It now looks as if a long need ed enterprise will be opened up in Portales. Messrs. Brown and Taylor are now in the elty look ing over a site on which to locate a canning factory for next years interviewing the farmers with view of potting up a house for the storage of sweet potatoes. Tne potatoes will be held until some time in the winter when the price advances when they will be sold. There is no ques tion but that sweet potatoes wil keep if they are stored properly and farmers are takeing hold of the proposition reconizing tha they will recteve a targer profl on their crop
a part of it.
Messis, Brown and Taylor are expecting to store these potatoe this winter from this years crop. They also, exect wo begin ralse ing garden truck next spring on the market and for canning pur the ma
In an interview Saturday, Mr. Taylor informed a Herald repre-
senative that he was of the opinsenative chat he was of the opin pay well here as a great amount of beans, potatoes, beets as other material is raised here, a good deal of which is wasted. Before car load lots there is always a part which goes to waste or is
shipped by express to local markets. Then sometimes when che shipping season is on the
prices paid for the commodity is very low and the farmer realises duct. These vegetables may be canned, after the factory is built and can
Even if sweet potatoes ar housed and saved over all winter there are a great many smal market value because of their day be sorted out from potatoe ger ones and canned. In a can the difference betweon a large and small potato cannot be distiguished.

Every year some of the farm ers raise beets, more for an ex But as beets grow exceptionally well here they can becanned and sold at a goood profit.
The need of a canning factory will pe felt more next year than as all of the land that has bee sold this year will be under ac tive cultivation next spring and more food stuff will be raised consequently more will be wasted unless some preparatlon is made next spring for this canning fac tory.
The people of the citty and of this vieinity should encourage these men to put in the canning factory as it has been a thing long needed, and a uecessity
vhich we cannot do without any vent length of time.
