## SILOS-DAIRIES- AND HOGS

They Come In The Order Mentioned and Should Be Studied By

Young and Old Alike If They Are Interested In Up-to-date Farming

Years of hard-earned experience have at last taught the New Mexico homesteader the policy wherein lies success on the dry-farm. Every thinking man on the claim now realizes that he cannot succeed by attempting to sell his farm produce direct, or in other words, to sell money crops. He now knows that in most of the years he can only raise feed. But that is sufficient. Give the feed to stock and the stock will give you the profits. That general statement outlines the secret of success on the dry-farm. Now let us turn to particulars.

The class of stock upon which you depend for income is the milk-cow. Use her milk in two ways. First and most important, separate the cream from that milk and ship it to the creamery. The people of South-eastern New Mexico have a choice of three markets. There are well established creameries at Albuquerque, Amarillo and Roswell. The price per pound for your butterfat is the price per pound of butter at Elgin, Illinois. It will vary from about 20 to 24 cents in summer and from about 27 to 31 cents during the winter months. Secondly, feed your skim milk to hogs.

In conjunction with dairying and hog raising the farmer must consider the following: He has got to have a silo. A silo is an under-ground or above ground department in which to store chopped feed [stalks and grain] and feed from during the winter months. There are two principal reasons for the silo on the dry farm. Ensilage or "silage," the feed taken from the silo, is to the milk-cow exactly as much and more than green grass is to her in the summer. Which means that your milk-cows will give the same flow of milk during the winter that she does in summer, providing of course that the same number of cows come fresh in the winter. And it may be mentioned here incidentally that the wise farmer has the greater part of his herd come fresh in December and January when butter fat is bringing 30 cents per pound and over. That policy means greater care of young calves, but results will warrant it and time is usually abundant in that part of the year.

Ensilage also makes good hog feed which with skim milk fills out his ration most satisfactorily.

If for no other reason, farmers should have silos because there exists no other method for so effectively saving the oftentimes "precious" feed. It is estimated that by storing feed in a silo 35 per cent more can be saved than by stacking in the field or barn lot.

There are other sources of revenue on the dry-farm besides cream and hogs. These are principally steer calves, mules and poultry.

In regard to mules. There is always a good market for the sturdy, disease-resisting mules. Therefore every farmer should not rest satisfied until he owns a pair of mares from which each year, after the first two of his beginning, he can sell a span of mules.

Of course it is needless to call any-one's attention to chickens, for practically every farmer has them. But do not let anyone undervalue their worth, for with the fresh meat and the nourishing egg that they produce they are a great factor in the attainment of independence. Also in their foraging they reduce the number of harmful plant parasites in field and garden.

Be a sticker and don't run just because you are not making as much money outright now as you think that you ought to.

**RIGHT CARE OF TEETH**  
MOST HIGHLY DESIRABLE POINT OF BEAUTY.

Increasing Daily Attention and Conscientious Visits to the Dentist Are Imperative if Good Looks Are to Be Preserved.

A good, firm white set of teeth is more to be desired than a rare string of pearls. Unfortunately, all cannot possess good teeth, but the few women who have a perfectly good white set of teeth should guard them as they would the finest jewels. On good authority, it may be stated that a bad stomach causes bad teeth, and if the stomach is not kept in good condition, no matter how strong the teeth may be, they cannot last.

Germs develop and live almost everywhere. When there is one bad tooth in the mouth, there is certain to be germs. One bad tooth not taken care of in time may lead to many visits to the dentist and possibly the loss of one or more teeth.

Some years back the dentist would be visited once a year, later on twice a year was considered sufficient, but now four times or every three months is deemed none too often to have the dentist look your teeth over. There may be a tiny cavity, so small, in fact, that it is revealed only when the dentist looks through his magnifying glass. But that cavity attended to in time will involve small cost, little pain, and result in the preservation of the tooth. Sometimes the dentist's examination may fail to reveal a small cavity way down near a root and if you yourself do not find it soon it will mean a good-sized filling when you next visit the dentist. Therefore, if longer than three months is allowed to elapse between the visits to the dentist it is easy to estimate the damage that may result to your teeth.

Much has been written and said concerning the care of the teeth, and in many instances the statements are exaggerated. One of them—that the condition of the teeth depends wholly on the care given them—is arbitrary and untrue. As a matter of cleanliness and a means of aiding the preservation and enhancing the beauty of the teeth, increasing daily attention should be given to them, but even under these ministrations teeth will decay, and their color and become useless, and it is not unusual to see rows of strong, white, sound-looking teeth that have never known brush or dentifrice.

Sound teeth are due to constitutional defects, unless the teeth have been abused by being made to serve as nutcrackers or having some equally abnormal task forced upon them. Their color, too, if dark, may result from the use of iron, as a medicine, or from an acid condition of the stomach, and all brushing, cleaning and polishing that may be given them will not restore them to their original whiteness.

There are also teeth which are of a waxy white or yellow ivory tint. The former have pearly, transparent edges, indicating a delicate constitution and like it are frail and doomed soon to decay. The latter are strong and generally belong to a person of vigorous constitution, but no amount of brushing or scouring will ever bleach them to whiteness that is not natural to them.

It is claimed by some that sweets are injurious to the teeth. Pure cane sugar candy or maple sugar will not corrode the teeth, even if one partake plentifully of these sweets. The teeth need work and exercise, and if properly used and not abused, whatever is good for the stomach and can be properly digested will not harm the teeth.

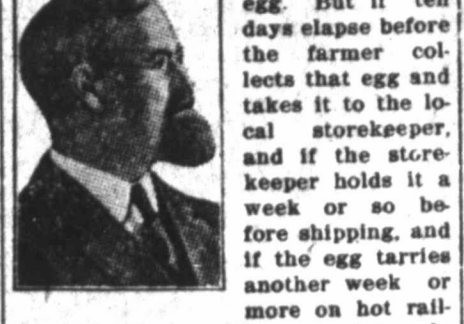
The real harm is done when crumbs are left in the teeth, especially over night. Then acid accumulates and slowly eats the enamel, and once this occurs there will soon be a cavity.

Never use a toothpick of any kind. For removing the crumbs between the teeth dental floss is better. It should be drawn between the teeth after eating and always before retiring at night. It is not necessary to use powder every day but it is necessary to brush the teeth morning and night with tepid water to which a pinch or two of borax has been added. This sweetens the breath and keeps the teeth clean. Two or three times a week brush them with powder, and once a month give them a general cleaning with pulverized pumice, rinsing the teeth thoroughly afterward.

A cleansing and refreshing tooth powder may be made with the following ingredients:  
Equal parts of precipitated chalk, powdered orris root, borax and powdered castile soap. Weigh these ingredients and, if a half pound or more, five cents worth of oil of wintergreen may be added. Then sift all through several times. When not using, keep closely covered.

If the practice of rinsing the teeth and mouth after eating were more generally observed, the teeth would last longer and dentists' bills would be fewer. Pour a pint of boiling water over a tablespoonful of bicarbonate of soda. When cool it may be used to rinse the teeth, as this destroys the accumulation of acid. Larger proportions may be mixed and kept handy for use. It takes but a moment to rinse the teeth, and this precaution helps in a large measure to preserve them.

**N. E. CHAPMAN, AN ADVOCATE OF FRESH EGGS**



N. E. Chapman, Advocate of Fresh Eggs—No Hen ever laid a bad egg. Nothing is more pure and innocent than a new-laid egg. But if ten days elapse before the farmer collects that egg and takes it to the local storekeeper, and if the storekeeper holds it a week or so before shipping, and if the egg carries another week or more on hot railroads, and if it is in transit before it reaches the city commission man who sells it to the corner grocer, is it really the grocer's fault if that egg doesn't appeal to the Ultimate Consumer as being quite as "Strictly Fresh Laid" as the placard proclaimed it to be? The annual egg production of the United States is estimated to be worth four hundred million dollars, and of that total two million dollars in all, go into the garbage can as unspeakable. Is it any wonder that the United States government is co-operating with the farmers to save those two expensive eggs? The most elaborate campaign for the conservation of the egg is that conducted in the state of Minnesota by Mr. N. E. Chapman of the extension staff of the agricultural college of the State University. His mission is to encourage the egg to get to market while it is fresh. He preaches the doctrine of fresh eggs to railroads, dealers, teachers, farmers, and country children. He traces each egg back to the source of its badness, and delivers an earnest lecture to the responsible party. Mr. Chapman glorifies the hen. He tells her story on an average of four times a day the year round. His best audiences are the children to whom the rosy gentleman in gold-bowed spectacles is known as "Uncle Norton." Last fall he ran a poultry class three days and nights in a country school—Woman's Home Companion.

**KING CHRISTIAN TURNS BICYCLE REPAIRER**



If Christian X. should lose his crown as King of Denmark, he could make a good living with a bicycle repair shop, and he has the promise of at least one customer.

While driving with his sons recently, the king ran down a cyclist with his carriage. Although the accident was due entirely to the carelessness of the bicycle rider, the king stopped the carriage and went to the assistance of the young man, whose machine was smashed. His majesty, who is very fond of cycling and who repairs his own machine, saw that he could put the broken bicycle in running order again. The young man seemed helpless, and stood looking on, with his hands in his pockets while the king worked for ten minutes repairing the damaged machine.

When the king had finished the work the rider asked him for his card, promising to patronize him whenever his machine needed repairs. As the rider stood with wide open mouth looking at the king's name engraved on the card, the royal party drove away.

**Long Ears a Bad Sign.**  
Twelve hundred teachers attending the session of the Cincinnati Teachers' Institute sat as if glued to their seats while they listened to a lecture by Dr. Arthur Holmes, psychologist at the University of Pennsylvania and expert in mental diseases, who declared that long, flaring ears were one of the indications of mental deficiency and that a great many teachers were mentally defective. The Cincinnati correspondent of the New York Times writes:

Dr. Holmes said that many men and women whom the world holds normal were really deficient. Persons with aquiline noses were rarely deficient, he asserted. Persons with long, slender hands of a smooth texture were most apt to lack energy and to be deficient mentally, he added.

**Thoughtful Wife.**  
Weary of life, a farmer went out to his barn and hanged himself. A little later his wife, entering the barn to feed some animals, saw her husband swinging from the rafters. Arguing that if, as it was natural to think, her husband intended to commit suicide, he would be exasperated by the frustration of his intention, she left the body as it was and went on with the work of the farm.

Several hours later in the evening, when her daughter came back from the fields, the woman told her what had happened. Mother and daughter deliberated for some time as to what ought to be done, and finally decided to inform the mayor. When that official came in haste and cut down the body life had been extinct for several hours.—London Telegraph.

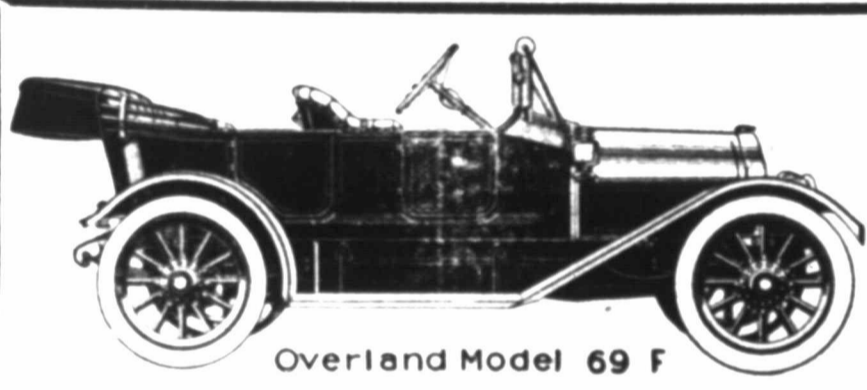

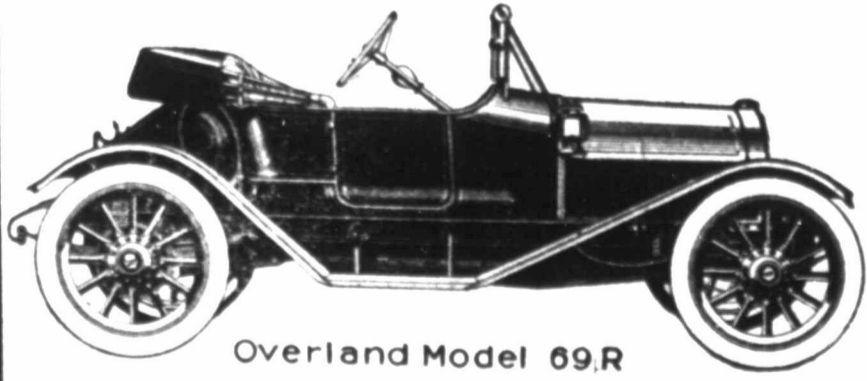
