Panhandle section, figure on a percentage of the total loss. In other words, they figure if they lose a total of five per cent from cold weather and shortage of pasture they are doing well. A man with a thousand head of cattle feels well satisfied if he loses fifty head from these causes, but he apparently fails to take into consideration the shrinkage in young steers, which usually amount to about two hundred pounds each. At the market price it will readily be seen what this amounts to. For example a steer nine hundred pounds is allowed to run on the range when winter comes on and he loses say, one hundred and fifty pounds between that time and spring. At five cents a pound the present price, the loss is \$7.50. With a silabe ration, instead of a loss there would be a gain of say, one hundred and fifty pounds-a consefvative estimate—and thereby meaning a saving of \$15.00. On a herd of one thousand head shouid they be given the same treatment, which in all probability they are, the loss from shrinkage is \$7,500, to say nothing of the fifty head the cattle man calculates to lose. On the other hand if adequate provision is made for feeding silage the saving is \$15,000 less the cost of the silage; and it has been demons-

We will not be far wrong if we plant crops to supply the family table, others for the livestock. some to increase soil fertility and one or more as a specialty to bring in ready cash. Try a similar system on your farm this year.

Fatten the poor layers for the table and set the eggs only of those hens that are known to be good layers. If you have no good layers it is time correspond with the breeders.


