Denver to Boise City.

Colorado, Wyoming and Idaho Railroad Incorporated. Denver, Nov. 21.—Articles of incorporation have been filed with the secretary of state for the Denver, Wyoming and Idaho railroad. The capitalization is given at \$10,000,000, and on this basis the state gets a fee of \$3,030, one of the largest received by the secretary of state for many years.

World's Fair Guests Departed.

St. Louis, Nov. 19.—Two hundred and thirty-two Chinamen who have been connected with the World's fair at St. Louis, have departed on the night special cars over the Washakie on their way to San Francisco, whence they will sail for China.

THE EATON WILL.

Disposition of the Late Governor Eaton's Estate. Denver, Nov. 22.—A Greeley dispatch says: The will of Benjamin H. Eaton was filed in the County Court today without contest. The property covered by the will is valued at \$603,000, of which \$600,000 represents the realty and \$3,000 the personal property. The will was signed on May 11, 1904, and was witnessed by G. Law, A. F. Eaton, William Mayner and James W. McCrory.

Illinois Convict Identified as Murderer of Denver Policeman.

Denver, Nov. 22.—In cell No. 3, the strong room in the city jail, the Illinois convict, John Mahran, identified as Wellington C. Llewellyn, awaits trial on the charge of murdering Policeman Thomas Clifford and William Griffin in this city on the night of August 12, 1903. Mahran's identification was secured through the personal efforts of Chief of Police Delaney, who stated last night that there was no doubt in his mind that he was Llewellyn.

New Corporations.

Incorporation papers were filed at Santa Fe on the 8th inst. by the Cimarron Mountain Mining Company, capitalization \$2,000,000. The incorporators are Quincy A. Smith, George W. Stone, Charles C. Hopkins and Frank S. Porter of Lansing, Michigan. These are also directors in addition to the incorporators and Thomas D. Leib, of Michigan.

Reservoir Protests Withdrawn.

A Roswell dispatch says that the protests entered against the building of the Hondo reservoir, twelve miles from Roswell, by Frank G. Tracy, president of the Irrigation company of Carlsbad, and the Water Users' Association of Carlsbad, have been withdrawn.

Thomas R. Seals, a Santa Fe brakeman, was run down at Upham, a small station on the Rio Grande division, on the night of the 14th inst. Both legs were cut off and his body terribly mangled. He died within a couple of hours after the accident. Seals resided at San Marcial.

Oyama Advancing.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 21.—The Japanese around Man Ho are carefully feeling their way forward. They are pushing up reinforcement at Yinko. There is every indication that Field Marshal Oyama is gradually developing a big forward movement with the object of occupying Mukden.

Eight-Hour Day.

San Francisco, Nov. 22.—In the convention of the American Federation of Labor yesterday the fight between the Chicago Federation of Labor and the national organization, brought about by the question of trade autonomy, was patently settled by permitting Delegate William Schardt, president of the Chicago Federation of Labor, to have a seat and voice in the present convention, and directing President Gompers to go to Chicago within thirty days and endeavor to settle the dispute between the two big organizations. If this could not be effected, it was the sense of the convention that the Chicago body be permanently suspended from the American Federation of Labor.

Send me anywhere but to Denver.

He is alleged to have said to the Illinois state pardons board which paroled him in order that he might stand trial for the double murder in Denver. When told that he was to be taken to Denver it is said he began to tremble and in a voice shaking with fear he is said to have begged not to be brought to this city. Rather than come to Denver, he stated, he would be willing to return to the Jeffersonville prison in Indiana, to serve out a long balance of a fourteen-year sentence for murder. He was paroled from that penitentiary, although he is alleged to have once knocked down a guard while there. Mahran had steadfastly refused to talk on the murder here. In speaking of him last night, Chief of Police Delaney said: "I told him that without any personal feeling against him I believed from all the evidence in my possession that he was Wellington C. Llewellyn, the murderer. He didn't say he wasn't and he looked me straight in the eye."

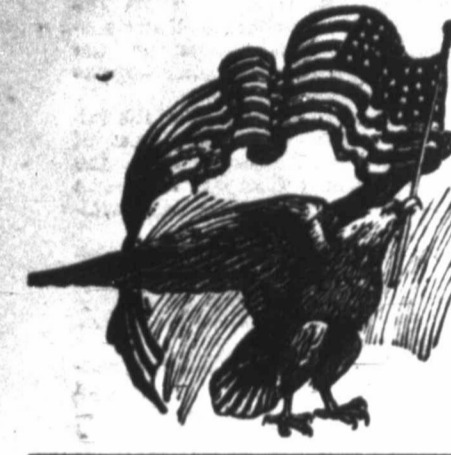

The Port Arthur newspaper, Novik, of November 12th, copies of which were brought to Che Foo by the Russian torpedo boat destroyer, Ratsorop, contains a romantic story of Hartena Korotkewitch, who, although a woman served valiantly in many fights at Port Arthur, until death closed her strange career.

She then donned masculine attire, and succeeded in reaching Port Arthur shortly before the landing of the Japanese on the peninsula of Liao Tung.

Finding her husband's regiment, she enlisted in it. She participated in numerous sorties and in the defense of the forts, and, although her sex was soon discovered, her record for bravery, tirelessness and attention to the wounded, and the excellent moral influence she exerted over the soldiers, who never swore in her presence, won her permission to remain in the ranks.

While fighting side by side with her husband the latter was wounded. His wife nursed him until the crisis in his case was passed, when she returned to the front, where she became messenger to Captain Gouzakofsky of the Thirteenth Regiment. In the performance of her duties as messenger she was often seen riding fearlessly from one position to another, seemingly unaffected by the bursting of shells or the din of battle.

On October 16th she visited the trenches with dispatches, when huge shells from the Japanese guns struck and destroyed the Russian position. Hartena Korotkewitch and eight others were instantly killed. They were buried in one grave with the Russian flag wrapped around Hartena's body.

The Novik concludes its story by saying:

Hartena Korotkewitch had won the respect and admiration, not only of the soldiers, but of the higher officers, and had shown all how to die nobly.

COSTLY GARDENS

OF THE ENGLISH MILLIONAIRES

More Than \$10,000,000 in the Aggregate Spent Annually for Labor Alone.

It has been said that there are a score of noblemen in the united kingdom who spend more every year on their gardens than would pay the official salaries of the entire Cabinet, and, extravagant as the statement may appear, it is well within the limits of the truth.

Further than this there are, on the best authority, more than 5,000 "seats of the mighty," or at least of the rich, the gardens of which cost their owners upward almost from \$2,500 a year, while there are as many more who spend between \$1,000 and \$2,500 for the maintenance. Of these 10,000 British gardens an annual sum estimated at over \$10,000,000 is spent for labor alone, and another round £1,000,000 at least goes in the purchase of seeds, plants and manure, and the general upkeep of the gardens and glass houses.

It is difficult and perhaps invidious to say which are the most costly gardens in Great Britain, but among them are certainly those of Trentham hall, Welbeck abbey, Lord Bute's gardens at Cardiff castle, the world-famous gardens of Chatsworth, and those of the Rothschilds, on which gold has been lavished like water.

One gets an impressive idea of the extent of such gardens as these when the kitchen garden at Welbeck covers 12 acres, that at Chatsworth, which grows stretch for a quarter of a mile and that at Stockton costs as much as \$50,000. When a millionaire sets his heart on making himself a lordly pleasure garden he reckons little of the cost.

In such gardens as these it is quite usual to employ as many as seventy or eighty men and boys, so that a Cabinet minister's yearly salary may easily go in wages alone.

It is said that there are 900 country houses in Great Britain, each of which employs a staff of over fifty men; of these 200 employ between eighty and 150, while sixty of them employ over 200, and the large majority of these male servants are gardeners of one kind or another.

In addition to the cost of labor there are repairs and alterations of houses, furnaces to be fed, walls built for fruit growing, nets for protection, tools to buy and replace, and often—the most costly of all—seeds and plants to furnish. Baron Schroder is credited with having spent \$200,000 on his collection of orchids, and Sir Trevor Lawrence with an expenditure of \$150,000.

Joseph Chamberlain has thirteen glass houses, containing, roughly, 6,000 plants, many of them of great value and gathered from almost every part of the earth where orchids are to be found. The plants are arranged in different houses according to the time of flowering, so that the succession of exquisite flowers never fails the whole year round. The number of plants number as well as its name, and it is said that Mr. Chamberlain knows every one of his floral pets.—Chicago Chronicle.
