W. A. Swearingen Has One Farmers Are Turning Their of the Best Peach Orchards in County

Expects to Give His Orch- Raises Feed on His Farm ard More Attention Than Farming

A visit to the farm of W. A. Charles Radciiff, postmaster Swearingen who lives about 25 and merchant at Judson in the miles southwest of Portales demonstrates the possibilities of fruit is another of our successful raising in this county. #### Joint Resolution No. 12

Joint resolution providing for the amendment of article VIII of the constitution of the state of New Mexico, entitled "taxation and revenue" 8. Sub. S. J. R. No. 12; Filed March, 15

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO: That article VIII of the constitution of the state of New Mexico, entitled "taxation and revenue," be and the same hereby is amended so as to read

ARTICLE VIII TAXATION AND REVENUE Section 1, taxes levied upon tangi-ble property shall be in proportion to the value thereof, and taxes shall be equal and uniform upon subjects of taxation of the same class.

Sec 2. Taxes levied upon real or personal property for state revenue shall not exceed four mills annually on each dollar of the assessed valuation thereof except for the support of the educational, penal and charitable in-stitutions of the state, payment of the stitutions of the state, payment of the state debt and interest thereon; and the total annual tax levy upon such property for all state purposes exclusive of necessary levies for the state debt shall not exceed ten mills.

Sec. 3. The property of the United States, the state and all counties, towns state and school disricts, and other cities and school disricts, and other municipal corporations, public libra-ries, community ditches and all laterthereof, all church propala cational or charitable purposes all cemeteries not used or beld for private or corporate profit, and all bonds of the state of New Mexico, and of the counties, municipalities and districts thereof shall be exempt from

taxation. Sec. 4 Any public officer making any profit out of public monies or using the same for any purpose not authorized by law, shall be deemed guilty of a by law, shall be deemed guitty of a felony and shall be punished as pro vided by law, and shall be disqualified to hold public office. All public mon-ies not invested in interest bearing se-curities shall be deposited in national banks in this state or in banks or trust companies incorporated under the laws of the state, and the interests derived therefrom shall be applied in the man-

ner prescribed by law. Sec.5. The Legislature may exempt faom taxation property of each head of a family to the amount of two hundred dollars.

Sec. 6. Lands held in large tracts shall not be assessed for taxation at

shell not be assessed for taxation at any lower value per acre then [than] lands of the same character or quality and similarly situated, held in smaller tracts. The plowing of land shall not be considered as adding value thereunto for the purpose of taxation.

Sec. 7. No execution shall issue upon any judgment rendered against the beard of county commissioners of any county, or against any incorporated city, town r village, school district, or board of education; or against any officer of any county or against any officer of any county or against any any officer of any county or against any officer of any county or against any incorporated city town or village, school district or board of education, upon any judgment covered against him in his official capacity and for which the county, incrporated city. town or village, school district or beard of education, is liable, but the same shall be paid out of the proceeds of a tax levy as other liabilities, of counties, incorpor-ated cities, towns or villages, school districts as boneds of advention districts or boards of education, and when so collected shall be paid by the counts treasurer to the judgment cred-


