The Royse City High School Mighty Bulldog Band was honored to participate in the New Year's Day parade in City of London, England on January 1, 2017. The event was hosted by the City of Westminster Borough. Also representing Texas in the parade was the Cleburn High School Marching Band.

According to the Mighty Bulldog Band Director Doug Fulwood, 212 people traveled to London for the six day event. They included 139 band members, 5 directors and 68 adult/family members who went as chaperones.

"Each traveler's cost was \$3,250.00. The total cost of the trip was \$690,060.00," Fulwood said. Different fundraisers were held to acquire as much money as they could, then each traveler going was responsible for coming up with the rest of the cost.

Fulwood said, "his former college band director, Jonathan Hooper is a liaison for the parade between London and Texas bands. Hooper came and heard the band play before UIL contest and mentioned The Bulldog Band to the LNYDP (London's New Years Day Parade) people. They extended an invitation based on his recommendations."

In May, 2015 Kevin Worthy, Royse City ISD Superintendent sent out a press release. It said that "Duncan Sandys, a former lord mayor of the City of Westminster and the great-grandson of Winston Churchill was coming to Royse City High School to hear the band perform."

The release also said that Jonathan Whaley, director of international participation for the London New Year's Day Parade and Festival came with Sandys.

After hearing the band perform, the Bulldog Band received the following invitation:

"In recognition of an unparalleled reputation for outstanding performance abilities, the patrons and the organizing committee of London's New Year's Day Parade and Festival, in association with the City of Westminster, take great pleasure in extending an invitation to the Royse City High School Mighty Bulldog Band, Texas, to participate in the 31st annual New Year's Day Parade and Festival, to be held in London, England between December 27th, 2016 and January 3rd 2017."

The weather was cold and rainy but the band never missed a beat, marching with Texas pride. This trip was truly a lifetime memory for all those from Royse City who attended.

The parade route started at Piccadilly, and continued to Piccadilly Circus, Lower Regent Street, Waterloo Place, Pall Mall, Cockspur Street, Trafalgar Square, Whitehall and finished at Parliament Street. The band passed by nine grandstands.

City of Heath grants \$500,000 to private restaurant company represented by previous Mayor Liechty

The city council of the City of Heath, Inc., met Nov. 8, 2017, in the corporate meeting chambers located at 200 Laurence Drive in Heath.

City Secretary Norma Duncan drafted the approved minutes of the meeting.

Representatives of the Body Politic of People in Heath attending the meeting were Mayor Brian Berry, Joe Chamberlain, Kelson Elam, Rich Krause, Kevin Lamberth and John Main. Absent from the meeting was Mayor Pro Tem Barry Brooks.

The council was divided on two items.

Krause opposed the measure to approve an application by Chris Cuny on behalf of HGYC, LLC for a preliminary plat of Heath Golf & Yacht Club Phase 2, Tract 7, including 49 single-family lots located was of FM 740, on Trophy Drive.

Cuny answered questions.

A second application by Cuny related to Heath Golf & Yacht Club Phase 2, Tract 8, was also opposed by Krause.

Elam and Krause cast the dissenting votes related to Resolution 161108-B expressing support by the City Council for the Evergreen at Heath Senior Community application for financing, and authorizing unanimously approved a variance application by Charles Holt for the mayor to certify the resolution to the Texas Department of Housing and Community affairs.

Tony Sisk of Churchill Residential presented predevelopment information, and clarified that the request was not related to zoning. Sisk said the application for financing is due Feb. 2017.

Council discussed the issue before the motion. Certain representatives expressed density concerns, and questioned the success of the development.

In other business the representatives:

• Approved Resolution 16108-A related to an application by Kathryn Klepak, for city permission to violate Section 157.02 (C) of the Code of Ordinances that limits fences in the side and rear yard abutting a street to a maximum height of 4', to allow fences in the side and rear yard of 8' in height on Lot 4, Block C, located at 133 Wellington Lane. Berry opened the public hearing in which there were no speakers. The variance was passed unanimously.

 Approved Ordinance 161108-A related to an application by Dean Cathey on behalf of Daltex Builders Group, for a zoning change from Agricultural to Planned Development District for single-family residential use on 35.365 acres of land located on the west side of Laurence Drive (FM 740) south of Chaps Drive. Four members of the Body Politic of Heath expressed support for the project during the public hearing.

Chuck Dale explained that he's owned property for over 30 years and was approaching time to sell. He said the project was very "Heathlike."

Kathy Nolan supported the project, but was waiting to learn more. Nolan expressed concern about the higher density.

Jerry Jayroe supported the project, but spoke of concerns about

The estimate for construction approved a regulatory land-grab of 21 properties through extremely sensitive involuntary annexations (see end of story for list of is \$650,000. adversely affected property owners as listed with the Hunt County Central Appraisal District).

City Secretary Deborah Sorensen did not select a newspaper that was published in Rockwall County, as required in Texas Gov. Code 2051.048(c), for publication of each involuntary annexation notice.

City Manager Carl Alsabrook allowed tax dollars be released as payment to a newspaper company located in Montgomery, Alabama, while knowing the satellite newspaper, selected by Sorensen, was not published in Royse City or in Rockwall County.

City Attorney Jason Day did not provide legal advice to the city council as to whether the selected newspaper met the statutory criteria under Section 2051.048(b) as a newspaper published in Royse City, or 2051.048(c) as a newspaper published in Rockwall County.

It is unknown at this time whether adversely affected parties to the highly sensitive involuntary annexations will file legal actions against the city government and its representative officers for noncompliance with state law related to publication of the respective

Attending the meeting were council members Charles Houk (Place 1), Clay Ellis (Place 2, Mayor Pro Tem), Bruce Bradley (Place 3), Matt Wheatley (Place 4), Tom Crowley (Place 6). Absent from the meeting was James Branch (Place 5).

Ms. Sorensen drafted the approved minutes of the meeting.

No one spoke during the public hearing that was opened related to a voluntary annexation of John Davis Survey abstract 244, tract 12, 25 acres and abstract 1317, tract R13, 60.07 acres located along CR 2552 in Hunt County.

The representatives unanimously approved the consent agenda which included the minutes of the Oct. 25, 2016 meeting.

According to the minutes, the city council "recessed into closed session in compliance with 551.001 Texas Government Code, to wit: Section 551.071 - Private consultation with the City Attorney." The purpose for closed session was to discuss development agreements

> with "Sky 202 E Rusk Series LLC," and "Quest Church INC."

After coming out of the closed session, council unanimously approved both development agreements.

The city unanimously approved an award to APAC-Texas, Inc. for street reconstruction of Lamar Street from College to Elm, in the amount of \$139,786.65, authorizing the City Manager to sign all documents related to the matter.

The council approved the appointment of four Board Members to the Community Development Corporation Board. They are Mike Gilbert, Clay Ellis, Jesse Vaughn and Richard Pense. The Board recommended reappointment for a 2-year term.

During the Manager updates, Alsabrook said the Highway 66 and Erby Campbell Project was approved for a traffic control light. He explained TxDoT is unable to install the light prior to the road rehabilitation project starting in April. A four-way stop was placed at the intersection.

The meeting adjourned at 7:42 p.m.



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

On God's Word

The birth of Jesus ... Luke, Part 4

Before continuing with Chapter 2 of Luke's account, let's briefly examine Luke 1:80, related to John.

This verse comes after Elizabeth's lengthy and detailed prophecy by Elizabeth's husband Zacharias. Verse 67 says, "And his father Zacharias was filled with the Holy Ghost, and prophesied ..."

Remember what happened after Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Ghost. She not only started to prophecy, but her son lept in her womb.

Verse 80 helps to verify why John lept in her womb, "And the child grew, and waxed strong in spirit, and was in the deserts till the day of his showing unto Israel."

Considering the elderly ages of his parents, it's highly possible that John lived in the desert from an early age, and was taught by the spirit of God from an early age. In fact, if he was filled with the Holy Ghost while in the womb, God could have been teaching his heart from infancy.

God had a special purpose for John to prepare the people of Israel for the Kingdom that would be under the everlasting reign of the Messiah Yeshua (aka, Jesus), from God. That Kingdom existed for a short while during the time Jesus lived on earth, and is now in in holding until the New Jerusalem is established for the chosen 144,000 of Israel and God's beloved saints who will suffer during the Terrible Tribulation period.

Luke did an excellent job of accounting for the events surrounding the conception and birth of John. God's purpose for him was extremely important, especially when we consider that he would be called to annoint Jesus at around 30 years of age.

After the birth of John, Joseph and Mary traveled to Bethlehem because of a decree by Caesar Augustus. The King James Bible says the decree was related to a tax, but a more accurate translation reveals the decree was for a census. Everyone returned to the place according to their lineage. The couple was of the line of King David and thus returned to Bethlehem.

According to Luke 2:5, they traveled while Mary was "great with child." It was nearly time for her son to come out.

While in Bethlehem, her baby was born. It says she "wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger because there was no room for them in the inn."

The act of wrapping in "swaddling clothes" involved tightly wrapping the infant in a way so that his body was held stiff and straight. Basically, he was wrapped in a tight bandage.

Why? Mary and Joseph followed a tradition that was applied to infants who were born to be Kings. It was symbolic of staying on the straight and narrow path of righteousness, and holding one's body straight and upright.

Something fantastic happened during the same time of Jesus' birth. Remember that Mary had just experienced a painful child-birth and carried the child in her womb during a long journey.

What happened next, no doubt, edified and encouraged a tired and worn-out mother.

It starts with verse 8, "And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night." It was nighttime.

"And, lo, the angel of the lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid."

The shepherds didn't understand what was happening. This was the same angel that came to Mary.

It doesn't explain what it meant that the "glory of the Lord shined around them," but it must have been something amazing that grabbed their attention and caused them to be afraid.

The angel said, "Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a savior, which is Christ the Lord."

The word Christ the Lord is more accurately translated to Messiah the Lord. The angel wasn't talking about God being born, but about the Messiah conceived by God. Furthermore, the angel was not mistaken by calling the Messiah Lord.

Remember Peter's words to the people who saw them speak in tongues, "Therefore let all the house of Israel know assuredly, that God has made that same Jesus, whom you have crucified, both Lord and Christ." God, who was considered the highest in command, transferred all authority to His first-born son Yeshua the living Messiah.

The angel knew to call Jesus the Messiah and Lord even though the transfer of authority had not occurred yet.

The angel told the shepherds they would find the baby wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger. The shepherds knew the significant meaning of a baby wrapped in swaddling clothes.

Suddenly a multitude of heavenly angels or host appeared and started praising God.

The shepherds did as instructed and found the baby lying in a manger, and went out spreading the good news.



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

Economic ideas: Thomas Malthus on population, passions, property and politics

The Checks on Mouths to Feed: Misery and Vice

Malthus then made his famous statement concerning the relationship between the "geometric" rate of unchecked population growth in comparison to the "arithmetical" growth in the rate of food production. Eventually, the rate of population growth would overtake the rate of food production, the result of which would be a "natural check" on population through poverty, starvation and death.

Assuming then, my postulata as granted, I say, that the power of population is indefinitely greater than the power in the earth to produce subsistence for man. Population, when unchecked, increases in a geometrical ratio. Subsistence increases only in an arithmetical ratio. A slight acquaintance with numbers will show the immensity of the first process in comparison to the second.

By the law of our nature which makes food necessary to the life of man, the effects of these two unequal powers must be kept equal. This implies a strong and constantly operating check on population from the difficulty of subsistence. This difficulty must fall somewhere; and must necessarily be severely felt by a large portion of mankind . . .

This natural inequality of the two powers of population and of production in the earth, and that great law of our nature which must constantly keep their effects equal, form the great difficulty that to me appears insurmountable in the way of the perfectibility of society.

All the arguments are of slight and subordinate consideration in comparison of this. I see no way by which man can escape from the weight of this nature. No fancied equality, no agrarian regulation in their utmost extent, could remove the pressure of it even for a single century. And it appears, therefore, to be decisive against the possible existence of a society, all the members of which, should live in ease, happiness, and comparative leisure; and feel no anxiety about providing the means of subsistence for themselves and families.

Malthus argued that taking periods of 25 years as a benchmark, the accelerating growth in population would finally reach a crisis point relative to the rate of food growth. What, then, may check this growth in an unsustainable population? Malthus concluded only two factors. What he called "vice" and "misery."

Fearful of marrying before he can support a family and bring about starvation and ruin to his off-spring, a man may delay and defer marriage until he feels financially able to care for a wife and children. But this results in "vice," since the sexual urges lead men to search out physical gratification outside the bonds of matrimony, and the birth of illegitimate offspring.

Or it brings about "misery," due to a failure to defer marriage, and the bringing into the world children for which means of subsistence do not adequately exist. This results in starvation and premature death of children and adults that brings the population and its growth down, again, to a level sustainable from existing food production.

Malthus added that if Godwin's proposal for a greater community of property and equality of distribution of its output were to be introduced it would soon diminish the incentives for work and effort and set men into conflict with each other. Or as he put it, weakened private property rights would soon set in motion "the black train of distresses, that would inevitably be occasioned by the insecurity of property."

Tempering Nature's Constraints through Moral Restraint

In 1799, after the publication of An Essay on the Principle of Population, and then again in 1802, Thomas Malthus went on trips around parts of Europe. He collected a large amount of historical and demographic data on population (to the extent that such data then existed). He used this to publish a second edition of the book in 1803 that was substantially increased in size and factual information, as he had been able to gather it.

To his previous argument, Malthus now added an additional factor that could serve as a check on population, and could even

keep population growth sufficiently under control so that standards of living might rise, even in the long run. This was what he called "moral restraint." This was a conscious act to defer marriage until an individual had the financial means to adequately support a family, and the will to renounce the temptations of "vice." That is, to abstain from sexual gratification outside of marriage. Said Malthus:

It is of the utmost importance to the happiness of mankind that population should not increase too fast; but it does not appear that the object to be accomplished would admit of any considerable diminishment in the desire for marriage.

It is clearly the duty of each individual not to marry till he has a prospect of supporting his children; but it is at the same time to be wished that he should retain undiminished his desire for marriage, in order that he may exert himself to realize this prospect, and be stimulated to make provision for the support of greater numbers . . .

And if moral restraint be the only virtuous mode of avoiding the incidental evils arising from this principle, our obligation to practice it will evidently rest exactly upon the same foundation as our obligation to practice any of the other virtues.

Unleashing of Free Markets Negated Malthus' Prediction

Given what was pointed out at the beginning about the seven-fold increase in world population since 1820, accompanied by an even more dramatic fall in global poverty over the last two hundred years, Malthus' warnings and fears seem to have been totally undermined by the facts of history. Population has exploded beyond all experience in human history during the last two centuries, yet all of these billions of additional mouths are increasingly fed and with a rising standard of living for a growing number of them.

Clearly, Malthus, writing in the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries under estimated one important influence that was beginning during his lifetime: market-based industrialization. Investment in productive capital equipment, especially in agriculture, began to dramatically increase the output and the nutritive quality of food produced per unit of land brought into cultivation. This included the development of modern chemistry to increase harvests and productive strains of crops. Thus, food production has grown exponentially, and not, as Malthus feared, "arithmetically."

Urbanization has resulted in a conscious choice by married couples to reduce the size of families. In farming societies with limited mechanization each child is an additional mouth that comes with two hands to help in the working of the land. Hence, children are "investment goods" in agricultural society, both for work to be done and offering support for parents in their old age.

In industrial, urban society children are additional mouths to feed that supply little or no extra income to the family during most of childhood. Hence, children are "consumer goods" that consume income, and reduce the standard of living of the family the more children that need to be taken care of. In addition, the cost of urban residential living space has influenced the incentives about sizes of families. And, of course, the development of birth control has greatly influenced the ability and widened of the choice of how many children to have, and when.

In fairness, what Malthus and many others failed to see or anticipate was the explosion of production, industry, and commerce that was soon set loose by expanding economic liberty in the nineteenth century. This unleashed entrepreneurial innovation and discovery of market opportunities in the pursuit of profits that was made possible by ending the trade protectionism, domestic regulation, heavy tax burdens, and paper money inflations that enveloped all of Europe, including Great Britain, during nearly the quarter of a century of war from 1791 to 1815 between first Revolutionary and then Napoleonic France against practically all of the rest of Europe.

Only with the arrival of peace and the beginning of a conscious introduction of economic liberalism, first in Great Britain and then other parts of the European continent, and, of course, independently

at the same time in the United States, was free market capitalism's potential horn-of-plenty able to begin to release its bounty upon humanity.

Malthus's Contributions to Human Understanding

Many historians of economic thought have pointed out the various weaknesses, exaggerations, inconsistencies and factual errors in Malthus's argument and the changing premises and arguments in the various editions of his Essay on the Principle of Population. Indeed, one of the leading of such historians, Edwin Cannan, stated that Malthus's analysis, "falls to the ground as an argument, and remains only a chaos of facts collected to illustrate the effect of laws which do not exist." And Joseph A. Schumpeter even said that the actual pattern of birth rates with industrialization and urbanization accompanied by growth in food production suggested "a sort of Malthusianism in reverse."

But even with its weaknesses and factual errors others have seen an enduringly valuable contribution in Malthus's theory of population. No less than an authority than the Austrian economist, Ludwig von Mises, in his treatise, Human Action, suggested that in Malthus's work can be seen a contribution equal to the discovery of the logic of division of labor and the spontaneous workings of the market order for the betterment of human circumstances:

The Malthusian law of population is one of the great achievements of thought. Together with the principle of the division of labor it provided the foundation for modern biology and the theory of evolution; the importance of these two fundamental theorems for the sciences of human action is second only to the discovery of the regularity in the intertwinement and sequence of market phenomena and their inevitable determination by the market data . . .

Malthus showed that nature in limiting the means of subsistence does not accord to any living being a right of existence, and that by indulging heedlessly in the natural impulse of proliferation man would never have risen about the verge of starvation. He contended that human civilization and well-being could develop only to the extent that man learned to rein in his sexual appetites by moral restraints . . .

Nonhuman beings are entirely subject to the operation of the biological law described by Malthus . . . But the case is different with man. Man integrates the satisfaction of the purely zoological impulses, common to all animals, into a scale of values, in which a place is also assigned to specifically human ends.

Acting man also rationalizes the satisfaction of his sexual appetites.

Their satisfaction is the outcome of a weighing of the pros and cons.

Man does not blindly submit to a sexual stimulation . . . He refrains from copulation if he deems the costs – the anticipated disadvantages – too high.

Thomas Malthus, even with the limits and incompleteness of his analysis, can be seen to have made essential contributions to understanding the inescapable human condition. First, man at any time exists under a scarcity of the means for his ends. Other things held given, the larger the population the greater needs to be the available supply of food and other necessities of life, if the standard and quality of life are not to be diminished or reduced. The only way to prevent a decline in standards of living is for there to be increases in capital investment that increase production and the productivity of the workforce more than any increase in the population.

Second, given the level of capital investment and technological knowledge, there is an optimal size of a society's population, below which more people means greater net output, and above which there results less net output. And, third, the political and economic institutional circumstances can make a difference in that they may foster capital investment, more forward-looking choices by individuals, and incentives to save and work.

On this latter point, Malthus was well aware of the dangers from overreaching and expanding governmental power in terms of their threat to liberty and its resulting restraint on people having the freedom to guide their own lives as they think best to improve themselves. In the expanded, fifth edition of his Essay on Population, which appeared in 1817, he warned of how ignorance of the laws of nature and the essential the institutions of free commercial society can easily lead astray mobs of people whose violent actions may open the door to despotism.

This sets the stage for a dangerous confrontation between individual liberty and political authority, in which people must always be watchful and knowledgeable so as to check the government's drive for unchecked power. Malthus warned:

The checks which are necessary to secure the liberty of the subject will always to some degree embarrass and delay the operations of the executive government. The members of the government feeling these inconveniences while they are exerting themselves, as they conceive, in the service of their country, and conscious perhaps of no ill intention towards the people, will naturally be disposed on every occasion to demand the suspension or abolition of these checks; but if once the convenience of ministers be put in competition with the liberties of the people and we get into the habit of relying on fair assurances and personal character, instead of examining with the most scrupulous and jealous care the merits of each particular case, there is an end of British freedom.

If we once admit the principle that the government must know better with regard to the quantity of power which it wants than we can possibly do with out limited means of information, and that therefore it is our duty to surrender up our private judgments, we may just as well at the same time surrender up the whole of our constitution. Government is a quarter in which liberty is not nor cannot be very faithfully preserved. If we are wanting to ourselves, and inattentive to our great interests in this respect, it is the height of folly and unreasonableness to expect that government will attend to them for us.

Thus, Thomas Malthus's contribution may be said to be the following: Man is above all other life forms on earth in that he is able to use his reason to control his passions when they may entail costs greater than the anticipated benefits; at the same time he can use his rational faculties to devise ways to escape limits that nature places upon him by planning ahead to increase his future productive and income earning capacities to improve his standard of living. And that to do so most successfully there must be the necessary institutional prerequisites, among which freedom, property, and peace are the most essential.

Will Trump continue the Bush-Obama legacy?

This week, Congress passed a budget calling for increasing federal spending and adding \$1.7 trillion to the national debt over the next ten years. Most so-called "fiscal conservatives" voted for this bigspending budget because it allows Congress to repeal some parts of Obamacare via "reconciliation." As important as it is to repeal Obamacare, it does not justify increasing spending and debt.

It is disappointing, but not surprising, that the Obamacare repeal would be used to justify increasing spending. Despite sequestration's minor (and largely phony) spending cuts, federal spending has increased every year since Republicans took control of the House of Representatives. Some will attribute this to the fact that the Republican House had to negotiate with a big-spending Democratic president — even though federal spending actually increased by a greater percentage the last time Republicans controlled the White House and Congress than it did under President Obama.

The history of massive spending increases under unified Republican control of government is likely to repeat itself. During the presidential campaign, President-elect Donald Trump came out against reducing spending on "entitlements." He also called for a variety of spending increases, including spending one trillion dollars on infrastructure. One positive part of the infrastructure proposals is their use of tax credits to encourage private sector investments. Hopefully this will be the first step toward returning responsibility for building and maintaining our nation's infrastructure to the private sector.

Unfortunately, the administration appears likely to support increased federal spending on "shovel-ready" jobs. Claims that federal spending helps grow the economy rely on the fallacy of that which is not seen. While everyone sees the jobs and economic growth created by government infrastructure projects, no one sees the greater number of jobs that could have been created had the government not

taken the resources out of the hands of private businesses, investors, and entrepreneurs. Despite what some conservatives seem to think, this fallacy applies equally to Republican and Democrat spending.

President-elect Trump has criticized the past two administrations' reckless foreign policy, and he has publicly shamed the powerful Lockheed Martin company for wasting taxpayer money. Yet, he continues to support increasing the military budget and has called for increased military intervention in the Middle East.

The fact is the United States already spends too much on militarism.

Not only does the United States spend more on the military than the combined military budgets of the next eight highest spending countries, but Pentagon waste exceeds the total Russian military budget.

America can no longer afford to waste trillions of dollars on a militaristic foreign policy. Donald Trump should follow-up his attacks on wasteful military spending by dramatically changing our foreign policy and working to cut the Pentagon's bloated budget.

If the new administration and Congress increase spending, they will need the Federal Reserve to monetize the growing debt. The fair need for an accommodative monetary policy gives the Federal to Reserve and its allies in Congress and in the deep state leverage over the administration. This leverage could be used, for example, to pressure the administration to abandon support for the Audit the Fed legislation.

Fed action can only delay the inevitable day of reckoning. Raising levels of federal spending and debt will inevitably lead to a major economic crisis. This crisis is likely to be reached when concerns over our national debt cause more countries to reject the dollar's status as the world's reserve currency. The only way to avoid this crisis is to stop increasing spending and instead begin reducing spending on all aspects of the welfare-warfare state.

The team will return to home court, 6:30 p.m., Tues. Jan. 24, to play against Longview.




