COLORADO GUARDS MEREENARIES.

The Wichita Beacon prints an article on the use and operations of the military in the Colorado strikes which is the result of much labor and is an eye opener. It is the strongest of anything we have seen, considering the authorities quoted. It is as follows:
Whatever may be considered an authoritative and unbiased opinion upon the question of militarism in Colorado is that expressed in the current issue of the Army and Navy Journal. The newspapers of the country have been criticized severely for finding fault with Governor Peabody and General Bell in their lawless course, the argument most frequently advanced being that the means was justified by circumstances. It is with interest, therefore, that the comment of the Army and Navy Journal will be considered, because of the knowledge of military usage and law that gives its expression of official character.
"Is difficult," says the last issue of the Journal, "to find any satisfactory explanation of the extraordinary course pursued by the executive authorities of Colorado with reference to the labor disturbances in that state, except on the assumption of a profound ignorance on their part on the scope and purpose of military authority."
"In two respects especially, does the Peabody idea of the law and order call for the close scrutiny of all American citizens who believe that that law and order can be secured without encroachments upon civil liberty," says the Chicago Tribune.
In the first place the National guard of Colorado defending the mines against the Western Federation of Miners, has been drawing its pay from money advanced to the state authorities by members of the Mine Owners' association. "A strange spectacle this," says S. H. Adams in Collier's "of a state hiring out its militia to the feud of private interests." "This arrangement," says the Army and Navy Journal, "virtually places the troops for the time being in the relation of hired men to the mine operators and morally suspends their functions to state military guardians of the public peace. It is rank perversion of the whole theory and purpose of the National guard and more likely to incite disorder than to prevent it."

"The second alarming circumstance connected with the Peabody idea is that the National guard, being in the pay of the mine-owners, has addressed itself to protecting the interests of its employers rather than to conserving the welfare of the public.

Its actions have been those of a band of private gladiators. It might have been expected to deprive both parties of their weapons and then to remain on the scene till all difficulties had been peaceably adjusted. It might have been expected to discover and punish the individual perpetrators of specific crimes. These expectations would not have been unreasonable. When the United States regulars were sent to the capital of Oklahoma they restored law and order just this way.

The National guard of Colorado is different. Instead of insisting upon a general disarmament, it has acted simply as a reinforcement of the armed hands of the Mine Owners' association and the Citizens' Alliance. Instead of standing between the two lawless, belligerent parties as the coercive representative of the impartial majesty of the state, it has imparted itself so definitely with the mine owners that General Bell was not ashamed to say: "One deportation after another will be made until there is no one left who is persona non grata with the mine owners and the alliance." Instead of running down the guilty it has herded innocent and guilty together in bull pens, it has made arrests for less majesty—that is for abusing the National guard—it has plundered stores and offices, it has suppressed and destroyed printing establishments, it has deported property citizens on frivolous charges of vagabondage, and it has closed peacefully operated mines the employes of which belonged to the union. In other words, it has abandoned its function of maintaining peace and has adopted the function of destroying one group of citizens for the benefit of another.

There was civil lawlessness in Colorado, lawlessness so outrageous, so maddening that the citizenship of America called aloud for its suppression. Now to civil lawlessness has been added military lawlessness. The situation has not been improved. It has been complicated with the greatest problem that can face a free republic, the problem that arises when the army of the whole state is stolen by part of the state for the purpose of overpowering the other part—the problem of militarism.

A prominent Roosevelt county Republican remarked the other evening, during a discussion of the political situation, as follows: "Well, boys, I'll tell you. I am a Republican and have been one all my life, but as between Parker and Roosevelt, I am for Parker, first, last and all the time. I am wearied of apologizing for a freak." And that great class of liberal minded Republicans through the middle west will also rally to the standard of the Esopus man.

The line-up of the two great national parties appears to be as follows: Parker and Davis against Roosevelt and "Nigger Equality."

Parker and Davis are the presidential nominees of the Democratic party.
