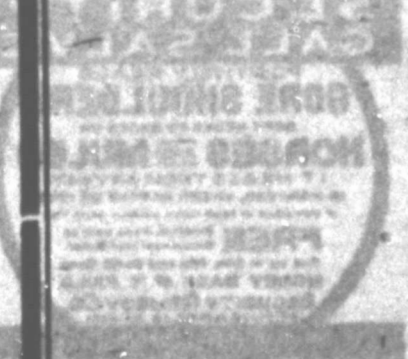

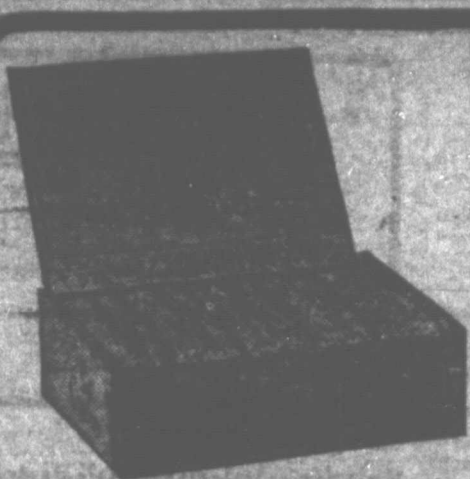

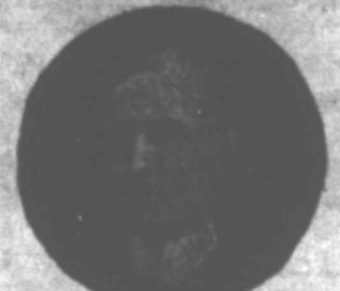

If there is a good crowd here tomorrow, the money donated so generously by our merchants for entertainment and amusement, will have been well spent. These entertainments given by the town people for their country friends are not merely money making schemes to attract a crowd and get their nickles, they are given to encourage outsiders to visit Portales and become better acquainted with her merchants and business men. Those who come should show their appreciation by acting in a gentlemanly manner, and frown on rowdies and rowdyism.

The Telepost Company is the latest opponent of the Telegraph Trust which is being financed by the Sterling Debenture Company of New York. It will begin its work over leased wires, but starts the construction of a trunk line from Boston to San Francisco at once. They claim that when it is completed they will send a 50 word message for 25c.

The Herald this week begins the publication of a series of New York letters, written by John B. Dunn, Jr., of the staff of the New York World. They will be fresh from Broadway, and will, we hope, be of interest to our readers.

New York Letter.

New York, July 1.—Wonders will never cease. The latest cause for the upheaval of public opinion, plebian as well as aristocratic, is the surprising news of the engagement of Jacob A. Riis, philanthropist, sociologist, friend of President Roosevelt, and whom the latter has called New York's most successful citizen, to his charming stenographer, Miss Mary Philips. Miss Philips is only twenty-five. Riis is on the shady side of fifty. The news that he is to marry again comes not only as a surprise but a shock to those who have read his "Making of an American", published in 1903, two years before the death of his first wife. In this book his tribute to the wife now dead is one of the purest, the most deeply touching of the simple utterances that have given him so wide a celebrity. It is the theme of a man who has proved himself a husband in heart as well as in name, who has found time amid his many activities to study the soul of the woman who has walked beside him. The woman he will marry, it is said, has grown into his companionship and love through his great loss. It is interesting to conjecture how this companion of his later years, the wife of half his years, will compare with the helpmeet of his early devotion, the mother of his grown up children.

Ask nine out of ten persons in the United States what they know about the Panama Canal and they will give you enough details to fill a book. Ask them about the Catskill Aqueduct and its three to one shot they won't even know where it is. As a matter of fact it is an undertaking almost as stupendous as Uncle Sam's Central "American

Ditch." It will cost \$162,000,000. It will be finished in twenty-two years. The Ashokan reservoir dam will be 220 feet high, the reservoir will have a water surface of 10,000 acres and a capacity of 120,000,000,000 gallons. A huge tunnel will carry 600,000,000 gallons daily to a depth of 700 feet, under the Hudson River and raise it a equal height and convey over the fifty-two miles to New York City. Only a few days ago Mayor McClellan formally opened the work by digging up a fragment of turf with a silver trowel near Cold Springs, New York, where the Aqueduct will be begun.

It took twelve trucks to cart \$100,000,000 across New York City from the Grand Central Station to the French Steamship pier yesterday. Few people realized that they were looking at a vast fortune when they watched the line of trucks loaded with 145 packing cases pass through the streets. Each truck was guarded by half a dozen men. The millions which were in negotiable bonds were in charge of the Adams Express Company and were consigned to a firm in Paris, France.

As far as eccentric men and women of this city can present at any time, day or night, the grandest galaxy of human marvels in existence. Young Oliver Weldon Barnes is the latest stellar attraction of the "Great White Way." Oliver is the twenty-two year old son of Colonel Barnes, builder of the famous horse-shoe curve on the Pennsylvania Railroad and is said to have a weak mouth and a happy disposition. By considerable effort he succeeds in spending for odds and ends \$500 a day. The White Light district hope, he will be able to keep it up. The other morning he entertained a foot-light favorite and cheerfully paid the bill of \$1,500. On another occasion he handed out \$500 as the price of a vaudeville performance in the back room of a cafe between the hours of 3 and 6 a. m. He keeps an automobile by the year and pays for it by the hour or at the rate of \$72 per day. Recently he became piqued because the management of the hotel at which he was stopping did not agree with his idea of how a guest should act. He called the rules and regulations foolish and silly. As a result together with Wilson Mizner, ex husband of Mrs. Yerkes, he has purchased the Hotel Rand at Forty-ninth and Broadway and intends to draw up a set of rules and regulations that will not interfere with his eccentric desires.
