FRANK HEARN DIES IN ANGELO HOSPITAL

Frank Robert Hearn, 61, died at 11:08 a.m. Wednesday, Sept. 9, in the Clinic Hospital in San Angelo. He was taken to San Angelo about midnight Tuesday by Newby ambulance. He suffered a cerebral hemorrhage.

Services are pending. Born Sept. 6, 1915, in Potter County, he came to Coke County in 1926. He married Ruby Eubanks July 15, 1942, in Bronte. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and Baptist Church, and was a World War II veteran. He had been employed by Union Texas Petroleum for 21 years.

Survivors include his wife, Ruby; one daughter, Mrs. Larry (Patty) Hardin of Odessa; one brother, James Hearn of Odessa; and one granddaughter.

Raymond Bloodworth of Silver was seriously injured last Friday evening when the horse he was riding fell with him.

Latest reports are that his condition is much improved and he was removed Tuesday afternoon from the Intensive Care Unit to a private room in Shannon Hospital in San Angelo where he was taken after the accident.

Full extent of his injuries were still not known Tuesday but relatives stated he sustained a broken collar bone, several broken ribs and possible lung injuries caused by the horse's shoulder as it pinned him to the ground in the fall.

The accident occurred as Bloodworth was attempting to pen another horse on the Willie I. Tubb place near Silver. A brother, Clayton Bloodworth, had gone with him to get the horse but was some distance away and did not see the fall. Raymond was able to walk to his pickup and after driving to where Clayton waited, was rushed to the San Angelo hospital.

Steers Clip Sterling City, 14-0

The score was 14 to 0 but jokingly you could say, officials 340, Steers 14, Sterling 0.

The Steers received the majority of these penalties so that was no excuse for the win. The Steers would have 1st down and 30 yards to go. To make it plain, these penalties were due to many rule changes that took effect this year, but some of them were not. Oh well, we won, so take that, Roy Ivey and crew.

Shell Williams had a pretty good night with 200 yards rushing, with two runs for 81 and 40. But the thing that I like is the defense and if I don't say it they continue and continue to get smarter, it's going to be a different story this year. Continued—I like it.

First Quarter

The Sterling City Eagles received the opening kickoff at their 5 yard line with a return to their 27. First play started it all with a penalty and the Eagles were in the hole. Williams intercepted a pass at the Eagle 37 and on the play was penalized back to the Steer 47. The Steers made a quick 1st at the Eagle 42, but they fumbled and the Eagles recovered. The Eagles made two 1st downs in a row to the Steer 33, but the Steers held and the Eagles punted short to the Steer 22. Another penalty for the Steers and they were forced to punt with Williams deep and

they returned to their 44.

The Steers held again and the Eagles punted to the Steer 10. The Steers fumbled again at the 25 after the gain, but the Eagles fumbled it right back at the 19 with Jimmy Munoz recovering. On the first play Williams broke the right side with a big hole there and he hot footed it 81 yards for the first TD of the season. Williams kicked the extra point and it was 7-0.

Williams kicked off to the Eagle 10 with the Sterling outfit nearly breaking one as the return was all the way to the Steer 18, as the first quarter ended.

Second Quarter

The Eagles moved the ball to the Steer 5 yard line, but the Steers then got tough and held the Eagles for no more gain. The Steers took over on downs but the penalties killed them again and they had to punt as Williams boomed one 60 yards to the 30 yard line.

The Steers got the ball back on a pass (interception by David Lackey with a return to the Eagle 24. The Steers made a 1st at the 9, but were penalized back to the 24. The Eagles held at the 20 and made a 1st at their 36. The Steers got tough and caused losses back to the Eagle 24. The Eagles punted to the Steer 40 with no return. They made a 1st at the Eagle 45 as the first half ended.

Third Quarter

The Steers received the second half kickoff at the 5 with Clay Al-

len returning it to the Steer 31. Quickly QB Mickey Baker bombed one to Allen that went all the way to the 10 yard line. But guess what, it was called back for no gain and the Steers were penalized to their 19. Then in between making two 1st down and four penalties, the third quarter was used up by the Steers who controlled the ball nearly the whole time, but to no avail.

Fourth Quarter

The Eagles had the ball as the fourth quarter began and they were forced to punt with the Steers getting the ball at their 20 and Williams returning it 40 yards to the Eagle 40 yard line. The Steers made a 1st at the Eagle 25, then penalties started again and before you knew it the Steers were at the Eagle 49, 2nd down and 36 to go. The Steers couldn't make and Williams punted to the Eagle 25 with no return.

Terry Ross intercepted a pass at the Eagle 35 and the Steers drive for two 1st downs, no penalties, to the 3 yard line. From there Micky Baker plowed through for the TD. Williams kicked the extra points and it's 14-0.

Williams kicked off to the Eagle 20 with a return to the Steer 49. Tim Rowaldt intercepted a pass and returned it to the Eagle 46. The Steers were penalized two times and were back to their own 33 as the game ended. Thank good—the game ended.

The workshop ran from 5 p.m. registration until adjournment at 8:15 p.m. and included a dinner meeting.



We all enjoyed the ride on the chartered train from Switzerland to Munich, Germany. We were assigned to compartments, six to a compartment. The countryside was truly a delight with the colorful, clean, storybook houses and well cared for cattle and farms. Parts of all the three countries we visited are experiencing a drought and don't expect to have a good harvest this year. I hope our West Texas presence didn't bring this on.

We arrive at our Hotel Vier Jahreszeiten on schedule. After some patient coaching on the part of the hospitality desk, we learned to pronounce the name of our hotel.

We passed on the City Tour of Munich that afternoon and decided to explore on our own. You can see we are getting very brave and by now adventuresome.

We got a city map from the hospitality desk and started out. We did some shopping which we hadn't any time for before, and also enjoyed having time to talk and visit with the people in the shops. It wasn't long before age and the fast pace of the last few days caught up with us and we had to rest and wash.

The next morning we were

bright eyed and ready for the Bavarian Castle excursion. We saw the wonderful sight of the Ammersee Valley and stopped at the Church of the Wies. This is a masterpiece of Bavarian Rococo art. I went into a nearby grocery store here. This always makes me feel like I'm seeing local color and besides I got some delicious wafers there.

If anyone had told me that I could climb a mountain even one-third of the way, I'd have said "No Way!" but I did in order to see the Castle of Neuschwanstein. It was built by the dream King Ludwig II. It is said that it is the castle that Walt Disney fashioned his Disney World Castle from. It is unbelievably beautiful. The view from up there is worth every foot of the climb.

Another place that I just did not get to stay as long as I would have liked was Oberammergau, the famous Passion Play village known all over the world for its wonderful woodcarving and Hummel figurines. There's a marvelous legend and history in this village.



A public drawing will be held in Austin Oct. 7 to determine the 951 participants allowed on the five management and research facilities around the state.



SUMMARY OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."

The couple will live in Austin.


