TAKES FIRST PREMIUMS AT BIG POULTRY SHOW

Portales Fanciers Capture a Big Number of First Prizes in Competition With Other Poultrymen

THE BEST CHICKENS IN THE STATE ARE IN THIS VALLEY

Chickens From Portales Took Premiums at Carlsbad Over First Prize Winners At The State Fair

"We told you so." Last week we said that Dr. J. L. Reid was going down to the poultry show at Carlsbad and that he would bring back a bunch of premiums. Well that is precisely what he did. It's most a shame the way he did cop the prizes. The only explanation is; the poultry from the Portales Valley, like most everything else, is just a little better.

Here are the prizes. Look them over. Aint they dandys?

For the best pen in the show, a ten and three-fourths inch, gold lined silver cup.

Best male bird, gold lined silver cup, nine inches in height.

Best Rhode Island Red male, gold leg band.

Best display of poultry, \$32.00 incubator.

For the exhibitor showing the largest variety of standard bred fowls, \$5.00. Dr. Reid and W.P. Turner, of Roswell, tied for this premium, hence each received \$2.50.

Best parti-colored birds, \$5.00 in gold.

In addition to the above prizes, it was recognized, that Dr. Reid had the best display of poultry of any member of the association.

It should be remembered that

the Silver City breeders were at Carlsbad with 19 of their S. C. Reds, the birds that took first prizes at the state poultry association at Albuquerque. Also R. E. Thomas, of Albuquerque, was there with the rose comb Reds with which he took prizes at Albuquerque. Reid's birds took the prize over these, which simply means that he has the best Reds in the entire state of New Mexico.

There were 90 Reds in the show and 300 chickens all told.

Other Portales fanciers were represented at the Carlsbad show and took some coveted prizes.

Mrs. W. E. Lindsay, with her White Rocks, took first and second premium on her hens, and first and second with her pullets.

Walter Crow, with his S. C. White Leghorns, took first prize on hens, second on pens and third on pullets.

Dr. Reid, with his black Monarcas, took first and second prize on pullets, second on hens, second on cockerels, and first on pen. With his Reds, he took first on pullets, first on cockerel, second on hens, and first, second, third and fourth on pens.

Relic of Mexican War

City of Mexico, February 5, 1848.

Dear Sir,

It has become my unpleasant duty to inform you of the death of your son, Silas, who died on the second inst. and was buried on the third in the honors of war. He took sick some time after he got here and took medicine from the United States surgeon. He lingered some ten days in the company and getting no better the doctor had him taken to the hospital where they had beds to lye on. He was very well attended to by two of our company who were appointed to wait on all the sick of our company, but all efforts to save him were unavailable, he got weaker all the time and when he died he was poor. He told me three or four days before his death that he was going to die, and he requested me to write to you after his death, he was not willing to die, he said if he was at home he would get well. He requested me to let you know that he was well attended to, but he said there were not enough waiters to attend to all as they ought to be. He willed what money he had to Ames Evans, H. I. Meece. Meece is unwell and is in the hospital, Evans is well. Silas also requested me to write to his Uncle Owen with you, and give him his last respects, although he is no more, you have the consolation to know from me that his conduct while he was alive was gentlemanly, manly and soldierlike. He was sober and civil, and always willing to do his duty. So I wish his bereaved friends to console themselves when they reflect that he died in the service of his country. While we lament his loss to the company, I deeply sympathize with his friends at home, I am yours with much respect,

County High Schools

Editor Portales Herald, Dear Sir:

We the undersigned board of directors of school district number 4 wish to express our view of the proposed county high schools. We are in favor of better schools, but will it make our rural schools any better to vote increased county indebtedness to the amount of \$25,000 to \$30,000 to be paid eventually by taxation? In the majority of the school districts at present we can only have five months school. Comparing our county with those of other states where county high schools exist, we find that we have but little more than half as many months of school as they have in the rural districts. Thus practically taking double the number of years in our district schools to prepare to enter a county high school. When we can have eight or nine months school in every rural district in Roosevelt county, then it is time to consider one county high school centrally located.

An Open Letter to the Telephone Using Public

Denver, Col., November 30, 1913

The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company, in the consideration of its future development, recognizes that its highest interests as a public utility lie in establishing the closest and most friendly relationship with the public generally, and with its patrons in particular; therefore, it is the purpose of The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company, through this announcement, to inaugurate what may be termed an advertising educational series of articles, both in the newspapers, and in the form of letters to its customers. It is our hope that this campaign may mark a new era in the relation of public utility corporations to the public they serve. We want this education to work both ways—that the public may learn the truth about us, and that we may learn how the public regard us, and how we may fairly and efficiently serve the public—in other words, what is just and right to us and to the people, and to convince the public that we will voluntarily remedy any wrongs we are doing, if pointed out to us.

We shall show you our financial affairs, frankly and freely. It so happens that our financing has been of such a nature that it is easy for us to clearly show to you this side of our affairs. What we mean by this is, that we have absolutely no water in our stock; we have no bonds, nor any preferred stock, and no mortgage of any kind upon which to pay fixed charges. We have more invested in our plant at its present replacement value than our issue of common stock, and we have no other stock issued than the common stock. There are no wheels within wheels, no companies within companies, to absorb profits. We finance ourselves from year to year by selling our common stock to the people, at not less than par, in the states in which we operate.

When we tell you the story of our financing, we will prove to you that there never have been any fortunes, large or small, made out of the manipulation of our stock—in other words, large or small, made out of our stock in connection with The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company or its predecessors. The stock never has had any speculative value; it has been, and is now, simply a safe investment.

There is a great misunderstanding upon the part of the public as to this side of our business. Persons with ulterior motives, striving for office and newspapers wishing to give startling news (see note below) frequently publish stories of how rich certain officials of our company are. Right now, this is being done in connection with the new revenue tax. We suppose these stories grow out of the belief of certain of the public that the executive officials of our company own the entire plant. It is absurd, for these executive officials of our company are merely trustees of the property, for the stockholders, and none of them are rich men, nor have they a very heavy holding of the stock. It is true that certain reputed rich men have large holdings of the stock of our company—some of them being on our Board of Directors—but not one of them has made any money whatsoever out of dealing in our stock. They have all paid dollar for dollar, in cash, at and smear and dent. Mountain climb-

par, into the treasury of our company, for every share they hold, and they have simply come into our company because they believed it to be a safe investment.

There is, too, upon the part of the public, a belief that the company is largely engaged in politics. We imagine this feeling is caused by the fact that in the past, simply from the standpoint of self-preservation, certain corporations were almost compelled to be in politics; but in these days when the tendency is to place all corporations and trust affairs into the hands of a central body, such as the Interstate Commerce Commission and local state commissions, etc., to deal with the conduct of businesses such as ours, being in politics, as believed by the public, would be a foolish thing and entirely unnecessary. This is therefore, to state emphatically that we are not, either directly or indirectly, in politics, in any way, shape or manner, and shall not be.

We are going to attempt to give you the entire story as to our rates. We have been told, when stating to some of the public that we proposed starting a campaign like this, that our efforts would be futile; that our subscribers would turn out to be selfish and only look toward the end of getting as cheap telephone rates as possible. We do not believe this. We believe that the great majority of the public are inclined to be fair, and that it is not so much the question of what our telephone rates are as it is that when we make a statement regarding them, and show our true financing, that we shall be honest, and that the public shall know that we are honest. That when we make a statement as to our profits and earnings, showing just where the dollar that our subscribers pays us goes, the public may know that we are not trying to deceive them or keep anything back that should be shown. When we honestly do this and our position seems to be just and right, we believe that the fairness of the public will sustain us.

We are going to set forth the inherent difficulties of giving universal telephone service. These articles and letters are not to be a piece of special pleading or adroit use of words, but a clear, business-like setting forth of facts. We hope, before we get through, both ourselves and the public will understand each other better. There is at least no harm to be done by trying to accomplish this desired result.

It is our aim to educate, please and satisfy the public and to be educated ourselves. It seems to us that every corporation has the right of self-defense, the same as an individual. The public has the same right. Listen to our defense and we will listen to yours. No problem has ever been harder for us than just how we were going to let the public know truly about us, but we believe that no problem was ever more important to both. If we really can make you feel that you are a partner in our business, we shall have accomplished much. A large part of the problem will be solved, if we can only bring the public, through education, to a full understanding that there is a mutual dependence between the public service corporations and the public, and that public prosperity depends largely upon

the utilities that bring them in contact with each other, and that the more nearly perfect in efficiency and sufficiency the utilities serving the public are, the more prosperity, comforts and conveniences the public will enjoy.

We believe our story is an interesting one, and we hope that everyone will read it.

Note.—As an instance of the kind of startling news which newspapers sometimes publish, we want to call attention to recent articles in the newspapers headed, "United States Government Calls Upon Two Girl Steenoographers to Tell Where They Got Two Million Dollars to Form the Corporation Securities and Investment Company." Then the articles went on to say that this Corporation Securities and Investment Company was a scheme of the Telephone Company to further its purpose of monopolizing telephone companies, etc.

The truth is that our company has been met with a strong feeling in the State of Montana—well-nigh universal—that something should be done to relieve the citizens of that state, of two telephone systems. Public meetings have been held, and votes taken, that the telephones of one or the other of the systems should be thrown out. Resolutions and letters have been submitted to us, and we have started out to see what we could do to relieve the citizens of that state of this burden.

We found that the Independent Interests operating there also operated in Spokane, in the State of Washington, and in northern Idaho, and that the Independent Interests doing business in Montana could not be bought, or sold, so as to at least cover the property in Montana, but that the purchase must include their property in the states of Idaho and Washington. The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company does not operate in either of these sections, and, therefore, is not responsible for telephone conditions there, nor does it wish to operate there, but we felt we must meet the situation in Montana, and so, in order to be in a position to either buy or sell, from or to, the Independent Interests in Montana, there was formed this Corporation Securities and Investment Company, as a corporate company, to enter into negotiations with the Independent Interests in Montana, which negotiations are now in progress, and, if possible, to buy these Independent Interests in Montana, northern Idaho and Washington, and then in the end, if that purpose was accomplished, the Corporation Securities and Investment Company should sell to The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company the portion of the Independent plants located in Montana, and sell to others the portion of these Independent plants existing in northern Idaho and Washington.

We explain this to the public may know that in the above Foreword, where we say "there is no company within a company, or wheels within wheels," we are speaking absolutely truly, and also that this Corporation Securities and Investment Company, which was so freely advertised by the articles in the newspaper referred to, is absolutely a legitimate and proper company and organized for the specific purposes stated.

Some Interesting Facts About the Portales Valley

The Portales Valley is located in Eastern New Mexico, Roosevelt county. Portales is the county seat. Roosevelt county, joins Texas on the west. There are approximately 200,000 acres of irrigable land in the Valley.

This is our Valley and we want you to share it with us and help us to develop it.

Land--The soil of the Portales Valley is an alluvial fill or silt (made soil) deposited by surface flows or rivers, and is very rich and productive. It contains sand in sufficient quantities to make its cultivation produce the highest results for a remarkably small amount of work, or, in other words, it is easily farmed or handled; it will not cake or bake after irrigation. The top soil is of sufficient density to carry the irrigating water through ditches to the proper places, and the under soil is porous and open enough to prevent "souring" the land, as is frequently found in irrigated districts. Another thing of vital importance is, the water is positively free from alkali and other injurious substances to plant and animal life.

According to government standard reports the rainfall in 1912, was 15.07 inches and up to December 1, 1913 it was 18.09. And it should be remembered that most of our rainfall is during the crop growing season.

Cost of Pumping--Alfalfa being one of our staple crops and taking more water than any other plant to mature, the four to five crops grown yearly, will be taken as an example of the maximum cost of pumping.

It has been shown by experience that to grow the above crops of alfalfa will require about 2½ acre feet of water per season and the cost is approximately from four to five dollars per acre average.

Other crops require much less water, and will cost from \$1.50 to \$3.00 per acre, owing to the amount of rainfall.

The following crops do well: Alfalfa, cantaloupes, onions, sweet potatoes, cabbage, tomatoes, strawberries, celery, cucumbers, watermelons, casaba melons, cauliflowers, peppers, beans, Indian corn kaffir corn, maize, millet, all vegetables; fruits, apples, peaches, pears, plums, cherries, grapes, currants, blackberries, dewberries, raspberries, gooseberries, etc.

Climate--The Portales Valley, located 4,000 feet above sea level, with a light, dry air, eliminates oppressive heat in summer time, and the fact that the Valley is so nearly in the south gives us mild winters. Election Proclamation

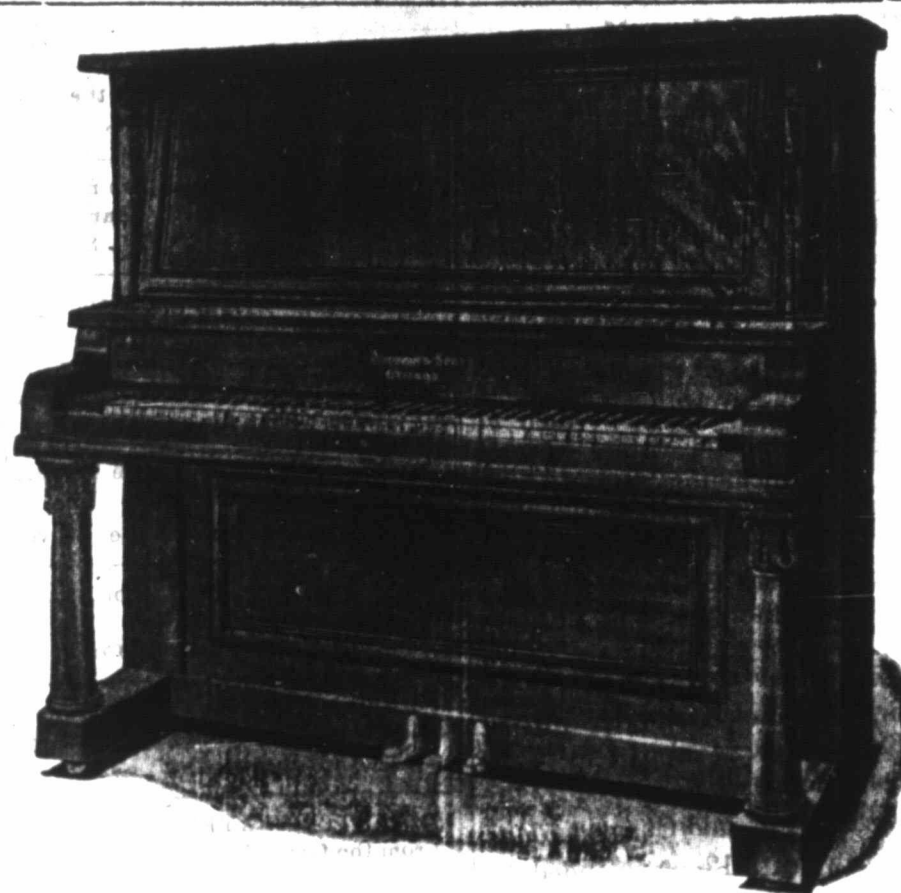

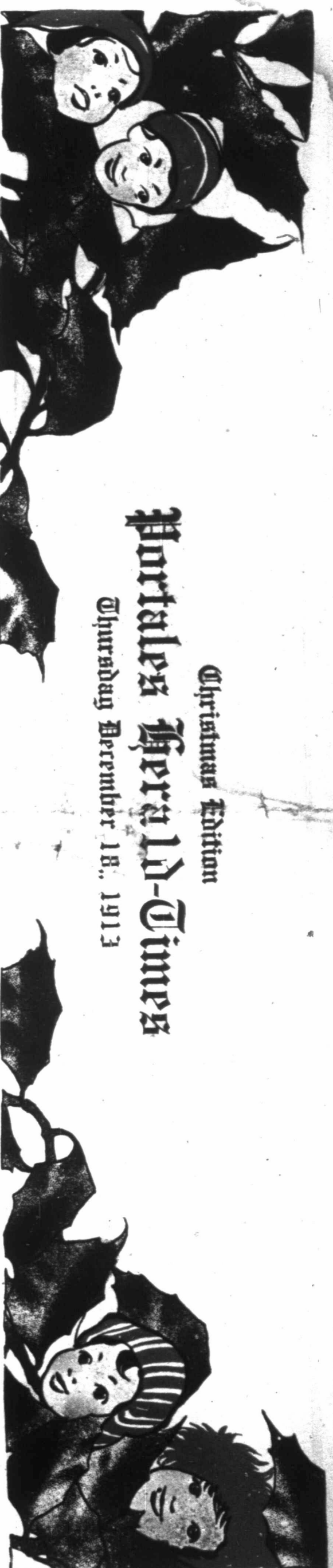

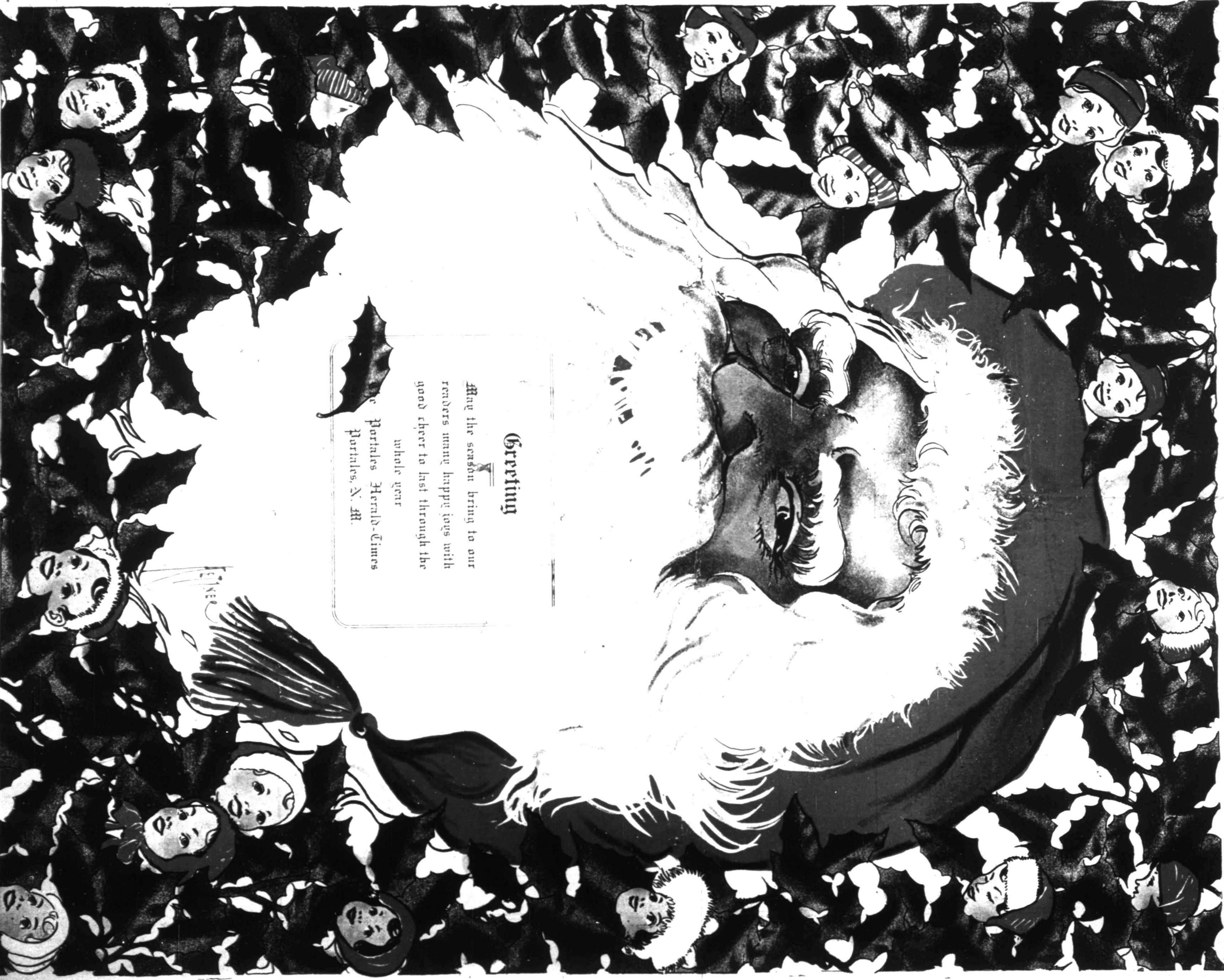
