DAIRY COW BUYERS ASSISTED BY SANTA FE

A Detailed Letter from Them Is Reproduced Below and It Will Be to the Interest of All to Read Same

THEY CLAIM GRADED COWS TO BE WORTH NOT OVER \$65.00

A Community Will Have to Work Together to Get Their Assistance and Anyone Interested Call Here

In order to meet the greatest need of many of the farmers along the Santa Fe lines, which is more and better milk cows, the agricultural department of that system will buy good milk cows outside of New Mexico and ship them in for farmers who can and will raise the money. No commission will be charged for this service, and the transportation and expenses of the agriculturists who do the buying, as well as their time, is donated by the company. The cost to the farmer will be the actual purchase price of the cow sworn to by affidavit in Kansas, Missouri or whatever place where purchase may be made, plus vaccination charges, dipping, feeding on trip the expenses of an experienced stockman [not his transportation] and the cow's share of freight charges on a car lot.

Good cows, worth the money, of whatever breed desired, will be located and selected by H. M. Bainer, head agriculturist of the department and H. C. McCowan, New Mexico field man, and an experienced dairy man. Mr. Strauss, president of the Crystal Cream company, an experienced stock man, will be sent for to aid in the final selection of the cows.

The probable cost of cows purchased in this way will be between \$50 and \$60 per head at the point where secured, and we estimate that a cost of about \$10 to \$11 per head, will cover the transportation and other items enumerated above. At present we are making a closer investigation into this matter and will be prepared to state the cost more definitely by the last of June or first of July. In the meantime, if this proposition looks good to the farmers in your community, and they desire cows, we suggest that you get them together at once and take some action. Having received communication from you that arrangements are under way, a representative of the Santa Fe agricultural department will be sent to your town to complete arrangements and attend to all necessary details.

The Santa Fe desires to act as agent in this for only those farmers who are recognizably worthy men and whose care of the cows and whose promptness in paying off debts incurred, will establish the confidence of bankers in this proposition as a profitable one on which to lend money. It is further preferred by the Santa Fe to perform this service for farmers who ship

their butter fat to a creamery, and farmers who are willing that the proceeds for at least 1-2 of the cream from cows purchased be paid direct to the lender of the money from the creamery. If the farmers consent to such an agreement, the banker should grant a lower rate of interest. It is very doubtful however, if banks in most of New Mexico towns can be induced to come down from their customary 12% unless more than one or two farmers considering the borrowing of money shall go together to the banks, or act together in a body. When lending money to buy stock the banker as a rule require that he be given the security of the cows bought and on as many more head of stock in addition. In the case of some individuals the banker will take as security one-half as many more in addition.

It must be understood that the Santa Fe railroad will assume no financial responsibility. If the farmers cannot secure suitable rates of interest, or will not pay 12 per cent rate, the services of the Santa Fe agriculturists must be confined to those who have ready money.

Care of Cows: The farmers must have plenty of winter feed and for this reason it is a good idea in the case of some communities to wait until a crop is pretty well assured. Also the farmer must be prepared to shelter cows to some extent at least, because the cows obtained from the east are not used to exposure. Farmers wanting imported Jersey cows had best be provided with a silo. A pamphlet containing instructions on the proper care and feeding of cows, will be furnished to all farmers receiving the cows.

Distribution of cows: in distributing the cows, when they arrive at a town, the method farest to all concerned, will be adopted. Where possible, each purchasing farmer's order will be filled before the cows are put on the car. When two men in one community have each ordered five Durham milkers, we believe the fair thing to do is to buy ten Durham milkers and to allow each man to alternate in the choosing of the cows. Or if one man wants the five higher priced cows, and the one wants the five lower priced cows, should the price vary, the distribution may be managed in that way. In fact any plan of distribution satisfactory to the parties concerned will be used.

Notice to Normal Patrons

Word has just been received by the county superintendent of education, Mrs. S. F. Culbertson, that the matter of paying the third grade teachers \$15.00 under certain conditions, these conditions being well known to the teachers without stating here, was now under consideration for this term of the county normals and that the matter seemed to be unsettled so far.

In the State Constitution there was an article in regard to the money that has heretofore been used for this purpose and the attorney general of the state has passed on the article and says that only in one way can the matter be determined, by bringing it into the courts.

Accordingly all teachers qualifying for the payment will be issued vouchers and the same can be turned in to the state auditor and a test case will then be given the courts. If the courts decide to use the money for the payment of the \$15.00 to all teachers deserving same, their vouchers will be paid and if the court rules against the payment of the money, the voucher will be worthless.

Four weeks attendance at the institute, if all other requirements are carried out, will, as usual, exempt the student from payment of an institute fee.

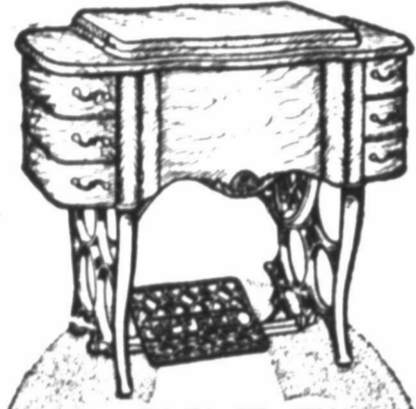

Notice to Normal Patrons

Word has just been received by the county superintendent of education, Mrs. S. F. Culberson, that the matter of paying the third grade teachers \$15.00 under certain conditions, these conditions being well known to the teachers without stating here, was now under consideration for this term of the county normals and that the matter seemed to be unsettled so far.

In the State Constitution there was an article in regard to the money that has heretofore been used for this purpose and the attorney general of the state has passed on the article and says that only in one way can the matter be determined, by bringing it into the courts.

Accordingly all teachers qualifying for the payment will be issued vouchers and the same can be turned in to the state auditor and a test case will then be given the courts. If the courts decide to use the money for the payment of the \$15.00 to all teachers deserving same, their vouchers will be paid and if the court rules against the payment of the money, the voucher will be worthless.

Four weeks attendance at the institute, if all other requirements are carried out, will, as usual, exempt the student from payment of an institute fee.
