SELL PORTALES LANDS

Mr. Payne Says We Need **Practical Farmers**

Alfalfa Yields 30 Percent Net on Value of Acre

That Portales has the two essential things for a successful farming district, namely water and land, is the statement made by Mr. Payne of Hutchinson, Kansas.

Mr. Payne has been in the land business for nineteen years and has traveled over different sections of this country and says the water in this valley is as pure as any he has ever drank. He says that he only knows of one place where water is as good, and that is the southwestern part of Kansas where artesian water is used. The artesian water in Kansas, however is not better than the water here is one of his statements.

Saturday, after his arrival in the city he went out to the Battenfield farm and saw several others in that vicinity. He says that he saw four distinct kinds of land with alfalfa and he could see no material difference in the alfalfa. It all seems to be good land and will grow any thing under the sun he remarked. Mr. Payne has investigated soils of different kinds for a number of years and has been unable to find alkali or any other substance in the land that is a detriment to crops.

He says that he has never had very much experience in irrigated districts, but the one thing which struck him most forcibly and which he like the best of all irrigation methods is irrigation by pumping. You have the only sure shot at irrigating, he remarked, because you're not dependent on rivers or resevoirs for your water, consequently, the man who might be located a little nearer the main water supply can not cut you off.

Mr. Payne has formed an immigration company and has about twenty four workers. He is contemplating taking hold of the proposition here and get farmers. He said that in his eight years of experience in the immibusiness that the resident of a place hinder more than anyone else, and if a man does not know what valuable property this is, the people should buy his land and run him out.
