

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6. PROVIDING FOR AMENDMENT OF SEC TION (5) ARTICLE TWENTY-ONE (XXI) OF

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLA-TURE OF STATE OF NEW MEXICO-That Section Five (5) of Article Twenty-one (21) of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, to-wit;

"This state shall never enact any law restricting or abridging the right of suffrage on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude; and in compliance with the requirements of the said act of Congaess, it is hereby provided that ability to read, write, speak and understand the English language sufficiently well to conduct the duties of the office without the aid of an interpreter, shall be a necessary qualification for all state officers and members of the state leg-
