A LANDSLIDE FOR ROOSEVELT

PARKER DEFEATED BY A BIGGER MAJORITY THAN BRYAN EVER WAS.

Colorado State Ticket in Doubt-Both Sides Claim Victory--- Enormous Number of Scratches.

Denver, Nov. 9.—On account of the size of the ballot and the great number of scratched votes it is impossible at this time to say whether Peabody or Adams has been elected. Mr. Smith, chairman of the Democratic state committee, claims the election of Mr. Adams by 15,000 plurality, while Mr. Fairley claims a plurality of at least 10,-000 for Mr. Peabody. It may be several days before the result is certainly known and the probability is that the result will be so close that whoever is defeated will contest the election.

There seems to be no doubt that the electoral vote has gone to Mr. Roosevelt. He has carried every Northern state as well as Maryland, Delaware and West Virginia, and this secures a larger majority, both popular and electoral, than ever before given a presidential candidate.

There seems to have been no s rious disturbances at any polling places in Colorado except in the C ipple Creek district, where there was a fatal shooting scrape. Below will be found detailed reports from all over the state and country.

New Yerk, Nov. 9,-Theodore Roose velt was elected President of the United States by a landslide. Francis W. Higgins was elected governor of New York. States which would be considered normally doubtful belied the assertion by sending in early reports of great Republican gains.

Reosevelt has carried New York by plurality estimated at 250,000, and he has sweet all of the so-called doubtful states into the Republican column Connecticut, New Jersey, West Virginia, Indiana, Wisconsin, Maryland and Delaware, all these commonwealths which were supposed to be wavering, have fallen in under the Republicam banner.

Late reports in the greater city show that Parker will have about 35,000 plurality in the city and that Herrick, run ning far ahead of the ticket, will have about 60,000.

In the Greater New York Parker's plurality was from 12,000 to 14,000 larger than Bryan's, but in the state, according to the late reports, his total vote fell 16,000 short of Bryan's. The small plurality for Parker in New York City caused great astonishment, the lowest preliminary anteelection estimate having figured that he would go to the Bronx with 100,000 or When the reports came in showing that he would lead Roosevelt by only 40,000, they were received with amazement. The Parker plurality in the city was 35,000 less than that given Herrick (Dem.) for governor.

There was a great surprise in the proportions of the vote for Higgins (Rep.) for governor, he running far ahead of the Odell vote in the counties and winning by about \$5,000. Herrick did not carry Albany, his home county, nor did Parker carry Ulster, in which he lives. NEW MEXICO NEWS SUMMARY

New Zuni Reservoir.

Work is rapidly progressing on the reservoir which the government is building on the Zuni Indian reservation in the western part of the territory, and when it is completed it will store 18,000 acre feet of water for the irrigation of 6,000 acres of additional farm lands, which will be tilled by the Zun Indians. W. W. Jones of San Marcial, who recently returned from there where he surveyed the western boundary of the reservation, which ends with the territorial line, said in an interview with a New Mexican reporter. that the government is doing much for the Zunis and it is evident that they appreciate it.

"The Zunis," said Mr. Jones, "unlike their neighbors, the Navajos, are not nomadically inclined, but stay on their farms from year to year, always adding to them and bringing them to a higher state of cultivation. They live in modern houses and farm on modern agricultural lines. There are many good sheep and cattle ranches on the reservation and the government extends ev ery aid and encouragement to them. "The new reservoir which is being built at a cost of about \$200,000, will

when completed, store the waters of the Rio Zuni and will give much more land to the Indians to cultivate. As it is, they are almost self-sustaining. There is a good school at Zuni and a new school building of stone is being erected at Black Rock, six miles from the agency. D. D. Graham, the agent, is well versed in Indian affairs, and is very popular with the leading members of the tribue. They are good farmers and are exceptionally well equipped. In a day's trip over the reservation, I saw sixty-three farm wagons, and their horses and harness were in splendid condition. There is no question but that the Zuni realizes that Uncle Sam is his best friend and that he does his best to use to his advantage what is furnished him, both in a material and an educational way."

Navahos Doing Wetler

The Navaho Indians, made famous in song and story, are rapidly becoming more advanced both in industrial and agricultural pursufts and in the course of a few years they will undoubtedly

lead in civilization the nations of the red man that have had earlier and betten opportunities than themselves. Reuben Perry, who for the past year has been the superintendent of the southern Navaho reservation, which includes the agency at Fort Defiance, the school at that place and the Little Water school at Tahatchi, while in the city yesterday gave a New Mexican reporter interesting information in regard to the rapid strides toward civilisation the Navaho nation as a whole is making.

Excellent evidence of the fact that the Navaho is rapidly and surely becoming assimilated," said Mr. Perry, 'is the fact that this year for the first time, the heads of families brought their children back to the schoels. In former years it was necessary to send government employes throughout the reservation to bring the children as up to recent times they did not look with favor on education for the young. Now they are satisfied that their children receive their preliminary education at the reservation schools and are then sent to other schools butside for the higher branches. It is becoming easier each year to send more away. Those we send away are considered superior scholars by the faculties of the outside schools and they are always willing to receive the Navaho pupils. At present there are some of the tribe at the schools at Santa Fe; at the Haskell Institute at Lawrence, Kansas; Grand Junction, Colorado; Albuquerque, New Mexico, Phoenix, Arisona, and River, side, California.

"In our reservation schools we teach the boys good and useful trades, such as carpentering, wagon-making, shoomaking, blacksmithing and also agri-cultural pursuits. The girls are taught general industrial work, such as sew ing and housekeeping? Recently the government has added a new course for the girls, that of blanket weaving, which, they realize, is a useful accomplishment as well as a good means of twellhood.

There are 12,000 Indians under my charge and I have wery little trouble with them, as they are law-abiding and peaceful. They are bard workers, good sheep men and are becoming good farmers. They are not disposed to re-main long in one place as they are of a nomadic disposition, but they are willing to work in certain lines.

Indian Mummy.

One of the most remarkable finds in the late history of Southwestern antiquities is recorded at Las Cruces. One day last week Dan Reed, at one time a well known cattleman near that place and now in business at El Paso, has the honor of the discovery. He has a mine six miles west of Las Cruces, across the Rio Grande, and one day lest week, while in the neighborhood of his claim; discovered a cave and out of curiosity started to explore it and was soon rewarded. He discovered within the cave the remains of an Indian, remarkable in that there had been no decay, but in the dry atmosphere of the region the body had become perfectly mummified. The fiesh had shrunken and dried on the skeleton and the weight of the body was evidently only a fraction of its normal weight. Another thing which was evident was the fact that the man had been murdered, for in the back there was a gaping wound, evidently made by a spear, which was found near by. On the breast there was a similar wound which had been made by the spear which almost, but not quite, came entirely through the man. He had clearly died in great agony, for he was lying on his back, but in his death struggle his head had been raised off the ground and his knees had been contracted until they almost touched his chin. The right hand had been pressed against the

thigh with such force that even now it can hardly be pulled away. He was evidently in war paint and had a full headdress of feathers. Trinkets were in his ears, which is shown by the fact that they were pierced, but they were either taken away by his murderers or time has decayed the strings with which they were tied and they have fallen out. Persons who are familiar with the type of Indians in that section say he was neither an Apache nor a Comanche.

Mr. Reed, after finding the body, took it to Las Cruces, with no further search of the cave. He expects to return there in a few days and will then examine the spot thoroughly.
