KUROPATKIN TAKES OFFENSIVE

Another Turn in the Greatest Battle of the Present Age Hope Again Kindled in St. Petersburg.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 19,—2:50 a.m.,-There is jubilation throughout the city over the news that General Kuropatkin has resumed the offensive and few at the expense of the many of the holiday, which began with little disaster to the Republican party heart, closed brighter. The crowds would be inevitable. The editorial in the streets and the illuminations in honor of the Carevitch's name day gave a tinge of brilliancy to an evening otherwise depressing, through a constant drizzle of rain.

Newsboys up to midnight raced through the thoroughfares with evening extras, shouting, "Great Russian victory!" and crowds bought the papers. Groups of men in brilliant uniforms or in evening dress at hotels and restaurants discussed the change in the fortunes of war, but the population as a whole were slow to take fire. They had received the news of the earlier reverse stolldly and now accepted reports of Russian successes and the capture of guns quietly, with satisfaction, but with considerable re

Correspondents at the front the past forty-eight hours have been hinting that the Russian army was on the eve of another advance, but it was thought here that the troops were too exhausted by more than a week of Titantic struggle to engage in an advance movement. Therefore the news of the definite resumption of the advance, was calculated to arouse the greater satisfaction, but the realization of the significance of news per-meates the masses here more slowly

than in American cities of the The kaleidoscopic changes on the Shakhe have been too swift for the populace to follow, and so the better news from the front has been so far taken with comparative quiet in the best informed circles, however, it is land already accepted as true. Two Important Incidents in Life of American Saller. During the civil war Capt. Schle then in command of the Monongahels, was sent up to bombard one of the works at Port Hudson. When he reported on board the flagship Farragut said sternly: "Captain, you began early in life to disobey orders"; and when Schley tried to explain about the signals that were seen but could not be read, the admiral said he "wanted none of this Nelson business in his squadron about seeing signals." Afterward, however, when in the cabin, the admiral said to him: "Do it again, whenever in your judgment it is nicessary to carry out your conception of duty.'

Shortly before the opening of the civil war Schley was ordered to the steam frigate Niggara, which was detailed to carry back to Japan the Japanese embassy to the United States, after Commodore Perry had opened the island kingdom. In her return home the Niagara left Cape Town in March, 1861, and she reached Cape Cod early in May, where a pilot named Dolliver came on board with his pockets full of newspapers. The captain asked for the news with such eager anxiety that the pilot stopped to ask where the Niagara had come. from! Then he sald bluntly: ["Why, captain, the country's all busted to

It was the first they knew that civil war was on. The officers of the Niagara were called upon to decide whether they would stand by the old flag or not. A new oath of allegiance was presented to all the crew. TOO MANY BEARS

TERRORIZE THE NATIONAL PARK Man and Boy Killed at Yellowston Lake Hotel Campers and Private

Conveyances in Danger A Cody, Wyoming, dispatch says that a man and boy employed in the Yellowston National park were recently killed by bears. The names cannot be obtained, but the victims were in the employ of the Lake hotel, on Yellowstone lake. The authorities endeavored to keep the matter from the public, but the news was brought out by campers. The authorities say the man and boy were tearing the bears and were to blame, but the campers tell a different story, as follows: One day the door of the meat house

at the hotel was left open and the man and Boy were sent to close it. they reached the small building they heard a commotion inside. Before they could escape the were attacked by two huge cinnamon bears. The boy was killed instantly and the man so badly injured he died. The park officials are alleged to have

done much to cover up the details of the affair and have left the impression that death did not occur. They now admit that the two men were killed. but say they were to blame.

The time is not far distant when it will be impossible for the poorer class of people to visit the Yellowstone park owing to the constantly increasing number of bears. Many parties en route home from a visit to the park say that the journey through the wonderland was most dangercus.

It is alleged that the park transportation company and the hotel proprietors are doing everything possible to discourage campers and private conveyances from making the trip. The bears have become so numerous and bold that even the park guards are

frequently compelled to shoot the beasts to save their own lives. Recently a freighter from Gardner, in passing through the park was attacked by bears and he shot one of them. A mounted police immediately placed the freighter under arrest, despite the fact that the bear climbed onto the wagon. The major in command re-

leased the freighter. A formal protest will be made to President Roosevelt, who will be asked to decrease the number of bears in the park, have them confined in an inclosure, or make arrangements for the better protection of tourists.
