

German is spoken in all the countries we have visited. However, the Swiss near France speak French; near Italy, Italian; and there is a Latin_like dialect that is dying out. German is most prevalent. In Austria, they have their own special way of speaking German. We, in the two weeks, pick_ ed up a few words, but very few. The language is difficult. "Bitte" can mean "please" or it can mean "you are welcome" or "think nothing of it." "Danke schoen" is "Thank you" and that is impor-
