$\qquad$ of millet may under some condi
tions be put into the silo. but no data seem to be available that
would prove it to be imporant as
a silo crop. Although it could be grown to mix with kafir or
milo, nothing would be gained as it would not increase the vol
umeof the silage as would a leg uminous crop.
A great many by-products can
very profitably be used for silovery profitably be used for silo-
ing where they are available, and
someof them make very valu someof them make very valuable
additions to the ration when
properly preserved. Among

It has been tried to some extent in the silo, but the best that can be said for it is that it furnishes a means of subsistence
    to animals during a time of drought or scarcity of feed. Where a person has not enough of the other crops to fill his silo or can dig a very cheap silo in the ground, be can utilize quite a large amount of the thistles and if cut when green and juicy, before the thorns are hardened, he has done a great deal toward eradicating them from the farm, and at the same time has a feed
    that will maintain stock. Howver, there is very litile nourish ment in the thistle and a large amount of woody nibre, which makes them more or less unpal pack well in the silo and a great many small places of spoiled silage are likely to be found when feeding
