HE SAYS THAT WITH ONLY THREE COWS THERE IS MONEY

Again one of the products of Texas and New Mexico has come to the front and is showing some of the old heads and old times of the country who say dry lands are no good that they are good and very good indeed. This product, so called, is named Slim Snell and Slim has certainly proven to a finish that the country surrounding Portales and all of Roosevelt county is the country for the small farmer and the, as Slim says, lazy farmer. And while we think of it this lazy proposition might suit some of the people who are sitting down saying that they can't make a living here.

Slim says that the dairy and stock business is it and that there is no two ways about it but what a man with twelve head of average grade New Mexico cows can support a family no matter how large and that a man who will breed his stock up and get them to the best grades will make a living and more from the same number of cows.

Now some of you may say that such things have been said before but that you are from Missouri and will have to be shown. That is just where the pretty part of the whole business is in that Slim can and has shown the people who live around him, and if you will talk to him you will see that he has shown you also. Here are some of the statements made by him and, which he says that if you don't believe them come out and he will show you. With a small amount of work he this year raised ninety acres of corn, kafir corn, maize and other dry land crops and he says that he has not tried to sell one penny's worth of any of the feed because he can feed it and make more out of it too easy. He says that he has ten head of horses and six head of cows along with several head of hogs that had been eating on this crop every since it has been old enough and that he was going to have feed left when the next

We have every advantage that the Texas people have and not near so many disadvantages. Just think of the value of the 18,000 birds and see what it means to the county to raise that many.

### FARMERS WANTED

WE HAVE ROOM FOR THEM AND MUST GET THEM

Should a limit be placed on the land that a man may own?

Should the government be allowed to take land over at some specified price and give the owner bonds in return? Would it be wise to tax unimproved land as much as the improved?

These are some of the things that are coming up before the Texas legislature this week and the states around that all have so much open land that is in the same condition that the Texas land is in, are eagerly watching the outcome.

Senator J. T. Robinson is the originator of the bill and says that he is going to push it to the finish when it comes up for a final hearing.

Of course we are of the same opinion of Mr. Robinson and why should we not be?

If the state of New Mexico would take over land in the state that is not now under development and sell the actual farmer with a family who wants to

make a home on it and then make him an advance of a few hundred dollars until he could get started the state of New Mexico would certainly blossom like a rose in a very few years and what is more we would be ahead of every other state in the nation along the line of work that we had done.

The government raises money for every improvement that it wants to make. The people very seldom object. Then why not now let the government buy all of the vacant land throughout eastern New Mexico where it has been proven that the people who can get a little start of cows and stock can easily make a good living. We give in this issue of the paper the experiences and statements of one young man here in twelve miles of Portales who is making money on a dry land farm and all that he has over any dry land farmer is that he could see a little farther ahead of him and begin to turn

The Wilson Page bill that is now before the national legislature is one which should interest all of the people of the state of New Mexico and every state along the line of vocational training. The bill is one to make an appropriation of funds for the national training of the domestic arts and kindred lines and thus save one state from going to the expense of training the young people for good teachers along these lines and then another state which has not trained them along the same lines coming in and bidding for the first states trained students and taking from her after the people have paid out their money to train them for use in their native state. A more concrete example of the matter would be to take our own state for instance and now that we are appropriating funds for the training of such teachers possibly the surrounding states that are not doing the same will, as soon as we have men and women trained for the purpose to teach the children coming up, come in and take from us the trained students that you and I have paid taxes to support. Keep your eye on this bill and see what becomes of it.

State game warden, T. C. de Baca states in a recent interview that he could take the surplus money of the game protection fund of the state and with \$3,000.00 of it put in streams and ponds of the state over 2,000,000 fingerlings. This means that in a few years the fish supply of the state would be twice or three times what it is at present so we say for our part let him have the money. The governor in his message to the legislature stated that he would like to see a hatchery started so here is his chance to make good what he has said, and we believe in him strong enough to think that we will the hatchery started next year at the outside. That is one step in the right direction for the new state and moves us another of the notches that we are behind some of our older sisters.

We appreciate you down here Mr. Woodrow and also Mrs. Suizer. Both of them have made the statements that in the White house and in the governor's mansion of New York there will be no inaugural balls nor other society events that will mean much money paid by the common people for these events and nothing gained by them. Further it shows to the common people such as we are that they are there for business and not for frivolity and if they are setting the example of saving for the public from the first they will assuredly save for them throughout the administration of both President-elect Wilson and Governor-elect Suizer.

And some one please tell us what is the trouble with the coming panic. The school apportionment for Roosevelt county for the month of January was the best in the history of the country for that month. It amounted to one dollar per capita for every school child in the county. The amount was \$3,033.00 and the scholastics are numbered at 3033 children. Nine rahs for the coming president and the coming prosperity that is showing on every corner.

The university of New Mexico is after another appropriation for her work and here we agree with them. Our university does not hold the rank that it should hold in the other universities of the land and since our schools mean and spell what our next generation will be, and since this is the highest of our schools we should spare neither money nor pains in its betterment.

Too bad about this coming panic. A recent issue of the Albuquerque paper makes a call for plumbers and bricklayers. It states in very bold type that they are at a premium and cannot be found. Very good, let the good work go on. That panic seems to be losing hold every day.

Go ahead, newspapermen, we are with you and will do all in our power, though this is not much, for you. You have made the right move in getting the organization in a state wide condition and you can count on us to be at the next meeting.

So from the administration which an age accords to a new thought, his average decree of enlightenment may be inferred that this apothegm of Jefferson and Grant should have been quoted and re-quoted "as it has," shows how profound has been the ignorance of the G.O.P. **RIGHT CARE OF TEETH**  
MOST HIGHLY DESIRABLE POINT OF BEAUTY.

Increasing Daily Attention and Consultations Visits to the Dentist Are Imperative if Good Looks Are to Be Preserved.

A good, firm white set of teeth is more to be desired than a rare string of pearls. Unfortunately, all cannot possess good teeth, but the few women who have a perfectly good white set of teeth should guard them as they would the finest jewels. On good authority, it may be stated that a bad stomach causes bad teeth, and if the stomach is not kept in good condition, no matter how strong the teeth may be, they cannot last.

Germs develop and live almost everywhere. When there is one bad tooth in the mouth, there is certain to be germs. One bad tooth not taken care of in time may lead to many visits to the dentist and possibly the loss of one or more teeth.

Some years back the dentist would be visited once a year, later on twice a year was considered sufficient, but now four times or every three months is deemed none too often to have the dentist look your teeth over. There may be a tiny cavity, so small, in fact, that it is revealed only when the dentist looks through his magnifying glass. But that cavity attended to in time will involve small cost, little pain, and result in the preservation of the tooth. Sometimes the dentist's examination may fail to reveal a small cavity way down near a root and if you yourself do not find it soon it will mean a good-sized filling when you next visit the dentist. Therefore, if longer than three months is allowed to elapse between the visits to the dentist it is easy to estimate the damage that may result to your teeth.

Much has been written and said concerning the care of the teeth, and in many instances the statements are extreme. One of them—that the condition of the teeth depends wholly on the care given them—is arbitrary and untrue. As a matter of cleanliness and means of aiding the preservation of teeth, the dentist's advice should be followed upon them, but even under these ministrations teeth will decay, lose their color and become useless, and it is not unusual to see rows of strong, white, sound-looking teeth that have never known brush or dentifrice.

Unsound teeth are due to constitutional defects, unless the teeth have been abused by being made to serve as nutcrackers or having some equally abnormal task forced upon them. Their color, too, if dark, may result from the use of iron as a medicine or from an acid condition of the stomach, and all brushing, cleaning and polishing that may be given them will not restore them to their original whiteness.

There are also teeth which are of a waxy white or yellow ivory tint. The former have nearly transparent edges, indicating a delicate constitution and like it are frail and doomed soon to decay. The latter are strong and generally belong to a person of vigorous constitution but no amount of brushing or scouring will ever bleach them to whiteness that is not natural to them.

It is claimed by some that sweets are injurious to the teeth. Pure cane sugar, candy or maple sugar will not corrode the teeth even if one partake plentifully of these sweets. The teeth need work and exercise, and if properly used and not abused, whatever is good for the stomach and can be properly digested will not harm the teeth.

The real harm is done when crumbs are left in the teeth, especially over night. Then acid accumulates and slowly eats the enamel, and once this occurs there will soon be a cavity.

Never use a toothpick of any kind. Per removing the crumbs between the teeth dental floss is better. It should be drawn between the teeth after eating and always before retiring at night. It is not necessary to use powder every day, but it is necessary to brush the teeth morning and night with tepid water to which a pinch or two of borax has been added. This sweetens the breath and keeps the teeth clean. Two or three times a week brush them with powder, and once a month give them a general cleaning with pulverized pumice, rinsing the teeth thoroughly afterward.

A cleansing and refreshing tooth powder may be made with the following ingredients:

Equal parts of precipitated chalk powdered corall root, berax and powdered castile soap. Weigh these ingredients, and if a half pound or more, five cents worth of oil of wintergreen may be added. Then sift all through several times. When not using, keep closely covered.

If the practice of rinsing the teeth and mouth after eating were more generally observed, the teeth would last longer and dentists' bills would be fewer. Pour a pint of boiling water over a tablespoonful of bicarbonate of soda. When cool is may be used to rinse the teeth, as this destroys the accumulation of acid. Larger proportions may be mixed and kept handy for use. It takes but a moment to rinse the teeth, and this precaution helps in a large measure to preserve them.

**N. E. CHAPMAN, AN ADVOCATE OF FRESH EGGS**

N. E. Chapman, Advocate of Fresh Eggs—No Hen ever laid a bad egg. Nothing is more pure and innocent than a new-laid egg. But if ten days elapse before the farmer collects that egg and takes it to the local storekeeper, and if the storekeeper holds it a week or so before shipping, and if the egg carries another week or more on hot rail-tray platforms and cars in leisurely transit before it reaches the city commission man who sells it to the corner grocer, is it really the grocer's fault if that egg doesn't appeal to the Ultimate Consumer as being quite as "Strictly Fresh Laid" as the placard produced by the United States is estimated to be worth four hundred million dollars, and of that total two eggs in every dozen, worth over sixty-six million dollars in all, go into the garbage can as unappealing. Is it any wonder that the United States government is co-operating with the farmers to save those two expensive eggs? The most elaborate campaign for the conservation of the egg is that conducted in the state of Minnesota by Mr. N. E. Chapman of the extension staff of the agricultural college of the State University. His mission is to encourage the egg to get to market while it is fresh. He preaches the doctrine of fresh eggs to railroads, dealers, teachers, farmers, and country children. He traces each bad egg to the source of its badness, and delivers an earnest lecture to the responsible party. Mr. Chapman glories in the hen. He tells her story on an average of four times a day the year round. His best audiences are the children to whom the rosy gentleman in gold-bowed spectacles is known as "Uncle Norton." Last fall he ran a poultry class three days and nights in a country school—Woman's Home Companion.



**French Beauty Specialists Introduced This Innovation, and It Has Been Eagerly Taken Up in This Country.**

If your skin is loose and flabby and you hesitate to massage it for fear of pushing or dragging it—which, by the way, is very harmful, especially when lines are apparent—then try the newer treatment of slapping the flesh.

French beauty specialists believe more in slapping and kneading the flesh than in massage, and judging from the patronage they receive, it is a real success. Of course, the slapping is a sort of massage, but as it is applied with the flat of the hand, there is no pushing, pulling or dragging of the skin, which is likely to occur with ordinary massage if one is not careful and skilled in the work.

In taking one of these treatments not long ago I was told that the skin and flesh responded more quickly to this kind of work and that almost any part of the body could be filled out in much less time than with the ordinary massage.

It certainly makes the blood which is dormant and sluggish come to life. The regular pat sends it tingling through the veins until it seems that the whole skin is aglow with fresh, warm blood. In the Turkish baths part of the treatment consists of slapping and kneading the entire body, and that is why one feels so good thereafter, because every bit of blood possible to reach has been set in motion.

**How to Slap Your Own Face.**  
First cleanse the face thoroughly. Then warm the skin either by holding hot cloths upon it or by steaming it. Next pat in some of your favorite cream or skin food. Allow all that will absorb and then with the flat of the hand slap firmly, yet severely, at the corners of the eyes and temples. The work of slapping is done best by alternating with the hands, using one and then the other. Next slap the cheeks from the sides of the nose. Work out over the jawbone and on to the neck. If what is known as the character lines, those which run from the nostril to the corners of the mouth are deep, then push the tongue beneath the line and slap well. When working about the eyes do so very gently. Use only the cushion of the second fingertip. Remember always that the eyes are sensitive to any hard or vigorous application, so one must be careful to do no harm to them. The forehead may be slapped vigorously with the palms, and two fingers will suffice to
