PORTALES HIGH SCHOOL FORGES TO THE FRONT

Capt. J. S. Long Added Many Helpful Features and Pushed Portales Public School to the Front

PROSPECTS FOR A GREAT SCHOOL NEXT YEAR GOOD

Improvements in Building and Grounds—New Teachers, Oratory and Music Teachers, Other Features

We pleased to present to our readers this week, by photo and word, some things of interest about the Portales public school. Taking all things into consideration, we believe there is no better school in the state in towns no larger than Portales. And many towns much larger than this can boast of as good schools. Those looking for a good place in which to educate their children need not go farther than Portales.

Among some of the new matters of interest and worth to the school introduced last year, and matters that will receive more attention this year:

An oratorical association. Edward Patterson of this organization, won second place among the high school orators of the state last year. In the spelling contest Miss Jaunita Ryther won fourth place among the spellers of the state. The debating league won out in every contest. A glee club and boys chorus has made a good start and will be heard from this year. Athletics were fully organized so that every student of whatever age and disposition could find something to do suited to his or her taste. An annual that is a credit to the school was published.

Everyone who attended the commencement exercises of our school were impressed with the excellent character of the work in all lines being done by faculty and students. It is not casting

any reflections upon any commencement of the past to say that the exercises this year were perhaps superior to any heretofore. A very interesting feature and something that was new here was the handing over of a big key about thirty inches long which had been painted in the school colors, by the senior class to the junior class. This represented the key of knowledge.

We are glad to say that several of the high school students are contestants for the state prizes for the best essay offered by Dr. Bayd of the State University as published in the Herald-Times recently. We predict now that more honors will be brought to Portales when this contest is over.

Superintendent Long is very hopeful over the outlook for the school this year. An oratory teacher is to be employed who will devote her entire time to teaching oratory. Two other new teachers will be added, making eleven teachers beside the oratory and music teachers. A number of new improvements are being made in the school building, including new desks, blackboards etc. A new room is being fitted up, and the basement will receive some repairs. Some improvements have been made in the grounds around the building. In a word everything is being done, it seems that can be done to make this the greatest year ever in our school. So mote it be.

ROOSEVELT COUNTY FAIR TO BE BIGGER AND BETTER

With Surplus on Hand and Other Funds Available The Fair Will Be Pushed to Successful Finish

The Roosevelt county fair association has elected officers for the ensuing year and the prospects are that we will have a fair that will excel the one we had last year and one which will be a great booster for the valley and county. We have reason to be justly proud at the showing made and the prizes Roosevelt county products took at the different fairs where they were entered last year.

The State fair will be held at Albuquerque and the International dry farming congress which will be for both irrigated and dry land products will be held at Wichita, Kansas, about the middle of October. In order to get our exhibits ready and on the ground the Roosevelt county fair will probably be held between October 1st, and 5th.

Wichita is a great railroad center and it is expected that many farmers from the northern states will be in attendance there this year. This is where most of our new settlers are coming from and such an exhibit at

Wichita as we had at Tulsa last year should get some results.

The county commissioners seem well pleased as to the manner the fair was conducted here last year. Money spent for a county fair is well as it all stays at home. There is at present a balance of about \$125 in the treasury of the fair association and we can depend on the county commissioners appropriating whatever amount is necessary to make the fair a success.

On account of the steady advance in the price of land and available sites becoming scarcer it would be well for the fair association to look into the matter of getting some permanent grounds. The town of Portales owns 10 acres in the school section with more adjacent which could probably be acquired.

R. G. Bryant who represented us at Tulsa last year has been elected a member of the executive committee of the International dry farming congress and he may be of assistance to those who expect their exhibits to reach Wichita this fall.

This week county health physician, W. E. Patterson, has some men at work pouring oil on the holes of water in the low places out from town.

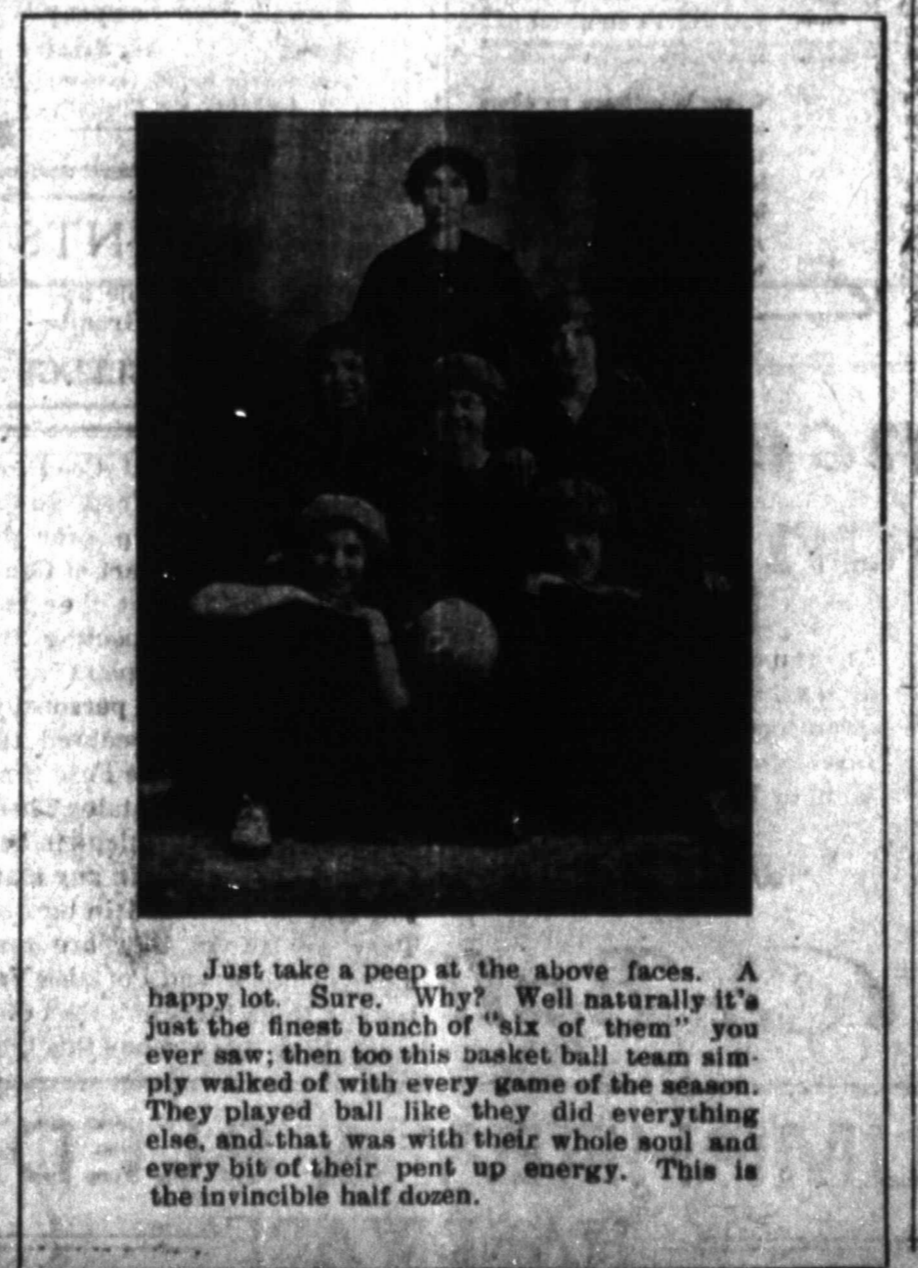
This for the purpose of killing the mosquito and other disease breeding pests and germs. A wise move this.

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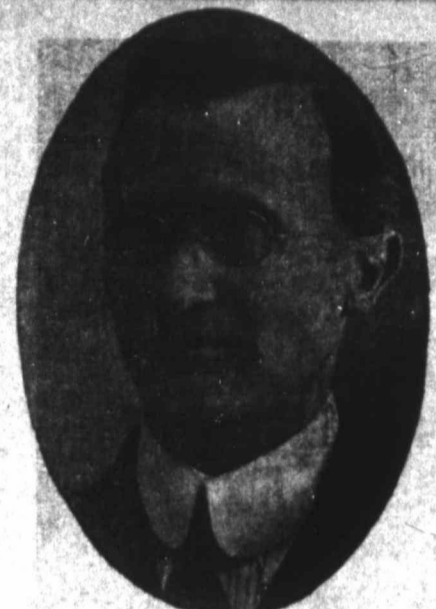

To Pres. board of education.
Dear Sir,

This is to call your attention to the approaching meeting of the national education association to be held at St. Paul, Minnesota, July 4-11, the largest gathering of educators in the world and the most important in the discussions held and the policies initiated. As this great convention is so near, I am making special efforts to secure a large attendance of superintendents and principals, as I am convinced that the stimulating influence of this meeting will do more than anything else to improve the efficiency of the administration of our various school units. Not only should your city superintendents and principals of schools attend but members of your board should be sent to bring back the most modern and effective methods in city and town school administration.

I believe it a perfectly proper expenditure for you to make such allowance for members of your board, your superintendent and principals as your revenues justify, in order to permit their attendance at this meeting. I have secured splendid headquarters in the most important hotel in St. Paul, Hotel Saint Paul and New Mexico should make a showing which will entitle the state to a respectable standing in educational circles.

I have not yet been advised just what the railroad round trip fare from various points in New Mexico will be, but I am assured by the officials of the association that a very reasonable round trip fare will be in effect and that the various railway agents will soon be advised in such matter. As a basis for any allowance made, I would suggest that you consult with your local railway agent and with the one desiring to go as representative of your board.

Roosevelt County Institute For 1914

We take pleasure in announcing the Twelfth Annual Session of the Roosevelt County Institute, which will convene at Portales, N. M., in the Public school building, Monday at 8:30 o'clock a. m. July 13th, 1914, and continue for four weeks, closing 8th. day of August, 1914.

Portales the county seat of Roosevelt county, the place, where, the institute is to be held is the headquarters for the great pumping irrigation system of the state of New Mexico.

Teachers desiring the advantages of a clean, cool retreat for study and professional improvement, are cordially invited to come to Portales and attend the four weeks session of this summer institute.

The purpose of this course of instruction, is to arouse enthusiasm in the teacher, and to better prepare him by valuable instruction and suggestions to present in a pedagogical manner, the various subjects to be taught, in the public schools of the county and state.

This age of progress, calls for the best possible from the teacher and the summer school will help him to meet the demand, by bringing him in touch with the best educational thought.

The granting of permits to teach in the public schools of Roosevelt county, may now be counted a thing of the past. Do not ask for permits, but, come and get ready for duty, in the institute as prescribed by law.

Qualifications of N. M. Teachers

Every teacher in the state, who plans to teach in a public school, must hold a Teacher's Certificate, valid in the state; a certificate of attendance at institute or some accredited summer school, a health certificate, showing that the teacher is not affected with tuberculosis.

Subjects For Various Certificates

Candidates for third grade certificates shall be examined in the following branches: Reading, Penmanship, Orthography, English Grammar and Composition, Physiology, Arithmetic and Geography. Valid for one year. All teachers must comply with the requirements of the state Reading Circle course.

Candidates for second grade certificates, shall be examined, in all subjects of the third grade, to which are added, United States History, Civics, School Management, and one of the following: Domestic Science, (including cooking and sewing), Manual Training and Agriculture.

Candidates, for first grade certificates shall be examined in Reading, Orthography, Penmanship, English, Grammar and Composition, Geography, United States History, Physiology, Civil Government, Arithmetic, Pedagogy, Psychology, and one of the following branches: Algebra, Botany, Bookkeeping, Zoology, Physics, and one of the following: Agriculture, Domestic Science, Manual Training.

First grade Certificates are valid for three years, and are renewable for three years, after successful teaching and complying with the Reading Circle requirements.

You are respectfully referred to the State Superintendent, Hon. Alvan N. White for information, concerning Professional Certificates.

Alvan N. White, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, will deliver an educational talk for the uplift of the teachers and people during the session of the institute.

Miss Manette Myers, State Director of Industrial Education, will be with us, and will be as usual accorded right of way, as to time and plan of lectures.

Mrs. W. O. Oldham, the always friend of education and of the teacher, has consented to favor the institute with at least one of her helpful talks, she is to select her subject, and select time.

Other representative educators, Dr. Frank H. H. Roberts, Dr. Boyd, and Prof. W. T. Conway are invited to be present during the session of the school, and entertain and instruct, with timely addresses. Dates of the coming of the educators will be announced, later.

Manuals

The same manual as used in 1913, will be used again this year. Those having their last year manuals, will do well to bring them to this session of the institute.

A price of Twenty-five cents, will be charged for manuals, this session.

Visitors

Visitors will always receive a welcome and will, we are sure, find much to interest them.

Faculty

Each member of the faculty has been selected with reference to his peculiar fitness to do the work assigned. They are teachers whose reputations in the educational world, are based on broad experience with great ability, and those attending the institute will receive instruction from teachers whose hearts are in the work and who sympathize with other teachers in their efforts to benefit themselves and educational conditions, a combination, necessary to secure success in the school room.

Conductor

Professor John H. Vaughan, of the A. and M.
