



FARMERS DOES NOT DEMAND CLASS CREDIT LEGISLATION.

One thing is clear, the schemes that are multiplying which conceive the farmer to be a mendicant and a subject for unique and special legislation may be at once condemned. The American farmer does not need or desire to be classed with those foreign people who are just emerging from a condition of serfdom and tutelage. He asks'no opportunity that is not afforded to every American citizen; he asks for no legislation which shall give him credit on easier terms than his brother mechanic or his professional friend or his merchant may secore it. But he does ask to be assisted in creating conditions and machinery which shall enable him on a similar credit foundation to secure his money at the same rates as any other class in the community. This, and this alone, it seems to me is all that he asks and is nothing less than he deserves. I am not impressed with the wisdom and the justice of proposals that would take the money of all the people through bonds or othes devices and lend it to the farmers or to any other class at a rate of interest lower than the economic conditions would normally require and at a rate of interest lower than that at which other classes are securing their capital. This would be special legislation of a particularly odious type, and no new excursions in this direction would



The matter of county high schools omes up under the provisions of Chapter 57 of the laws of 1912, as amended by Chapter 20 of the laws of 1913. As to effect upon this election, however, the provisians of the laws of 1913 only go to the establishment of more than one school in the county and the apportionment of the funds. In other words, if such schools should be established, under the provisions of the law, then there would be an additional assessment of not to exceed two mills, which fund would be proportionately divided between the schools established in accordance with the number of high school students in attendance upon each of such schools. This levy might be less than two mills, depending of course upon the number of students to be accommodated and the expense incident to the same. The Board of Commissioners would make the levy in such manner as is provided by the law.





For more than 400 years the vision of a canal across the Isthmus Panama has fired the imagination of the world. The vision became a reality on October 10, 1913, when Pr dent Woodrow Wilson, in the White House at Washington, pressed a button which sent the electric current 2,000 miles to explode 40 tons of dynamite which blew up the last barrier to a free waterway across the isthmus,

"Gamboa's busted!" exclaimed the President, as he pressed the telegraph key. The casualness of his remark was a tabute to the engineers of the United States army, to whom the digging of the canal has been simply "another job" in the routine of their regular work, and one that called for no brass bands or special ceremonies to glorify it. With the same simplicity, the first vessel to pass through the famous Culebra Cut, after the breaking of the Gamboa dike had let in the water, was an ordinary rowboat, while a humble but useful tugboat was the first craft of any kind to make the passage through the great Gatun

Miss ssippi County Replaces Cotton With Clover, and Profits Many Ways.

Alfalfa has replaced cotton on fitteen thousan acres of land in Noxu-bee county, Miss., in the last five years, according to figures compiled




