ROGERS PERSUADES THE BOND HOLDERS TO WAIT PERIOD OF THREE YEARS

For Collection of Payments on the Irrigation Project

Will Buy Farmers Produce for the Coming Season

Mr. Rogers, general manager of the Portales Irrigation company, returned from Chicago Thursday of this week, where he had been to attend the meeting of the bondholders of the company. While there Mr. Rogers secured the signatures of the bondholders to the agreement covering the matter of moving forward for a period of three years all the payments on the principal of the outstanding bonds and also covering the matter of the plant operation for the coming season.

It has been practically certain for some time that this agreement would be consummated, but now that the agreement is properly signed there remains no obstacle in the way of the forward movement in matters pertaining to the irrigation company, and with the assurance that they will get water for their crops when they need it our farmers are certain to make 1912 the banner year for the Portales valley.

Already there are a number of new people coming in and some of the land under the project has changed hands at a figure unprecedented in the history of the valley. The people who are coming in now are merely the forerunners of the great tide of immigration that is sure to come in during the next year.

Mr. Rogers is now located permanently in his offices in the Citizens National bank building and will devote his entire time and attention to the affairs of the company, and to taking care of the selling movement for the lands that he has under contract for sale.

A representative of Crutchfield & Woolfolk, of Pittsburg Pennsylvania, expert produce marketers, is on the ground at the present time and is securing from our farmers agreements to plant cantaloupes the coming season, for which he desires to furnish the market. This will mean a great deal to this valley as it is well known that cantaloupes second to none (not excepting the famous Rocky Ford) can be grown here in great abundance and this will mean a very remunerative industry and we urge all the farmers who have not already done so to get in and see this party and let us get up a large acreage for the coming season.

The Residence of Wm. H. Hill Burns

Last Thursday morning the residence of William H. Hill, who lived about fourteen miles south of this city, was burned together with practically all the furniture. This property was valued at about one thousand five hundred dollars with seven hundred dollars insurance.

Sales Day Will be the First Monday in Each Month

The Portales Retailers and Business Men's association have arranged to give a sales day on the first Monday in each month, beginning on Monday, March 4th. They have arranged to offer the following prizes at this time:

First prize of \$8.00 in merchandise for the largest number of people brought from outside of town in a two horse wagon.

Second prize of \$4.00 in merchandise for the second largest load as stated above.

Third prize of \$5.00 in merchandise for the best pair of mules brought from outside of town and within the county.

Fourth prize of \$5.00 in merchandise for the best pair of horses brought from outside the town and within the county.

REVIVAL SERVICES AT FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH ARE VERY INTERESTING

Promises to be Best Revival Ever Held in Portales

Services Being Conducted By L. C. Wolfe of Okla.

Last Sunday there began in Portales what promises to be the best revival services ever held in the town. Rev. L. C. Wolfe, evangelist of the Home Board of the Southern Baptist Convention who is conducting the meetings, which are being held at three o'clock in the afternoon and seven o'clock at night, is a very remarkable man from many standpoints. He is first of all a superb man mentally, physically and spiritually and he is one of the profoundest students of the Word of God to be found anywhere. Added to these things also Mr. Wolfe has the advantages of nine years successful practice of law which has given him a knowledge of human nature possessed by few ministers and which enables him to bring the teaching of the Scriptures down to the practical affairs of life.

In addition also he is a natural expounder of the Word and one of the most striking, pointed and dramatic preachers we ever heard. Then, he has a distinct message, a message for better homes, cleaner citizenship, purer personal lives, more Christlikeness in the daily life of men and women, in a word, the clean conquering Christian life. And, he possesses the oratorical power and the prophetic passion for the righteousness of the kingdom of God which enables him to sweep an audience with cyclonic irresistence. He is one of the most courageous of men and surely one of the most practical so much so that even if there should be no gatherings from his meetings, it would be hard to overestimate the good that he will bring to any town or city. But he is a great soul-winner, especially is he great in winning men and women to God and to a high and noble standard of Christian living.

Next Sunday afternoon at 8 o'clock he will address a mass meeting for women, to which all the women and girls of the town are invited, and especially those affiliated with the clubs of the town. Meantime the services will go right along during all of this week and perhaps all of next week as well.

Mrs. Lem Chesher

Mrs. A. L. Chesher was born February 17, 1861, in Butler county, Kentucky, and died in Roswell, New Mexico, February 1, 1912. She professed faith in the Lord Jesus when a girl. She was united in marriage to Lem Chesher November 20, 1879, to whom seven children were born, six of whom survive the mother. With her husband she came to New Mexico nine years ago for the benefit of her health, and for a time was much improved. After two or three years she became worse again and has suffered greatly during the past five years. Upon the advice of physicians she was taken to Roswell for an operation, and this was done but she never rallied. The body was brought back to her home at Portales last Thursday and the funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon at the Presbyterian church, Rev. E. P. Alldredge officiating, the body being laid to rest in the Portales cemetery. She leaves a husband, six children and a great host of friends to try and emulate her many worthy and useful traits and beautiful character.

Order of Town Board

The board of town trustees held their regular meeting last Friday night with all members present. Various matters concerning the affairs of the town were discussed and steps are being taken to try and improve conditions in many respects. Upon the suggestion of N. Connally a list of committees were appointed to get the board in better shape to do business in a proper manner. The proposition was made that Dr. J. F. Garmany would act as health officer, so by vote of the board he was elected to fill this position. The sanitary committee consisting of N. Connally and A. B. Seay, with the assistance of the health officer, the town marshal and the scavenger, promise to try and enforce better sanitary regulations for the town. It was asked that the present sanitary ordinance be referred to the sanitary committee, the ordinance committee and the town attorney for revision. R. G. Bryant presented an ordinance relative to hogs and it was referred to the ordinance committee. By order of the board the town marshal was instructed to look after the collection of dog taxes and destroy all dogs on which the tax was not paid. The committee appointed to examine the fire hose and engine reported that they had examined the same and they were not in the best of condition, and recommended that a more suitable place be found to store the engine and hose. The committee was retained to see if a suitable place could be secured. This committee also reported that the missing taps to the fire plugs, which had been removed by some mischievous boys or persons, had been found and replaced. The financial committee reported that sufficient money had accrued to the town in the county treasury to pay all the bond interest due November 1st, and the same had been paid. The committee appointed to investigate the matter of repair in the sewer were instructed to ascertain whether the responsibility was on the town or the Public Service company and make and estimate as to the cost of the repair and report to the next meeting.

At a called meeting of the board held Wednesday night at the Commercial club rooms a large number of citizens of the town were present, including ladies. This meeting was called for the purpose of considering setting aside money from the school section fund so the school could be run for a full term of nine months which was strongly urged on the board by all citizens present. Consequently action was taken to set aside sufficient money out of the school section fund for this purpose, which will mean sufficient money to run the school three months of the term and amount to \$2,100.00.

Proclamation by Governor

A proclamation was issued last Monday by Governor William C. McDonald, setting aside February 17th as Child Welfare Day. It is the intention of the proclamation that every citizen give some thought to the welfare of children. A movement is under way for the day to be observed throughout the Union if the governors can be persuaded to set aside the day by proclamation.

A Proclamation by the Governor: Conservation in recent years has become the watchword of the American people. A nation-wide protest has swept over the land against the wanton waste and dissipation of our magnificent natural resources and it is needless to say that this campaign is producing splendid results. Now comes the National Congress of Mothers, an organization of highminded, noble women, and asks for the conservation of the child life.

All intelligent men and women will agree that upon the moral and physical welfare of the child depends the future prosperity of the nation. If it is important to conserve our mines, our forests, streams and agricultural land, it is infinitely more important to conserve the mites of humanity who are destined to receive, use and care for these resources in the years to come; if important to practice conservation, efficiency and economy in all departments of human service, it is vastly more important to practice these principles in their relation to the youth of today by giving careful attention to the needs physical mental and moral.

Therefore, in order to bring the subject officially before the people of New Mexico, and in compliance with the request of the National Congress of Mothers, I, William C. McDonald, Governor of the State of New Mexico, do hereby designate and proclaim, Saturday, February 17th, A. D. 1912, as Child Welfare Day in the State of New Mexico, and I earnestly recommend that every citizen of New Mexico shall on that day give some thought and effort to the needs of the children, who are far more valuable than all other resources, in order that we may promote and advance better opportunities for them and bring out the best that is within them. I recommend that child welfare work be conscientiously taken up by the people of our new state. Let us look to the welfare of the children, physical, mental, and moral and aid them towards a strong and independent manhood and womanhood.

The Irrigation Bulletin

This week The Herald completed ten thousand bulletins of four teen pages each for The Portales Irrigation company. This bulletin gives in detail yet briefly the many advantages of the Portales Valley over "all others," showing some scenes pertaining to agriculture as well as the great flow of water that protrudes from the discharge pipes of these enormous wells. This bulletin shows the advantage of a central electrical power plant, because of the labor being centralized the plant can be operated at the lowest cost and that it is much more satisfactory in every respect than the private system. It explains the fertility of the soil and what can be raised here under the irrigation system without a failure as has been the custom heretofore. Experts who have compared the soil of this valley with the soil of Roswell stated that it was a superior and that prices per acreage were cheaper. With these advantages existing, it is but a fact that the land is worth as much as that of Roswell, if not more, but because of it being cheaper with these advantages existing this proves a better investment for one who cares to live in the "sunshine state" and we are sure they will find no other better. This bulletin is put out for the purpose of advertising the sale of irrigated land under the project, not to make money for any real estate dealers but to get farmers here to build up the community and establish real homes.

There is only two thousand acres of the ten thousand under this project that will be placed on the market at the present time and under the salesmanship of Mr. A. A. Rogers this property will go quickly. He proposes to get some good farmers and to those that care to invest in this fertile land and be a partner in this enterprise, now is the time to get in on the ground floor.

Committee Meeting

A meeting of the Democratic state central committee has been called for Monday, February 12th at the Commercial club rooms in Albuquerque to select a time and place for holding a state convention to name delegates and alternates to the Democratic national convention in Baltimore June 25th. At this meeting also a new state chairman will be selected as the present chairman, Hon. A. A. Jones, has announced that he will file his resignation with the committee at this meeting. Although Mr. Jones has always brought results every time he has been connected with a campaign in New Mexico, he feels that he has served his time as chairman, and that some other Democrat should be selected for the place. He was chairman in the 1906 campaign as well as in the first state campaign just passed and achieved splendid results both times.

Governor McDonald has been in no hurry about announcing his appointees, but his action is generally supported especially if his plans are known. He is working on the theory that it is better to go slow and be sure that he is getting the best man for the place than to rush into arrangements that might not prove satisfactory in the end. There has been considerable talk that the Republican appointees would not turn over their offices but they found that this action did not meet with the approval of the Republican party, and it is now believed that no trouble will be experienced in this regard.

Canadian Emigration

In the hope of checking emigration of American to the Canadian northwest, important amendments to liberalize the public land laws were favorably reported on January the 24th by

Senator Smoot from the public lands committee.

The enforced term of residence on a homestead would be reduced from five years to three, and a homesteader would be permitted to absent himself from his cabin six months every year.

Senator Borah and others, who stand for liberalizing the laws, have declared in the senate that a very desirable class of American citizens were being driven to Canada at the rate of one million a year by the stringent land law.
