## Commissioners' Proceedings

Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners of Roosevelt County, New Mexico, at a call session thereof, held at the court house in Portales, New Mexico, on the 16th day of November, A. D. 1912.

### Present:

The resignation of D. Gardner as constable of precinct No. 10 received and accepted.

It is the order of the board that A. Vaughter, of Taiban, New Mexico, be, and he is hereby, appointed constable, to fill the unexpired term of Ed. Gardner in and for precinct No. 10; said appointment to be effective upon the said A. Vaughter filing a good and sufficient bond in the sum of \$400.00 with the clerk of this board.

## As to Taxes and Values

The greatest handicap on every community in this state is our system of under-valuation for taxable purposes. The rate in town, as can be seen in another column, is a total of \$8.25 for state, county, school and town, a rate truly frightening to the investor who has not had the system explained. Most of them do not take kindly to the idea after explanation, they not knowing when it will suit the powers that be to change the style of fiction. On an actual value rendition, the total would not run more than \$3.70 and would likely be as low as \$1.85. It is the net result of sectionalism, one community thus attempting to either cheat some other distant community or protect itself from the intermediate handlers of the coin who are supposedly acting in behalf of that far away district. The whole thing is a sham like the placing of a "trading value" on a piece of forty cent land whereby one smooth trader unloads his holdings for \$5 to \$10 an acre and the other does likewise, and some honest man gets stung later on—giving a knocker with a cause for his calamity howl. It is remarkable at the way values depreciate at the coming of the assessor, and yet that official cannot help himself—his guide being set by powers higher up. But land with "trading value" of \$100 usually appears on the tax roll as "grazing" at from .65 to \$1.50 and the "trading" improvements are certainly bum when seen on the tax lists. The smallest taxpayer usually makes the the loudest noise, while the fellow whose holdings are free by the \$200 exemption fraud howls loudest of all. There was a recent case of this in this county where the favored individual actually tried to present a bill to the county for \$160, which he lacked of making the amount of his exemption. All exemptions are unjust and so are all fictitious values that are placed on property, whether for protection against some other community or for fraud. Honesty is not only the best policy, but it is the BEST BUSINESS. Nobody and everybody is to blame for this system. Each one who underestimates his holdings is a party to the system unless he protests and attempts to secure a more equitable basis of reckoning and no one or firm can alone, help the matter. It must be done by concerted action. It is a system that can be changed without hurting anyone and its change would help every community in the state by bringing investors to locate, Ignorance and not guilt is what ails the body politic in this matter. Instead of \$6.00 to \$8.00 tax rates on a fifteen per cent basis, we should have a full value rendition, with a rate of from \$1.40 to \$2.80 for all purposes.
