Teachers of Roosevelt County Have Interesting Session at Taiban

## PROMINENT EDUCATORS PRESENT

Among the Prominent Educators Present Was Supt. White

The Roosevelt county teacher association has just held one of the most interesting meetings, during the history of the organization, at Taiban, New Mexico, January 16-17, 1914. The meetings were held in the Taiban high school building and the meetings were well attended at every session by large crowds of interested people.

The weather was ideal New Mexico weather. Scarcely a wind at all. Bright sunny days, almost as warm as spring. It was just the kind of weather that gives one good spirit and good cheer.

Prof. W. Fremont Orsborne had previously selected a committee of ladies to canvass the town and secure homes for the teachers and visitors. This committee had secured sufficient homes for a far greater number of teachers than those who came.

Taiban has long been noted for interest in public affairs and especially education, so on Friday morning when the citizens of the town began to hear it whispered around that State Superintendent Alvin N. White had come in on the early morning train to attend the teachers' association everyone got busy. Most of the merchants closed their stores, the ladies turned out in mass and everybody helped royally to make the meeting a success. Mrs. S.F. Culberson, county superintendent of schools of Roosevelt, had appeared on the scene several days before and teachers from the neighboring towns and country districts arrived in time for the opening exercises.

On Friday night the boys and girls of the Taiban high school gave an entertainment for visiting teachers in the Odd Fellows hall. About 225 persons were present at this entertainment and each one performed his part so well that the audience was kept roaring with laughter at frequent intervals during the entire evening. Prof. Orsborne had planned everything connected with this entertainment so thoroughly that every part came in perfect harmony.

The boys and girls played almost as though they were inspired. Mrs. Ballentyne and Miss Willie Mae Culberson, our intermediate and primary teachers, furnished well trained pupils who assisted in the entertainment.

Friday afternoon the school boys of Tolar, in charge of Prof. J. H. Kelso, played a stubbornly contested match game of baseball with the school boys of Taiban. Frank Rodgers acted as umpire. Both sides seemed well pleased with his decisions. And while the Taiban boys came out winner they realized that the Tolar boys had performed their part well. The game was watch-

## BUFFALO JONES TO AFRICA

Party of Seven to Sail For Dark Continent On February 7th.

## TO GET LIVE GORILLA FOR CIRCUS

Jones Expects to Get \$250,000.00 for Grown Gorilla in New York

Buffalo Jones, with seven others, four expert ropers being in the number, will sail the 7th of February from New York for the wilds of Africa to capture a full grown gorilla and bring it back to this country alive. If he succeeds in this undertaking he is to receive \$250,000. He also expects to bring back from South Africa about 500 native wild animals.

This is the second trip of Buffalo Jones into Africa. He will be accompanied on this trip by Ambrose Means, an expert roper who was with him on his former tour. Dallas McDaniel, of Portales, is also to accompany Mr. Jones as expert roper. Those who know Dallas say that he has both the nerve and the skill and are predicting he will return covered all over with glory.

Mr. Means was in Portales this week looking after some details at this end of the line before the final departure for Africa. He said to a Herald-Times man: "I have bought three hounds at a cost of \$40. each for the African hunt. I have also bought eight horses, the very best I could get for the trip. I paid as high as \$175.00 each for some of them. We will sail on the 7th of next month from New York. It will take us six weeks to reach the west coast of Africa, the home of the gorilla. We will probably be absent from the United States a year or longer. We will have a moving picture outfit with us, and Dallas, your Portales man will appear in the movies all over the world. I think there is no doubt about us getting the gorilla. That is what we are going after. We have men who have the courage and are there with the goods when it comes to slinging the rope. We expect to use just the ordinary rope, but will have plenty of that. And that is all that is necessary. Give me enough rope and I can rope and hold the train that runs on your railroad track."

It will cost several hundred dollars to get the horses and dogs to New York and thence to Africa. Mr. Means expects to ship the animals to New York Friday. He and Mr. McDaniel will also leave at the same time to join Mr. Jones who is now in New York. There will be one woman in the crowd as Mrs. Means expects to accompany her husband to Africa.

## ROOSEVELT COUNTY SCHOOLS

According to the New Mexico Journal of Education We Excel

## EDUCATIONALLY THIS COUNTY LEADS

As In Most Everything Else Roosevelt County Is In The Lead

Roosevelt county leads in the enrollment in proportion to school census, for out of 3,033 persons between the ages of five and twenty-one years all but 427 are enrolled in the public schools. The average daily attendance is also much higher than in any other county, being 1,779. Of the enrolled pupils, 726 are in the first grade, 310 are in the second, 343 in the third, 315 are in the fourth, 270 in the fifth, 196 are in the sixth, 209 in the seventh, 136 in the eighth and 233 are in the high school.

Of the seventy-one districts, one has eleven rooms, two have three rooms, one has two rooms, and sixty seven have one room. Of the seventy-eight schools, one has nine rooms, two have three rooms, two have two rooms and seventy-three have one room. Seventy-four are owned, three rented, and one loaned. Seventy-five are frame and one each are stone, concrete and adobe, respectively. Two are classed as excellent, thirty-three as good, thirty as fair and thirteen as poor. Five have school libraries with 204 volumes valued at \$306.50.

Of the teachers, thirty-seven are men who receive an average annual salary of \$346.73 or \$54.73 and fifty-four are women who receive an average annual salary of \$279.73 or \$44.15 a month. The average school term is 6.6 months. Of the teachers, four have life certificates, one a five year professional, twenty-three first grade, forty second grade, fifteen third grade certificates, while eight teachers are on permit. Five teachers receive less than \$200.00 a year, which explains why so many have desert claims on the side. Nine get \$200 a year, forty-five get \$200 to \$300, eight get \$300 to \$400, ten get \$400 to \$500, five get \$500 to \$600, and four \$600 to \$700, forty get less than \$50 a month, twenty-eight get \$50, seven get \$60 to \$80, eleven get \$80, and one each gets \$65, \$70, \$75, \$77.50 and \$125.00 a month, respectively.

## OUR COUNTY IN GOOD SHAPE

Commissioners Are To Be Commended for Wise Administration

## BANKS TO PAY GOOD INTEREST

In the Future the Banks Will Pay 2-2 percent On Deposits

Roosevelt county was never in better financial condition than at the present time, and this certainly bespeaks well for the management of the present Board of County Commissioners, and the readers of this paper are warned against statements that may be rumored around by a certain class of chronic kickers, because all communities have these calamity howlers in their midst. The county commissioners at their January meeting called before them the county treasurer and the assistant district attorney and the various bankers of the county, and sought to arrive at an understanding whereby the various county funds on deposit would produce some revenue. As a result of this meeting, notwithstanding the fact that there is no law requiring it, the banks of this county are hereafter to pay monthly interest on the daily balances of the county at the rate of two and one-half per centum.

The Commissioners and our County Treasurer, Moses B. Jones, are now trying to locate certain bonds of the county, which are bearing interest at six per cent., and buy in about five thousand at par, since there is sufficient funds on hand at this time to do this. Mr. Jones received a telegram Tuesday morning enquiring if he intended to convey the meaning in his letter that they would buy in the bonds at par, and this came from one of the greatest banking houses in America, with the assurance that the bonds, although they will not mature for a number of years, could doubtless be had within a short time. Mr. Jones recently bought in some two or three thousand dollars of these bonds, and thereby the county is saved the expense of this interest which is six per cent.

When asked concerning certain publications that have been made within the past week, the commissioners simply stated that a kick and a knock was to be expected, since that was always a major part of the emoluments of an honest man in office; but that all their official actions were of record, and that the Roosevelt county grand jury will meet on the second Monday of March, at which time, as in the past, all such muck rakers might present their grievances, and that they always welcome an investigation of their actions by the proper sources.

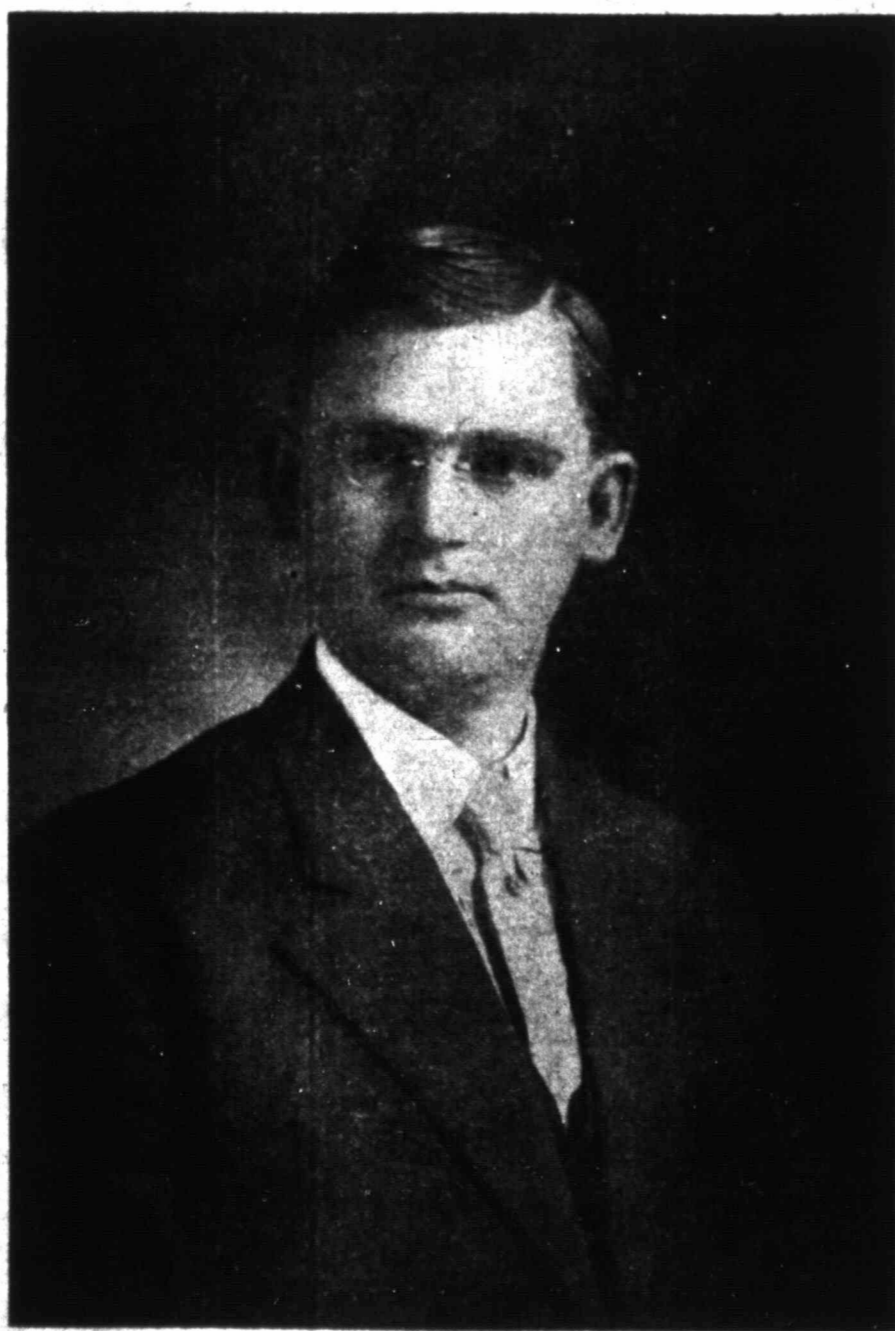
## IMPORTANT CANTALOUPE MEETING
