Organizing Selling Campaign

The realty firm of Braley and Ball are at work upon a systematic, constructive campaign to bring some real farmers to Portales Valley. Mr. Braley has an extensive acquaintance among some of the best farming communities in Oklahoma and Mr. Ball knows a number of the Kansas localities where farmers are seeking farm land inducement and this live real-estate firm is making preparations to bring farmers from Oklahoma and Kansas to Portales Valley this summer when they will see the crops growing, and have an intelligent conception of advantages offered in Portales Valley to the farmer who is looking for the best land his money will buy.

Selling Cane Seed

There are many things that say the man in the Portales Valley who tries. This week M. F. Fowler shipped to the Roswell Seed company, \$156 worth of cane seed, and he has about as much more on hand.

Mr. Fowler received two and a half cents per pound for this seed. This thrifty farmer came here about eight years ago and he has certainly made good. He owns 320 acres of choice land, very well improved and has 150 head of horses and cattle. He practically always has something to sell from his farm-ranch.

Joe and John Bradley have leased the 60 acres adjoining Portales town-site owned by Joe Brown Sledge. 20 acres are seeded to alfalfa which is among the best in the valley, the remaining 40 acres will be cultivated, some in sweet potatoes, sugar beets, and garden truck. Bradley brothers have ordered from Humphrey and Sledge a cultivator similar to a disc harrow which is called a "renovator"; this implement has attachment such as the teeth in a harrow in place of the discs, and is said to be great improvement.

That there is a most excellent opportunity to secure an Armory with all equipment and accoutrement is true provided the people of Portales will show the proper interest in this most desirable addition to the town. Capt. T. J. Molinari has devoted much time and great interest in his official capacity as Captain of Company M., New Mexico National Guards and his men all swear by him. What seems to be required in order to secure the Armory together with gymnasium and other equipment is more enlistment of men and this should be the very thing of interest to so many young men in Portales and the valley; those young men who are in school would find much good in military training.

Last year a two weeks trip was made by Company M. to Las Vegas with all expenses paid by your dear uncle Samuel, and this summer a more extensive trip is planned.

Captain Molinari, while strong for discipline and all that is military--he gets into the hearts of his soldier boys as was much in evidence upon the trip to Las Vegas last summer when J. R. Darnell was a subject for the hospital upon this trip but the captain helped private Darnell to pull thru in good condition.

Let the young men of Portales and the valley, rally to Captain Molinari and enlist in Company M., which will be the means of the Washington officials establishing a "Class A" Armory at Portales and with the new law possible--allowing pay for men attending drill--there is great sentiment, and real good to become of having a strong company of New Mexico National Guards stationed at Portales.

In the game of making good there's a time limit, the Business Philosopher asserts.

When we were sentenced the future to us was a world unexplored, with time unlimited.

But at thirty-seven to forty-seven our perspective has changed. We look into the future through wiser eyes and are startled—time has acquired boundary lines.

We look back at opportunities lost—at things done which we ought not to have done—at things left undone which we ought to have done—at long hours and well meant labor which proved profitless.

And it shows in our score. We stand at the crest of the hill—the game is half over—to win we must capitalize the future with experience gathered from the past.

But we cannot afford to miss even one opportunity. There is a limit—a time limit—and every day, every hour, every minute is reducing just that much of our chance of rolling up a good score in the game of making good.

We can't afford to go through this year not knowing whether we are winning playing even or going behind.

A year is 365 previous days—7,760 hours—the best days and hours of our life—and we can't

If we are losing we want to know today, so that tomorrow we can "change the trump."

And next week we want to know how much we profited by the change.

If we investigate we find that a large percentage of all failures are due, not to lack of ambition, ability or hard luck, but rather to each man's ignorance of the actual condition of his own particular business.

Further investigation convinces us that the great majority of small retailers are capable, hard working business men, working in the dark, waiting for the end of the year to find out if their score has gone up or down in the game of making good.

But we find that the man who is making a "killing"—the man with the best score—is the man who labors less and thinks more, the man who systematizes, who installs a proper accounting system, the man who knows which clerk deserves a raise and which should be fired, who knows which lines should be discontinued and which pushed.

He is the man who knows this week what he made last week. He is managing.

We have the same opportunity. What he is doing we can do; we have the same ambition, ability and energy.

But we must be up and doing; we've reached the crest of the hill, and—

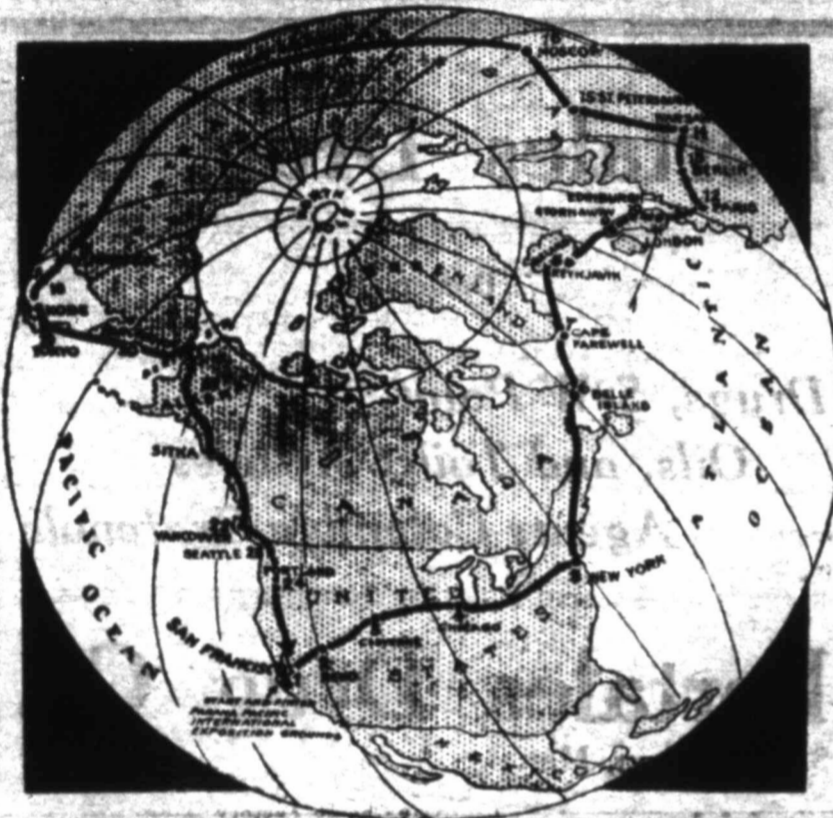
**Splendors of the Panama-Pacific

**SUPERB WORKS OF SCULPTURE AND ART IN
COLOSSAL EXHIBIT PALACES FOR AMER-
ICA'S PANAMA CANAL CELEBRATION.**

GIFTS of gold from vast oriental domes, Venetian blue on minarets, prodigious works of sculpture and the arrival of notables from all parts of the globe give glimpses of the great Panama-Pacific International Exposition as it will appear when its gates swing open to the world in San Francisco on Feb. 20, 1915.

Not for many years will the world be enabled to enjoy so marvelous a collection of the works of contemporary sculptors. The World's Columbian Exposition at Chicago first proved that the greatest talent might be engaged to produce work of even temporary value. 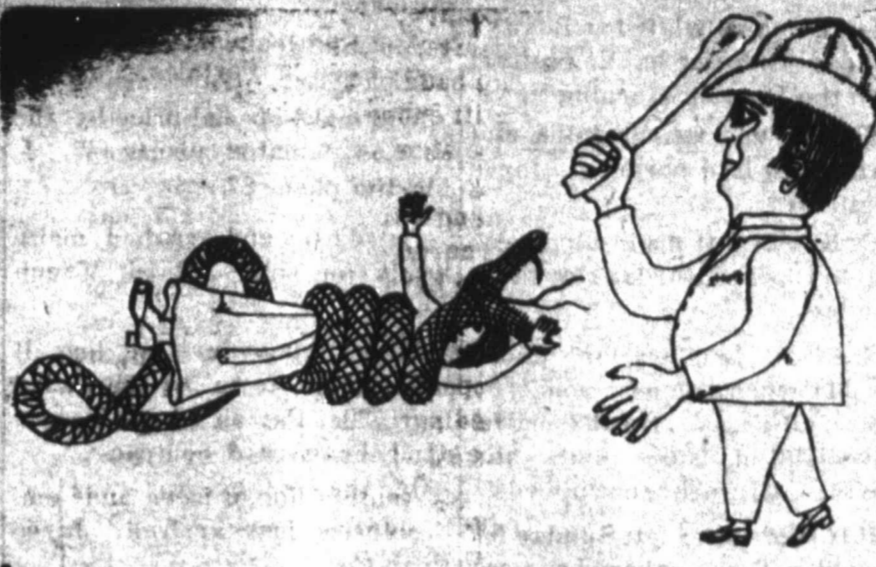
