# WO JAPANESE SHIPS DESTROYED AND ONE RUSSIAN CRUISER LOST

The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Central News says that there was an explosion May attleship Orel at Gronatads and that ten stokers were billed. The wassel, the correspondent says, was damaged, nd it will this weeks to effect repairs. The explosion, according to the dispatch, was the result of an accumula of gas in the bunkers.

An investigation made by the authorities into the recent attempts to destroy some of the vessels of the Baltic et at Cronstadt has resulted in the arrest of four Japanese spies, who seem to have escaped detection by wear the uniform of navai cadets, thus obtaining admission to the navy yard and access to the ships without difficulty. It is believed that they are also responsible for the fire started some time back near the navai magazine and for opening of the sea valves of the Orel. The authorities here think the Japanese have been harbored by an-

The report that Rear Admiral Jessen, finding it impossible to save the protected cruiser Bogatyr, which went re recently in a fog, on the rocks off Vladivostok, caused her to be blow up, is confirmed. The guns of the ityr were removed before she was destroyed. No loss of life attended her destruction.

Admiral Togo has reported as follows:

"A report from Rear Admiral Dewa says that the cruisers Kasagi and Yeshine collided during a fog off Port r, May 15th. The Yoshino sank, only ninety of her crew being saved.


"On the same day the battleship Hatsuse struck a Russian mine, and sank."

Giving details of the disasters, Vice Admiral Togo says:

"At fourteen minutes past one o'clock in the afternoon of May 15th, in a deep fog off Port Arthur, the Kasagi ned the Yoshino, sinking the latter in a few minutes. Ninety of her crew were saved.

"The same morning, the Hatsuse, while cruising off Port Arthur, covering the landing of soldiers, struck a ten knots southeast of the barbor entrance. She signaled for help, and instantly struck another mine. She In balf an hour. Three hundred of her crew were saved by torpedo boats."

## **NEW MEXICO NEWS SUMMARY**

In the District Court at Socorro May 21st, Dr. Ray, the counterfeiter, who pleaded guilty, was sentenced to the pealtentiary for five years. E. F. Otero, clerk in the United States land office in Santa Fe, has resigned, and will be succeeded by B. E. Schaeffer of Washington, D. C.

Incorporation papers have been filed at Santa Fe by the Raton Lumber company, principal office in Raton, Colfax county. The incorporators and direct ors are Edgar W. Fulghum, William A. Fulghum and Benjamin W. Fulghum. Capital stock is \$25,000.

Articles of incorporation have been filed at Santa Fe by the Security Warehouse and Improvement company, with its principal office at Albuquerque, Bernalillo county. The company is capitalized at \$20,000. The incorporators and directors are George A. Kaseman, Harry H. Tilton, Paul Teutsch and Felix H. Lester.

A Santa Fe dispatch of May 21st says: Chief Justice W. J. Mills to-day issued a call for a special meeting of the Territorial Supreme Court at Santa Fe to apportion the territory into six judicial districts. Judge A. L. Morrison to-day awarded the contract for repairs to the Federal building in this city to F. P. Crichton for \$3,250. There were two other bidders.

James Gould, Mrs. W. W. Crawford and J. J. Boone of Alamogordo, have sued the El Paso & Northeastern railway for \$1,137.50 damages for alleged injuries to a shipment of sixty-five head of horses shipped from Alamagordo to Aurora, Missouri. The petition alleges that several horses died and others were injured owing to the negligence of the road's employes.

Agriculture In New Mexico.

Agriculture is without doubt the leading industry of New Mexico, and the following concise and yet comprehensive review of conditions in the territory by Prof. J. J. Vernon of Mesilla Park, written for Governor Otero's report, is very timely at this season: New Mexico agriculture is attracting

more attention to-day than at any former time. Homeseekers are flocking to the territory in great numbers, preempting and purchasing large areas of land in our fertile valleys, and building new agricultural communities of considerable importance. New Mexico may properly be called an agricultural territory, to the truth of which the

following facts attest: The number of persons 10 years of age and over engaged in special occupations in 1900 are distributed among these occupations as follows:

It will be seen by referring to the above table that 41 per cent of the persons in the territory pursuing gainful occupations are engaged in agricul tural pursuits-quite a creditable showing. In the great agricultural state of Illinois, having a population of 1,804, 040 engaged in gainful occupations, there are 462,781 persons, or only 31 per cent, as against 41 per cent in New Mexico which are engaged in agricultural pursuits. The area and valuation of farm land

and the value of farm property in New Mexico has materially increased since 1890, as is shown in the following ta-ble:

Total number of farms, 1890, 4,458; 1906, 11,824; acres in farms, 1900, 787,-882; 1900, 5,130,878; total value of farm property, 1890, \$33,543,141; 1900, \$53,-737,824; lands, fences and buildings, 1890, \$8,140,800; 1900, \$20,888,814; implements and machinery, 1890, \$291,-140; 1900, \$1,151,610; live stock on hand June 1, 1890, \$25,111,201; 1900, \$31,727,400.

The table shows that from 1890 to 1900 the number of farms increased 265 per cent, the area of farm lands 651 per cent, the total value of farm property 160 per cent, the value of lands with their improvements 256 per cent, the value of implements and machinery 395 per cent and the value of live stock 126 per cent. These figures give an idea of the rapid development going on within our borders, and they Better Crop Outlook.

Following is the crop bulletin issued by the weather bureau for New Mex-ico May 18th: Cool, dry and windy weather characterized the first part of the week and scattered showers, higher temperatures and little wind, the latter on the southeastern range, prin-cipally in the vicinity of Roswell. The rainfall was sufficient to relieve the drouth conditions but over the territory generally and in the vicinity of the White and Sacramento mountains in particular the showers were light

and did very little good. The water supply has not been materially increased by the rains, though conditions as a whole are greatly improved. New grass has started in many localities and although the lambing season is almost over, the rains will prevent any further losses. A very irregular increase in lambs is reported About fifty per cent. were saved by camps most favorably situated, though other sheepmen lost almost all of the lambs and many of the old sheep.

Cattle have been falling off rapidly in the southern ranges and in the northeast, but rapid improvement is now looked for. In some localities where water is ob-

tainable, crops show marked improve ment during the past week, but the to al number of acres planted this season is much less than usual. Wheat and corn are growing rapidly. The yield in the first cutting of alfalfa, which is occurring in southern counties is very light. Early fruits, such as peaches apricats and cherries, sweet cherries in particultr, will yield very irregularly

#### Cattle Company Buys Lands.

The Kansas Land and Cattle Com pany, organized by John Tod of Maple Hill, Kansas, and Frank Law of Folsom, are buying immense quantities of pasture land in New Mexico. This company has holdings of some 75,000 acres in the Panhandle country near Bovina on syndicate lands and it has in the last year placed land scrip that cost them an average of \$3 an acre up on no less than 200,000 acres of govern ment land in one solid body near Fol som in Union county. Wherever their scrip surrounded patented lands owned by other persons it has bought the holders out at very liberal figures. Thus the company owns its land abso lutely and is enclosing it with a first class five wire fence. So far it has no cattle upon it, but

will doubtless take advantage of the extremely low price of cattle and stock it. These lands comprise what is the cream of western cattle lands. There is water in abundance, and shelter is good and the range not mountainou enough so that any of it is too rough for grazing. It is extremely well grassed and there is plenty of browsing. At a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce of El Paso last week it was announced that the long-discussed irrigation reservoir question, involving El Paso, southern New Mexico and Mexico, would probably be settled by the building of the Elephant Butte dam by the United States government. A Denver Republican Washington special May 23d says:- "The depart-ment of justice to day received several letters of indorsement of H. R. Mann of Las Cruces for the position of territorial judge for the new judicial dis-trict of New Mexico, and it is believed by Delegate Rodey that Mann will be appointed. He has the indorseme the Republican organizations of New Mexico, and leading Republicans from other states are also recommending that he be appointed.

#### Prehistoric Remains at Zuni.

On the huge Zuni river reservoir and ditch system, now under construction 150 men are at work at present. More could be used, but they cannot be se cured, as the people of that section, including the Indians, are very busy with the lambing of sheep and shearing, as well as in looking after their crops.

The excavations for the great dam, which is to be built across the Zuni river and form a reservoir wherein sufficient water for the irrigation of about 6,000 acres of land to be cultivated by the Zuni Indians is to be impounded. are well down in the bed of the river. It is difficult work, as the underground seepage into the bed of the river is powerful and constant.

This work will have to be pushed until the hard clay is reached, as there the foundation and core of the dam will be anchored. Modern steam machinery is used in excavation.

In the excavations in the river bed quite a number of we%preserved mastodon tusks and bones were found Some of the latter were ribs, four-teen feet in length. These have been put aside, and the Smithson'an Institute has been informed of the finds. Three heads of extinct animals were discovered. They are about two feet in length and 15 inches in width. The teeth are well preserved. The heads have two straight horns from 16 to 20 inches long. The position of the eye sockets under the horns make it probable that the animal could look side ways and backward, as they are situated on the side and quits a distance back on each head.

Bones of other prehistoric animals were found. The working force consists partly of Zuni Indians.

A Las Vegas dispatch of May 23d says: "The family of Jose Tafoya were poisoned to day by detable isoned to-day by drinking water that had been stored in a barrel used for mixing chemicals. The family appropriated the barrel, not knowing of the use to which it had been put. Mrs. Tafoya is dead, and the remaining members of the family are very ill." Don Margarito Romero, mayor of West Las Vegas, was declared not guilty of cutting timber in violation of the statutes on the Pecos forest reserve. The government brought five counts against Mr. Romero last term. Two were thrown out and the jury dis agreed as to the other two. This term. after a hard-fought case, the jury ac quitted him after being out all day. Mr. Romero was cutting timber on the grant under contract. Some one cut timber that had not been indicated, but the government failed to connect Mr. tro with it.

At Las Vegas, May 23d Luis Busto was seriously, if not fatally, burned. A can of coal oil exploded while the boy was using it to start a fire. The house was set on fire and considerably dam-aged.<sup>4</sup>

An epidemic of diphtheria recently broke out at the Cochiti Pueblo, and Dr. David Knapp of Santa Fe was sent to investigate conditions and give med-ical assistance to the people.

### Cooked to Death.

An accident which resulted in the death of Felix Grundy, a colored man employed as the cook of the Las Animas Land and Cattle Company of Sierra county is reported from Hillsboro Grundy, who has been ill for some time, went to the Palomas hot springs for treatment. Some time during the night he went to the spring and in the morning when it was found that he was missing, the door of the bathroom was forced open and he was found lying in the water at the bottom of the spring. The supposition is that he became unconscious upon going into the water and was drowned. It was evident that the body had been in the water for some time, for in order to remove it and prevent the flesh which had been cooked from failing from the bones, a bfanket had to be used for raising the body. The remains were taken to Las Palomas for burial. Grundy was about sixty-six years old and had resided in the territory for many

years. When a boy he was a slave in Kentucky. He had served as a soldier in the Ninth United States cavalry and during the Indian troubles in the Southwest as a scout,-Santa Fe New Mexican.

The father and mother separated a few months ago, and the child was placed by the court in the custody of the school. Ar-rangements had been made that Miss Antoinette Brengle, one of the teach-ers, should take the child with her for the summer vacation. When Miss Brengle, accompanied by other teach-ers of the school, had gone to the Santa Fe depot preparatory to leaving Santa Fe depot preparatory to leaving, four men came and took the child forcibly from the teachers. Deputy forcibly from the teachers. Deputy Sheriff Richard Huber attempted to rescue the child, but he was knocked down by one of the men, and by the time he recovered from the effects of the blow the child had been placed in a wagon and taken away. Immediate and successful steps were taken to obtain possession of the child. The men who carried the child away are alleged to have done so at the instign tion of the mother, Mrs. Martha Wa



#### Life Sentence for Burglary.

At Mason, Michigan, Lewis Oliver, who, in company with Fred Lesarg, stole \$3 and two bats from a butcher. shop, was recently given a life sen-tence in Marquette prison by Judge Wiest. It was his third offense for burglary. Judge Wiest says that the statute provides that where a prisoner has been twice sentenced for felony and is again arrested, he may be sen-tenced for life.

Since Oliver was first sentenced im 1881," said the judge, "he has been un-der arrest more times than he can tell. He has served thirteen years for burg-lary. I believe the statute referred to was framed for the purpose of ridding society of just such men as I conside Oliver to be."

### **Beet Sugar Production**

Statistics of the world's beet sugar crop for the last season do not show the substantial reduction in acreage which was anticipated when bounties were abolished through the Brussels conference. The yield is 5,910,000 long tons of sugar, a falling off of but seven to sugar, a falling off of but seven per cent.; therefore the production is still greatly in excess of the demand.

Big Standard Oil Plant.

The most important plant of the Standard Oil Company is that at Whiting, Indiana, twenty miles from Chicago. At present there are more than 200 stills in which the crude oil is refined on the same principle that is employed in distilling whisky. The oil stills are immense kettles under which furnaces are kept burning. The vapor passes through coiled pipes cooled by water, and is thus condensed into varlous oil products. The pay for the 2,-500 men employed aggregates \$140,000 month

An eight-inch pipe line, reaching to the refinery from Lima, Ohio, 200 miles, and fed by wells of the Ohio and Indiana fields en route, furnishes the present crude oil supply. There are pumping stations fifty miles apart all along this pipe line. The cost of trans-porting oil through this pipe line is about one-tenth of what it would be if shipped by rail.

"Pilot," a magnificent wolf hound brought to Chicago from Missouri to. lead the pack of fox hunters at the Midlothian Club grounds escaped May 2nd, vaulted a nine-foot fence and disappeared. He had been crated and brought in an express car, but a telegram announces his arrival at his old home, none the worse for the journey of 465 miles in six days, during which he swam the Illinois, Mississippi, Missouri and many smaller rivers. He will not be returned, as the club managers fear he would lead the other dogs to liberty.
