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Ackerman's Treachery. From Albuquerque Citizen. To The Daily Citizen: Mr. J. M. Ackerman, the cement block man who cast the Leach and Lindsey proxies against me in the late republican convention, contrary to his instructions, comes out in this morning's Journal and indicates that I slander him when I intimate that he was "induced" to cast them against me by the opposition.

Here is the record as to the matter and I will let the public judge of the case by telling the exact facts here below: Messrs. C. O. Leach and W. E. Lindsey, one-time Leach and the other a lawyer of Portales N. M., are friends of mine. They were elected delegates to come here to Albuquerque to help nominate me. They wrote me several letters that they were for me but that it would cost about \$100 apiece to come, and as there was no opposition to me they did not think they would come. Late Friday night I had intimations that there was going to be opposition to me, and out for an abundance of caution I wired Mr. Leach as follows:

"Albuquerque N. M., Sept. 10. 'C. O. Leach, Portales N. M.: 'As urgent personal favor to me I request you to come or send some friend with proxies from your county. B. S. Rodney."

For reply to that message the next day, on Saturday I received the following: "Portales, N. M., Sept. 10, 1904 'B. S. Rodney, Albuquerque, N. M.: 'Sent proxies to you special delivery today's mail for J. M. Ackerman citizen of our county, manager Artificial Stone Mfg. Co. your city. C. O. Leach."

Under the rule nobody but a citizen of Roosevelt county, where Portales is, could cast the proxies here and Mr. Leach knew there was no citizen of that county here in Albuquerque but this man Ackerman.

On that same day Mr. Frank A. Hubbell, chairman of the republican central committee, also received the following dispatch from Mr. Leach: "Portales, N. M., Sept. 10, 1904. 'Frank Hubbell, Albuquerque, N. M.: 'See Rodney. Proxies sent him for citizen of our county in your city. You and Rodney arrange to suit. C. O. Leach."

On receiving the wire to myself as above I recollected that I had met Mr. Ackerman about three weeks before while he was erecting the new water works building, which I had been shown by the company and, therefore I knew who he was, I took my bicycle and rode up Second street and turned in toward the railroad track, where I heard Mr. Ackerman was working on the Sandoval building, or behind it. I met him there and he at once accosted me and said he knew what I wanted. Evidently he also had received a wire from Mr. Leach. I told him politely of the wire I had received, and hoped he could spare time from his work to cast the proxies for me. He good-naturedly demurred a little about wasting his time for the sake of politics. I told him that I could not pay him anything as I had no money, having spent all my money working for New Mexico, but that if he would do me the favor, if I ever got a chance, as I believed he was doing good work, I would recommend him to some client who wanted to build a house. I told him I would not take more than an hour of his time, and that I would phone him from the convention when he was wanted. He courteously agreed to come and I thanked him. I told him that the proxies had not arrived yet, but they would be here in the next mail and that I would leave them with Harry Owen, the deputy clerk, of the republican central committee, for him.

The proxies came next morning and I gave them to Harry Owen. My recollection is that they were made out directly to be voted for me, but I haven't them by me to know the fact. However, that does not make any difference; they were intended for me.

On Monday morning I was standing in the lobby of the Alvarado hotel, and to my surprise I saw D. A. McPherson of this county take Mr. Ackerman upstairs to the opposition headquarters. I followed them upstairs and watched Ackerman until I saw him go down the hallway and into the room. In ten or fifteen minutes he came back downstairs, and I met him on the floor of the lobby, where I was watching for him, and I said to him: "I see you were up at the quarters of the opposition. I hope you are not going to do anything except cast those proxies for me. You have no discretion about it at all." He answered that he was considering the matter, and I said: "You have nothing to consider. Those were sent to me, and you have promised to cast them for me. You are a mere machine and have no discretion about it. Messrs Leach and Lindsey intend that you shall cast them for me and they so wired me, and I will revoke them if you are going to play traitor and do such a dastardly trick."

From his manner I saw right away that he had been "induced" upstairs to vote them against me, so I went out and sent the following telegram: "Albuquerque, N. M., Sept. 12, 1904. 'C. O. Leach or W. E. Lindsey, Portales N. M. 'Ackerman is trying to side against me. I have not delivered proxies.

Do you know any other Roosevelt county man here? If not wire me revoking Ackerman's authority, or that he has no right to vote them save for me for delegate.

"B. S. RODNEY." When I had in that telegram that I had not delivered the proxies, I really had not delivered them into Ackerman's hands, but had fled them with Harry Owen, clerk of the committee, and that is where the opposition got their information that such a man as Mr. Ackerman had the proxies, or that the proxies were here at all. At a time too late to be available, that is, after Ackerman had betrayed me, I got a reply from Mr. Leach to my last telegram which stated:

"Portales, N. M. Sept. 12, 1904. 'Hon. B. S. Rodney, Albuquerque N. M. 'Hold proxies. Authority of Ackerman revoked. Know of no other citizen of our county there.

"C. O. LEACH." I will venture to say that Mr. Ackerman received a dispatch direct to himself from Mr. Leach, revoking his authority to cast the proxies at all, but whether he did or not, the one to me was sufficient, but he had voted them against me before I had received the dispatch. I have all these telegrams in my possession now, and Leach and Lindsey's letters and will show them to anybody interested.

I will submit the fact to any jury in Christendom to say whether or not Mr. Ackerman was "induced" to vote the proxies against me. What did he go to the room of the opposition for? He was a mere machine asked by his friends to do a friendly act for me, and he promised to do it. He basely betrayed me and his friends. I have a number of letters from Messrs. Leach and Lindsey showing all about the transaction. There are all sorts of rumors here on the streets, and it was currently reported all over the convention as to how Mr. Ackerman was "induced" to cast those proxies against me.

Mr. Ackerman can thank his stars that there is no law in New Mexico which District Attorney Clancy can find, nor that I can find, nor that the United States attorney can find or he would have been indicted by the last grand jury for his act of perjury. We have no law referring to nominating convention, as they have in the states.

Mr. Ackerman says that he cast the proxies against me because I was too close to Hubbell. He wants some sort of an excuse to justify his perjury. It is simply none of his business how close to or how far away I was from Mr. Hubbell. He was not vested with any discretion about those proxies at all.

In another column will be found a communication with reference to the candidacy of Miss Stella Seymour for the office of county superintendent. Miss Seymour is a young lady of many accomplishments and a host of friends, and her competency cannot be denied. She is entitled to and will get the undivided support of the Republicans of Roosevelt county, that she will get any considerable number of Democratic votes is not expected. Dr. Pearce is a gentleman of wide acquaintance and many friends and, likewise, is entitled to and will receive every Democratic vote in this county. The doctor is capable, honest and broad minded and his election is conceded, even by the opposition.

They had watermelons weighing from 65 to 75 pounds, and squashes and bush beans that were simply enormous, and it would not be safe to tell the size and weight. But if the homeless farmers of the East could believe half of what we see and know of such wonderful possibilities in this line, there would be more of them seeking free homes in the beautiful climate of Roosevelt county.—Texico Trumpet.

In an experimental well upon the public square in the town of Portales, a considerable flow of artesian water was obtained at a depth of 300 feet. Arrangements are now complete for drilling to a depth of 1,000 feet, if a sufficiently strong flow is not obtained at a shallower depth, should a sufficient flow be obtained, its utilization, with the natural soil and sunshine, would make the "Inland Valley" a veritable garden; and even should it not be obtained, the shallow water of the valley may be utilized through pumping, for gardening and orcharding.
"Free Homes."
There are within the boundaries of Roosevelt county some hundred thousand acres of government lands subject to entry under the provisions of the Homestead Law. This may be your last chance to obtain a "Free Home."

ADMIRAL SCHLEY IN YOUTH.
Two important incidents in Life of American Sailor.

During the civil war Capt. Schley, then in command of the Mongahela, was sent on to bombard one of the works at Fort Hudson. While firing on the fort signals were hoisted on the batteries to recall him, but he could not read them and kept on firing until the fort was silenced. When he reported on board the Flagship Farragut said sternly: "Captain, you began early in life to disobey orders," and when Schley tried to explain about the signals that were seen but could not be read, the admiral said he "wanted none of this Nelson business in his squadron about seeing signals."

Afterward, however, when in the cabin, the admiral said to him: "Do it, again, I respect in your judgment it is necessary to carry out your conception of duty."

Shortly before the opening of the civil war Schley was ordered to the steam frigate Niagara, which was detailed to carry back to Japan the Japanese embassy to the United States, after Commodore Perry had opened the island kingdom. In her return home the Niagara left Cape Town in March, 1861, and she reached Cape Dover in May, where a pilot named Doolittle came on board with his pockets full of newspapers. 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TOO MANY BEARS.

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The Peach State.
Georgia has held the lead in the production of peaches for the Eastern market since 1902, and it is likely to be for years to come the leading peach state in the Union. The supremacy has been wrested from Maryland. Twelve years ago the order of the chief peach producing states was: Maryland, 6,100,000 trees; Delaware, 4,500,000; New Jersey, 4,300,000; Georgia, 3,700,000. Since that time the peculiar excellence of the soil and climate of Georgia for peach growing has been established, with the result that Georgia has largely increased the number of its peach-bearing trees, while in the other states there has been a diminution in the number of trees.

In the fall of 1901 the number of peach trees reported in these states, and expected to be in good bearing in 1902, was: Georgia, 7,600,000; Maryland, 4,015,000; New Jersey, 2,700,000; Delaware, 2,400,000. In the following year, accordingly, Georgia had the bumper crop. She had so far surpassed all other states in number of trees that she is likely to continue to be the peach state par excellence for an indefinite time.—New York Sun.
