THE SAN DIEGO EXPOSITION

The San Diego Exposition To Be Big Event of Coming Year

WILL THIS SECTION BE REPRESENTED

The State Exposition Committee Anxious for us to take part

That Roosevelt county and particularly Portales, will make a good display at the Panama California Exposition to be held in 1915 in San Diego is assumed by the New Mexico Commission consisting of Colonel R. E. Twitchell of East Las Vegas; Attorney Guy A. Reed, Carlsbad; Banker Sam T. Clark, Deming; Mayor J. J. Sholar, Raton; and District Attorney M. U. Vigil of Albuquerque. There is so much that is creditable and attractive throughout this country and in the immediate vicinity of Portales that it needs but to be proclaimed to the world in order to draw home seekers, home builders and investors. It will be remembered that the New Mexico display at the St. Louis Exposition in 1904 brought one hundred thousand home seekers to New Mexico and added at least one hundred million dollars to its wealth. The San Diego Exposition will do no less and perhaps will do more, for practically all of the seven million visitors who are expected on the Pacific coast in 1915, will pass through New Mexico either coming or going, but it is up to the State and to the counties and to the commercial clubs to see to it that these seven million visitors see and hear enough about the Sunshine State to make them feel that this is indeed a country of opportunities. The County Commissioners of Colfax county have already acted, and each county board has appropriated \$2000. for Exposition purposes. The State has set aside \$30,000. for the same

purpose, of which about one half will be expended on a building that will be an attractive exhibit in itself for it will reproduce the historic mission churches of Acoma and Cochiti. Of its 15000 square feet of floor space and a much larger area of wall space, Roosevelt county should see to it that it gets its due proportion. The pumping plant at Portales, the shallow wells, the agricultural and horticultural possibilities especially, should be emphasized, for the cry of the present day is for more farms. Commissioner Sam T. Clark has already seen to it that a model pumping plant will be installed at San Diego to demonstrate how the Mimbres Valley is being reclaimed by pumping. He has also gathered a superb collection of one hundred or more photographs which will be reproduced by means of stereopticon slides, these slides will be thrown upon a canvas daily. At a set time each day, they will be used to illustrate a lecture on Luna county in general and the Mimbres Valley in particular. It can readily be seen how Roosevelt county must take advantage of the same method. A huge wall map will be placed in the exhibit hall, upon which the topography, character of land, transportation facilities, churches, schools, settlements of each county, will be marked in a realistic manner. It is up to the commercial bodies in Roosevelt, the Board of County Commissioners and public spirited citizens to take hold of the proposition in good time and in earnest so that the county will be well represented and will secure its share of the immigration that is sure to follow and the capital that is certain to flow into New Mexico as the result of the Exposition. The educational exhibits for the State, each county and community, has been placed in the care of a Woman's Auxiliary Committee on which Roosevelt county is represented by Mrs. A. A. Rogers of Portales. Commissioner Guy A. Reed of Carlsbad is in particular looking after the interests of the Pecos Valley including Roosevelt county
