Roosevelt County Is on a More Solid Footing Than It Has Ever Been Before. Prospects Bright

Not only more money in the banks, but more fine stock in the country, more crops under irrigation and farmers better satisfied.

Roosevelt county is on the eve of the greatest advances that she has ever made in the history of her settlement.

There are more dairy cows in the county to-day that are actually bringing cold, hard cash into the hands of the farmer and thereby the business men, than ever before in the history of the county.

COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS MEET

The Matter of the Improvement of Roads Over the Entire County Was Taken Up and Discussed

THE ROAD LEADING SOUTH OF PORTALES TO BE WORKED

Work Will Commence Monday, June 23, If the Present Plans of Commissioners Are Carried Out

In an interview with the secretary of the board of road commissioners, T. J. Molinari, it was definitely found out that work would commence on the 23rd day of June on the road leading due south from Portales and the road which Mr. Molinari has been working for since the meeting of the county about two months ago.

At this meeting the sentiment of the representatives of the south country was that the road due south would do the most people the most good. Accordingly as soon as possible the matter was taken up with the road board and this is the result of their action.

The definite amount of money that will be expended on the road has not been determined but Mr. Wall from Elida, and chairman of the board will spend as much money on it as he thinks is the pro rata share for this one road. It is expected that he will carry it through to the railroad strip at least.

The secretary, Mr. Molinari stated that he would want ten mule teams at his store by noon of Monday, June the 23rd to go to work on the road. All those who contemplate having teams to let the board have will do well to see Mr. Molinari at once and let him know you have one of the ten he wants.

The board of regents, at a meeting held this week, appointed Dr. George E. Ladd of Oklahoma President of the New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts. Dr. Ladd will assume his duties on July first, succeeding Dr. W. E. Garrison, who has been president of the college since 1908.

Dr. Ladd is a graduate of Harvard, holding the degree of Ph. D. He served for ten years as director of the Missouri State School of Mines and for the last five years has been president of the Oklahoma State School of Mines at Wilburton, Oklahoma, where he now resides. He visited the College ten days ago and conferred with members of the board, and since that time has been visiting friends near Silver City. He has returned to Oklahoma to arrange his affairs there and will come back to the College to remain about the last of the month.

The College is considered fortunate to secure the services of so able an educator as Dr. Ladd has proven himself to be. He has taken a prominent part in the educational affairs of Missouri and Oklahoma for fifteen years and his moving to New Mexico is regarded as a notable gain to the State.
