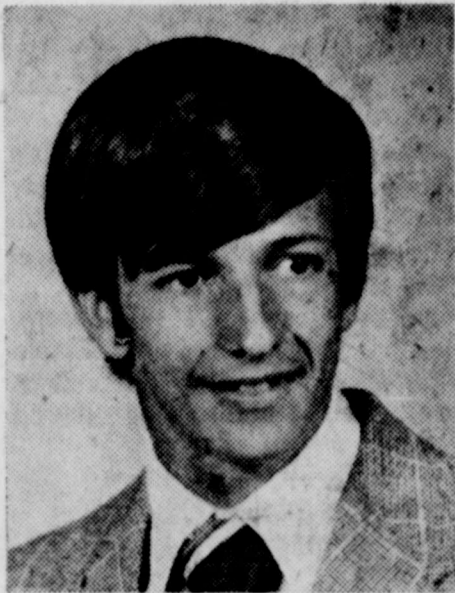

Honor Students Named

BOONE NEW LOCAL MANAGER FOR WTU

Bob Boone was named manager of the West Texas Co. local office at Robert Lee. The announcement was made by George Field, manager of the WTU Ballinger District. Boone has served as manager at Jayton since 1974.

He will replace W. D. (Dub) McAdams, who is retiring from the company after more than 30 years of service, 28 years of which were as Robert Lee local manager.

Boone's service with the company began in 1966 as a lineman at Stamford. He formerly worked for the L&F Construction Co. in Stamford. In 1971 he was made lineman-serviceman in Aspermont, and in 1974 was promoted to local manager in Jayton.

Boone was born in Stamford and attended public schools there, graduating in 1963.

He married the former Linda Lindsey of Stamford in 1965, and they are the parents of two children, Bobby, 9, and Cody, 4. They are members of the First Baptist Church, and he has served as vice president of the Jayton Lions Club.

McAdams began his employment in Winters in 1945 as a lineman and serviceman. In 1948 he was transferred to Robert Lee and made manager-serviceman, and in 1954 was named local manager.

Born in Stephenville in 1914, he spent his early life in Winters and in 1932 was a graduate of Winters High School. He was employed by Kimble Milling Co. before joining WTU.

Mrs. McAdams is the former Lela Ray Eoff. They were married in 1933 in Winters, and have one son, William, and two grandchildren. They are members of the Baptist Church where he serves as a deacon.

Since moving to Robert Lee in 1948 McAdams has been a leading civic worker. He served as a city councilman for two years and as mayor for four years. He has served as a member of the Coke County School Board for 14 years, and over 21 years as a member of the Robert Lee BCD. He is also a member of the Masonic Lodge.

Soil Stewardship Week May 23-May 30, 1976

SOIL STEWARDSHIP WEEK OBSERVANCE SET FOR MAY 23-30

Soil Stewardship Week will be observed this year from May 23 to 30. Conservationists all over the nation will be observing progress in the conservation effort.

This country is blessed with vast supplies of land and water. Nowhere else on earth is there such an extent of productive soil with a temperate climate accompanied generally with bountiful rains and snow.

Along with clean air and sunshine, they are the requisites of life and need to be safeguarded carefully as the treasures they are. We need their produce here, as do many other countries throughout the world.

Once we had more than we do now. But during our early years and up to the beginnings of the nation wide soil conservation program in the 30's, we lost millions of tons of irreplaceable topsoil from millions of acres. Many of the land users plowed badly, used the land too intensively, and stripped grass and trees from land wholly unsuited for cultivation. The results were widespread sheet erosion, destructive gullying, and dust storms with every year of drought.

During the past 40 years, through the efforts of many conservation programs, our record has improved sharply. On the basis of present land use and treatment, about 40 per cent of our productive land is protected against waste and damage. This means approximately 60 per cent is in need of conserva-

tion treatment, which may include conversion from cultivation to less intensive uses.

The erosion problem on our cropland has been aggravated in recent years by the large demands for agricultural production for both domestic and export markets. Larger farms with larger machinery are being farmed more intensively and often with less regard for the safety of the land itself. A substantial acreage not suitable for cultivation is being put to the plow.

So far, soil conservation throughout most of the United States has been based on the voluntary participation of landowners in the work of Soil Stewardship.
