R. Darnell and H. B. Ryther, and H. B. Ryther and J. R. Darnell, are defendants, Numbered 817 on the Docket of said court, same being a suit by said board of commissioners to recover the overcharge made for publishing the tax lists for said county for the years 1908, 1909 and 1910; whereupon J. R. Darnell submitted a proposition in behalf of the Herald Printing Company that

he would agree to publish in the Portales Herald, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, published in Roosevelt County, New Mexico, the delinquent tax lists of Roosevelt County, for the years 1908, 1909 and 1910, in amounts of \$25.00 and above, which were required to be re-published, and the entire delinquent tax lists for the year 1911 at the rate of two-thirds of the legal rate for such publication, viz: fifteen and one-third cents per line, for the four insertions as required by law.

The said J. R. Darnell further offered in this connection that he would pay the sum of one thousand dollars to Roosevelt County on account of the matters embraced in the suit by said Board of Commissioners, above mentioned and execute a bill for the Commissioners herein, for said sum of money, same to be applied by said Roosevelt County in payment of the publication of the delinquent tax lists as above set forth at the rate therein mentioned.

Thereupon it was moved by Ed Johnson and seconded by D. K. Smith, that the proposition of J. R. Darnell be accepted, which motion was duly carried; and the publication of the said delinquent tax lists were ordered to be duly made on the 2nd day of January, 1913, in all respects as provided by law, in the Portales Herald, the official newspaper of said county of Roosevelt.

Whereas, it is further made the duty of said boards of county commissioners to give public notice of the object of the election, the officials to be voted for, questions to be voted on, the names of the candidates for each of the said offices, as the same are on file in the office of the county clerk and ex-officio recorder, and the post office address of each of the said candidates, and the place where the election is to be held in each precinct in each county; and

Whereas, it is required by said section 1, chapter 105, laws of 1909, that the said notice be inserted in daily newspapers six times prior to the day when the election is to be held, but when there is no daily newspaper published in such county, such notice may be inserted in weekly newspapers, in two issues thereof, prior to the date when the election is to be held; and

Therefore, the board of county commissioners of Roosevelt county, New Mexico, in session held at Portales, New Mexico, on the 19th day of October, A. D. 1912, have ordered as follows, to-wit:

That the object of the election which is to be held on the 5th day of November, A. D. 1912, as already proclaimed by the governor of the state, is to elect one representative in congress and three presidential electors and to vote, also, on a proposed amendment to the state constitution, as provided by joint resolution No. 6, passed by the first state legislature and filed in the office

MRS. WOODROW WILSON

Wife of the Democratic Presidential Nominee, Honorary President of the Woman's National Democratic League.



Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, wife of the new leader of Democracy and probable next mistress of the White House, is perhaps the most interesting woman in the United States today. This is inevitable—not because she wishes it, for she does not—and is as firm as a rock in her conviction that being the wife of a public man does not necessitate nor call for a woman's becoming a publicity seeker. She successfully resisted all appeals of photographers and interviewers until Mr. Wilson's nomination as Democratic candidate for the presidency was an fait accompli. This modesty is easily traced to her southern ancestry and training and is characteristic also of her distinguished husband.

She was born Ellen Louise Axson, daughter of a Presbyterian divine of Savannah, Ga., whose family, so far as he knows, is the only one of the name in America.

Like Mr. Wilson, she has one brother and one sister living, all in the same literary circle as the doctor and herself.

In this atmosphere of learning Mrs. Wilson could hardly be expected to be other than she is—widely read, broadminded and charitable, devoted to her home and the principles for which it stands.

She has marked ability as an artist, and it is said that a portrait painter of ability was spoiled when she married the young barrister who had then given up the practice of his profession to specialize on the subject that has made him a presidential nominee.

Mrs. Wilson's three daughters—Misses Margaret Woodrow Wilson, Jessie Woodrow Wilson and Eleanor Randolph Wilson—possess the mental characteristics of their father and their mother's artistic temperament, combined in such a way as to give zest to every moment of their lives and protection from the foibles of the world. They form, indeed, an ideal family circle, one that it would be well for every American household to emulate.

The Women's National Democratic League, of which Mrs. Woodrow Wilson and Mrs. Thomas R. Marshall, wives of the leading Democratic candidates, are honorary president and honorary vice-president respectively, and Mrs. John S. Crosby is president, has opened headquarters at 1123 Broadway, New York city, in charge of the corresponding secretary, Mrs. Stephen B. Ayres, wife of Congressman Ayres of New York.

The work being accomplished daily by Mrs. Ayres and her corps of stenographers and aids is not for the campaign moment only, but foundation building for the future of Democracy. It is the first strictly woman's national political movement to be organized in the United States and, as such, appeals to thinking women everywhere.

"It has not declared for or against the question of equal suffrage nor should it be expected to do so any more than it would discuss the questions of religion," said Mrs. Ayres from her post as "live wire" of the league. "We are simply good Democrats banded together for the greatest good to the greatest number of American housewives, who today are required to pay more in this country for American goods than they would have to pay for the same goods in a foreign land."

She is especially interested in the tariff on articles in constant feminine use and has developed into quite a speaker at the "housewives'" meetings of the tariff committee of the national Democratic committee.

Mrs. Thomas R. Marshall, wife of the vice-presidential nominee of the Democratic party, is a keen student of affairs and as the constant companion of her husband has had an exceptional opportunity of specializing on human nature. A very practical and far-reaching result of this peculiar interest in the larger family of the state—she has no children of her own—is found in the long list of humanitarian bills passed by the Indiana legislature during her husband's regime as governor. A bill to curtail child labor heads the list, which numbers twenty, and includes almost every legal correction for the immediate relief of labor, especially for that pertaining to women and children.

The Marshall home, like that of the Wilsons, is a home of books, and yet one does not feel "bookish" within its walls. On the contrary, one feels very much at home there the moment Mrs. Marshall appears upon the scene, and, if possible, more so when Mr. Marshall comes in.

They are such chums, this "tender-hearted" governor and his wife, and where one is the other is pretty sure to be found. They have traveled all over the country together, and if the Woman's National Democratic League has anything to do with it they will soon be going to Washington together.

Mrs. Marshall is honorary vice-president of the league and keenly interested in its work, not because it is part of the campaign, but because she recognizes the permanency of the movement to educate women in the principles of Democracy.

Mrs. Cone Johnson of Tyler, Tex., one of the vice-presidents of the Woman's National Wilson and Marshall organization and president of the Wilson and Marshall Woman's organization in Texas, is in New York, where she will remain during the rest of the presidential campaign in connection with the work of the national organization at the headquarters in the Fifth Avenue building. Mrs. Johnson came east with her husband, who is one of the most prominent politicians, most successful lawyers and most brilliant orators in Texas, to attend the Baltimore convention. Mr. Johnson was chairman of the Texas delegation which, as is well known, was solid for Governor Wilson throughout the famous Baltimore sessions. He will actively participate in the campaign, delivering a number of speeches for the ticket. Mrs. Johnson has been spending the summer in the east and will remain here to do all in her power for the advancement of the Democratic cause and the election of Wilson and Marshall.

Mrs. Johnson has done splendid work in her own state at the head of the organization of women which has been working with success in a well directed effort to raise funds for the Democratic cause and increase interest in the campaign. She was president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs and has for years been active in that organization. She was formerly president of the Texas division United Daughters of the Confederacy. She is a member of the board of regents of the College of Industrial Arts located at Denton, Tex. This board was the first in the west to open its doors to women.

Mrs. Johnson's presence will add material strength to the splendid headquarters of the national organization with which she is officially connected.

Proposed Bond Issue For Construction and Maintenance of State Highways in New Mexico as Provided in Chapter 58 of Acts of 1912

CHAPTER 58
AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS BY THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSTRUCTING AND MAINTAINING A SYSTEM OF STATE HIGHWAYS.
Amend. S. B. No. 161; Approved June 10, 1912.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. For the purpose of providing payment of the cost of the construction and maintenance of a system of state highways, the State of New Mexico is hereby authorized to incur an indebtedness in the manner provided by this Act, in the sum of five hundred thousand dollars.

Section 2. Immediately after the issue of the proclamation of the Governor as provided in Section 8 of this Act, the State Treasurer shall prepare five hundred suitable bonds of the State of New Mexico in the denomination of one thousand dollars each to be numbered from one to five hundred inclusively, and bear the date of July 1, 1913. The total issue of said bonds shall not exceed the sum of five hundred thousand dollars and they shall bear interest at the rate of four per cent per annum from the date of issuance thereof. Said bonds and the interest thereon shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of the present standard of value at the office of the State Treasurer, at the times and in the manner following, to-wit: the first twenty of said bonds shall be due and payable on the first day of January, 1919, and twenty of said bonds in consecutive numerical order shall be due and payable on the first day of July in each and every year thereafter until and including the first day of July, 1942. The interest accruing on all of said bonds that shall be sold shall be payable at the office of the Treasurer of the State or elsewhere on the first day of July and the first day of January of each and every year after sale of the same. The interest on all bonds issued and sold shall cease on the day of their maturity and the said bonds so issued and sold shall on the day of their maturity be paid as herein provided, and cancelled by the State Treasurer. All bonds remaining unsold shall at the date of maturity thereof be by the Treasurer of the

State cancelled and destroyed. All bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of this Act shall be signed by the Governor, countersigned by the Auditor and indorsed by the State Treasurer in office on the first day of July, 1913, and each of said bonds shall have the great seal of the State of New Mexico impressed thereon. The said bonds signed, countersigned, endorsed and sealed as herein provided, when sold shall be and constitute a valid and binding obligation upon the State of New Mexico, although the sale thereof be made at a date or dates after the persons so signing, countersigning and endorsing same shall have ceased to be the incumbents of their respective offices.

Section 3. Appended to each of said bonds there shall be interest coupons so attached that the same may be detached without injury to or mutilation of the bond to which same are attached. The said coupons shall be consecutively numbered and shall bear the lithographic signature of the State Treasurer. No interest shall be paid on any such bond for such time as may intervene between the date thereof and the date of sale of same, unless such accrued interest shall have been by the purchaser of said bond paid to the State at the time of such sale.

Expenses incurred by the Treasurer in the preparation of said bonds and in the advertising of the sale thereof, as in this Act provided, shall be paid by the State Highway Commission upon warrant to the State Treasurer on funds available in the State Road Fund.

Section 4. When the bonds authorized by this Act to be issued, shall have been signed, countersigned, endorsed and sealed as in this Act provided, the State Treasurer shall sell the same in such parcels and numbers as the Governor shall direct, to the highest bidder for cash. The Governor of the State shall issue such direction to the Treasurer immediately after being requested so to do through and by resolution duly adopted and passed by a majority vote of the State Highway Commission. Said resolution shall specify the amount of money which in the judgement of said Highway Commission shall be required at such time, and the Governor shall direct the Treasurer to sell such number of bonds as may be required to raise the amount of money so specified. Said bonds shall be sold in consecutive numerical order, commencing with the first twenty thereof. The

Treasurer shall not accept any bid which is less than the par value of the bond, plus the interest which has accrued thereon between the date of sale and the last preceding interest maturity date. The Treasurer, at the time and place fixed by him for said sale, may continue such sale as to the whole or any part of the bonds offered to such time and place as he may designate at the time of such continuance. Before offering any of such bonds for sale, the Treasurer shall detach therefrom all coupons which have matured or will mature before the date fixed for such sale. He shall publish notice of the time and place of sale in one of the newspapers published at Santa Fe, New Mexico, and in one newspaper published at Albuquerque, New Mexico, and in one newspaper published in each of the cities of New York, Chicago and Kansas City, once a week for four successive weeks next preceding the date fixed for such sale. In addition to the notice last above provided for, the Treasurer may give such further notice as he may deem advisable, but the expenses of such additional notice shall not exceed the sum of one hundred dollars for each sale so advertised. Immediately after such sale of bonds, the Treasurer shall pay into the state treasury and cause to be placed in the State Road Fund the total amount received for said bonds, except such amounts as may have been paid as accrued interest thereon. The moneys placed in the State Road Fund pursuant to the provisions of this section shall be used exclusively for the construction and maintenance of said system of state highways. Provided: that the expenditures of the proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds shall be annually apportioned among the several counties of the State upon the basis of the amount annually contributed by each county to the State Road Fund as proceeds of the 1-mill levy required by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Thirty-eighth Legislative Assembly of New Mexico.

Section 5. There is hereby appropriated from the Road Fund in the state treasury such sum annually as shall be necessary to pay the principal and the interest on the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of this Act, as said interest and principal become due and payable. The Treasurer shall, on the first day of January and on the first day of July of each year, transfer from the Road Fund to the Interest Fund such amount of the money by this Act appropriated as shall be required to pay accrued

interest on the bonds theretofore sold until the interest on all of such bonds so sold shall have been paid or shall have become due in accordance with the provisions of this Act. There is hereby created in the state treasury a fund to be known and designated as the State Highway Sinking Fund. The Treasurer of the State shall on the first day of January, 1919, and on the first day of January each and every year thereafter in which a parcel of the bonds sold pursuant to the provisions of this Act shall become due, transfer from the Road Fund of the state treasury to the said State Highway Sinking Fund such an amount of the moneys appropriated by this Act as may be required to pay the principal of the bonds so becoming due and payable in such years. Provided, however, that at any time when there shall be an insufficient amount in said Road Fund to pay the principal and interest on the bonds as aforesaid, then and in that event a special levy shall be made to provide for the payment of the said principal and interest as same become due and payable. It is hereby made the duty of all officers charged by law with any duty in regard to the levy and collection of said revenue to do and perform each and every act which shall be necessary to collect such additional sum.

Section 6. As the same becomes due, the principal of all of such bonds shall be paid from the State Highway Sinking Fund, and as the same becomes due, the interest on all bonds sold shall be paid from the Interest Fund. Both principal and interest shall be so paid upon warrants duly drawn by the Auditor upon the Treasurer, and the faith of the State of New Mexico is hereby pledged for the payment of the principal of said bonds so sold and the interest accruing thereon.

Section 7. This Act shall be submitted to the people of the State of New Mexico for their ratification at the next general election to be held in the month of November, 1912, and all ballots at said election shall have printed thereon and at the end thereof the words, "For the State Highway Bond Issue," and in a separate line under the same, the words "Against the State Highway Bond Issue." Opposite said lines there shall be a square in which the voters may make or stamp a cross to indicate whether they vote for or against said bond issue, and those voting for said bond issue shall do so by placing a cross

in the square opposite the words "For the State Highway Bond Issue." and those voting against the said bond issue shall do so by placing a cross in the square opposite the words "Against the Highway Bond Issue."

Section 8. The votes cast for and against said bond issue shall be counted, returned, canvassed and declared in the same manner and subject to the same rules as votes cast for state officers, and if it appears that this Act shall have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election aforesaid, then the same shall have effect as hereinbefore provided, and shall be irrevocable until the principle and interest of liabilities for the creation of which provision is herein made, shall be paid and discharged, and the Governor shall accordingly make proclamation thereof. But if a majority of the votes cast as aforesaid shall be against said bond issue then this Act shall be and become void.

Section 9. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of state to have this Act published once a week in one newspaper in each county, if one be published therein, throughout this state, for four weeks next preceding the general election to be held in the month of November 1912. The cost of publication shall be paid out of the Road Fund.

Section 10. This Act shall be known and cited as the State Highway Bond Act.

Section 11. All acts and parts of acts in conflict with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed.

Resolution for Enforcement of Gambling Ordinance.
At a meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Portales, N. M., held on Thursday, October 24th, 1912, the following Resolution was presented by the Mayor:

WHEREAS, the attention of the Town Board has been called to the fact that gambling games are being conducted in various places in the Town of Portales, and Whereas, the Town Board has been advised that the gamblers have determined to operate games of chance in our town, and have been advised by attorney that they have a legal right to do so, and, Whereas, Ordinance No. 34, passed and approved the 23rd day of June, 1911, prohibiting gaming and the operation of gaming in the Town of Portales, and which Ordinance is still in force and effect, having never been repealed, and, Whereas, it is the desire of this Town Board to give to the citizens of Portales a good, clean administration and prevent, so

far as in their power, any infraction of the law: It is the sense of the Town Board, that the town marshal shall proceed to enforce said Ordinance No. 34, and all other ordinances of the Town of Portales, N. M., and bring the offenders before the proper tribunal for punishment.

Upon motion of Mr. E. B. Hawkins, and seconded by Mr. D. Hardy, the Mayor instructed the Clerk to call the roll and record the vote. Those voting Aye were:

Proposed Amendment to Section 5, Article 22, of the Constitution of New Mexico.

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6.
PROVIDING FOR AMENDMENT OF SECTION (5) ARTICLE TWENTY-ONE (XXI) OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO.
H. Sub. S. J. R. No. 3. Filed May 29, 1912.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF STATE OF NEW MEXICO: That Section Five (5) of Article Twenty-one (21) of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, to-wit: "This state shall never enact any law restricting or abridging the right of suffrage on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude; and in compliance with the requirements of the said act of Congress, it is hereby provided that ability to read, write, speak and understand the English language sufficiently well to conduct the duties of the office without the aid of an interpreter, shall be a necessary qualification for all state officers and members of the state legislature." be, and the same hereby is amended, so that the same shall read as follows, to-wit:

ARTICLE XXI.
Section 5. This state shall never enact any law restricting or abridging the right of suffrage on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude.
