He came to this country 10 years ago and his worldly effects consisted of \$61. He tried straight farming, but one year with another it did not prove very successful. Commencing three years ago with two cows the herd has increased to 50 head of cattle, 20 head of which are milch cows.

From this farm last year \$500 worth of cream was sold and as much as \$75 worth from 10 cows in a single month. The hog in dustry which is so important to the dairyman is not overlooked here for \$200 worth of bogs were sold last winter. Five five mon the old hogs cressed 150 pounds net each.

Mr. Pendleton constructed the first sile in this part of the counry and is a strong believer in nem. He thinks Sudan grass as a great future in this part and is going to make a good start by planting 50 pounds this year

A few colts are sold each year and add to the revenue produced In the 10 head of horses are eight brood mares and a good crop of colts is expected this year.

The improvments on this place are substantial and indicate prosperity. Among them is a concrete tank twenty three by thirty, and is three feet deep which insures a bountiful supply of stock water at all times. An prchard in which is a general variety of fruit trees is a valua ble asset and adds to the attractiveness of the farm.

Mr. Pendleton now considers his holdings worth about \$6000 most of which he has accumuated in the last three years ince he commenced dairying nd stockfarming. Besides get ing this far in his worldly accunulation he is raising a large amily of five children.

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

### ALFALFA-SEED PEST RESEMBLES THE GNAT



Alfalfa Seed Field With Check Ridges and Fence Lines Burned Over to Destroy Hibernating Larvae of the Chalcis-Fly.

The alfalfa-seed destroyer, known as the chalcis-fly, does its destructive work in clover or alfalfa seeds, from the Gulf coast to the northern limits of the United States, according to the United States department of agriculture's specialist who has personally seen the widespread devastation of this pest. By harvesting severely infested crops, by cleaning fence lines and ditch banks, and by winter cultivation the grower of alfalfa seed may help to control this insect. A new Farmers' Bulletin, (No. 636) entitled "The Chalcis-Fly in Alfalfa Seed," gives the details of these methods of control, and may be had free of charge on application to the depart-

The chalcis-fly under the microscope s a formidable-looking insect but when seen in the field it is frequently confused with the gnat. These pests may be seen in great numbers flying over alfalfa-seed shocks and swarming over the sickle bar when the alfalfa is being cut. The eggs are so small as to be invisible to the naked eye and are deposited through the soft, green seed pods directly into the soft seeds when the pods are about half-grown. Immediately upon becoming a fly, the insect eats its way out through the shells of the infested seeds, then through the green pods. Large portions of the seeds are hollowed out in this manner, when they are still green and growing.

The infected seeds which still contain the living larvae of the insect may be recognized by their abnormal shape and usually by the dull brown color. Some of the infested seeds, however, retain their natural color, but they always lack the glossy appearance of normal seeds. 
fore the seed crop is grown. It is sometimes necessary to have two or more irrigation ditches running parallel, making it impracticable to cut the alfalfa between them. In such cases it is economy to fence the ditches and use this land as a small summer pasture, thus preventing the development of alfalfa seed pods and the chalcis-files.

Winter Cultivation. In the process of harvesting the seed crop many pods containing infested seeds fall to the ground. Here they remain until the following spring when the hibernating insects emerge, although cultivation with an alfalfa cultivator, at some time late in the fall or in early winter, will sufficiently cover such pods and will prevent the emergence of most of the adv.'ts when the warm weather arrives.

Destroying the Screenings. After the alfalfa is throthed the great mass of screenings watch is left frequently contains large numbers of seeds infested with hibernating larvae. If the chaff, together with the screenings, is placed in a compost pile for three or four months, so that it will become heated and decay, most of the insect life will be destroyed. Unless it is possible to treat the screenings in this manner they should be burned before the growing season opens in the spring.

Many of the alfalfa seed pods along check ridges and fence lines may be destroyed by burning off the weeds and alfalfa. This should be done either in the fall or early spring. In purchasing alfalfa seed, farmers should insist upon having seed which has been well cleaned after thrashing and should never plant the uncleared product in new fields.

Turn into individual molds, dipped in water and set away to chill. Serve with whipped

Cover and boil 20 minutes without lifting the cover. Serve hot,

Corn Waffles.-Sift a pint of flour with two tablespoonfuls of baking powder, add a teaspoonful of salt and a cupful of milk and two well-beaten eggs. Beat the batter until light and stir in a can of corn; bake in waffle irons. Serve hot with sirup.

Chicken Loaf With Peas.-Dissolve a teaspoonful of gelatin in a cupful of chicken stock. When the mixture begins to set beat until frothy and add three-fourths of a cupful of heavy cream, which has been beaten stiff, then add a cupful and a half of chicken cut in dice. Season with pepper and salt and put into an angel-food pan with a funnel. When molded, turn out on a platter lined with lettuce leaves and fill the center with seasoned cooked peas. There is no one thing in particular to be observed in the production of clean milk. Anything that tends to cleanliness is desired. Keep the cows lean, and do not compel or allow them to wade and live in filth. This means clean yards and clean, well-bedded stalls. Everything short of this is positively repulsive and should not be tolerated any longer in a civilized com-

### MAKE-UP OF YOUNG HEIFERS

inheritance of Quality and Quantity of Milk Seem to Be Separate-Lots

Roughly speaking, 25 per cent of sire or dam is transmitted to the offspring. Where a test such as milking quality can check this the female will show a slight-preponderance, 29 per

This refers to high-producing cows, and with them the ratio of high to medium offspring is about half and half, while with medium producing cows with better bulls the high producers would be but one high to seven medium. There are indications, though no proof, that production is linked to sex factor, milk production being so

closely interwoven with sex. Inheritance of quantity and quality of milk seem to be separate, the number of fat globules in a given quantity of milk being about the same, the difference in the per cent of fat being due to larger globules. There is a chemical difference be-

ween large and small globules, the former containing softer, lighter fats; the character of the fat may also determine the size of the globule. Probably much of the heredity for production lies in the size and character or the globules. We are still in the stage of investigating these things without being able to make positive statements, but the young dairyman will come to more positive knowledge by

The tall, slender type of sile has rapidly come into favor and has replaced the wider type, formerly constructed. There is a very good reason for this, since a larger amount of silage can be stored in a given space in this new type on account of the greater compression of the lower layers. ### ADVERTISING MAKES DEMAND FOR GOODS

Articles That Have Been Given Wide Publicity Outsell

By O. M. BONEBRAKE "The successful merchant is the one who gives the people what they want and when they want it." When you refuse to give people what they want, regardless of whether the desire was created by a manufacturer, competitor or peculiar local condi-tion, you are violating the first law

of advertising.

If the goods are not reliable, the advertising soon ceases, for the very simple reason that no manufacturer can afford to put thousands of dol-lars worth of publicity behind worthles goods. The moment he com-mences to advertise, that moment he must decide to give the customer everything he has in the way of quality. ity. If he is going to make good, he must make good on the goods he advertises.

Trade Marked Goods No advertiser is so short-sighted as to advertise anything but trade mark ed goods. If the goods are not trade marked it is probable that the company putting them on the market has abundant reason for wishing to dedge the responsibility for their quality. The right kind of goods depends only upon identification for their continued success. They can be asker for by name, recognized, recomme and reordered. The one chance that "just as good" stuff has is to remain unidentified, depends upon the lure of "price," special sales, substitutions, and "easy" customers.

Advertised and trade marked good have a steady sale at a fixed rate of profit and they make perma and satisfied customers. goods are a little high in price, my customers are willing to pay the dif that they are getting what they want, and what they are paying for.

The manufacturers put their goods up in such neat and attractive manner that a customer, entering the store and seeing the advertised article displayed, says, "That's what want," and makes the purchase.

The manufacturer, by his national advertising, educates the people to high standard of living in the belief that the people will pay to get guaranteed goods and better service if they but know of the merits of the goods advertised.

Add to Reputation. By stocking with articles which are nationally advertised by the manufacturer of these articles, I give my store an added reputation.

Theoretically the profits in adver ised goods seem to be smaller than works out they are not. It looks like a cinch to buy goods for \$2 1/4 cents, and sell them for a dollar. But when the unadvertised goods cling to the shelves until I have to clean them out for 65 cents, my notion of a cinch naturally undergoes a change. And when the people who bought the goods at 65 cents go around and tell the neighbors how they got "stung" in my store-well, you know, it sort of

puts a crimp in a fellow's business. I can sell from five to ten adver tised articles, trade marked articles each carrying 30 to 40 per cent, profit, in the same time that it will take to talk one customer to the point where he will buy "just as good" arti-

cles at 100 per cent, profit, There is a steady demand for these advertised goods, and if I do not have them my customers will go elsewhere for them.

Advertising makes goods known. Goods must be widely known. This causes only increased cost, but it turns my stock easier than it would be otherwise. The volume of business as a result of this advertising also eliminates the cost of advertising altogether, while the customer pays no more for his purchase and the dealer makes more money

By carrying advertised goods is strengthen my own position in the community, and in the majority of instances add considerably to my repu tation by reason of the unquestioned sonor and reliability of the advertis ing , manufacturers. Advertised goods are high class, they cannot but at tract high class trade.

When selling my customers an advertised article, I know that we are both guaranteed to the extent that in case the article by any chance proves to be exective or unsatisfactory, the manufacturer always stands ready to make good on it.



Many presidents have purchased upport in the house or the senate by the use of patronage. Mr. Wilson's bitterest opponent makes no such charge against him.

Certain presidents have sought to coerce recalcitrant members of congress by publicly attacking them Mr. Wilson has done nothing like that. Other presidents have tried to bring

hostile senators and representatives into line by holding over their heads the power of the national organization and threatening them with defeat. No such indictment has been brought against Mr. Wilson.

More than one president has been accused of making deals with congressmen by which their support was obtained in consideration of executive approval of legislation in which they were interested. No accusation of that kind has been lodged against Mr. Wilson.

We are assured by a partisan Republican press that the president is a despot who rules the house with an fron hand, and that the senate has been engaged in desperate battle to maintain its independence against usurpation. But when? And how? And where?

The first of the month the Carnegle Steel works resumed full operation, giving employment to between 8,000 and 9,000 men, and the American Steel and Wire company at Pittsburgh has taken on 2,500 more men and is running full time on new orders. The H. C. Frick Coke company has fired 2,500 new ovens within a few days.

From Chicago it is reported that within the last thirty days orders have been placed for \$30,000,000 worth of freight and passenger cars, locomotives and railroad materials, not including orders since January 1 for foreign governments. As a single inordered 15,000 cars, costing \$12,000. 000. Russia clone is reported to have placed orders amounting to \$12,000,000 with a Seattle car concern.

### PROFITABLE HOG FEED

Swine Raising Is Most Important Branch of Farming.

Feeding Facilities and Available Feeds

Forage crops constitute a most important part of the food supply for swine. Since there is little or no profit in feeding hoge on grain alone, the swine raiser should arrange to develop his market animals as much as possible on dairy and farm products and forage crops, leaving the heavy grain feeding for the fattening and finishing period. Most forage crops are suited to swine feeding, and in proper condition and stage of growth provide at least a mainten-

relished.

The rape stalks should not be too closely pastured after the leaves are eaten off. When this plan is followed, the rape should be from 14 to 18 inches high when the pigs are turned into it. For less intensive feeding, where fewer animals are to be kept on the same piece of ground for a longer period, rape is sown broadcast rape, six pounds of clover, and one bushel of cats are sown to the acre. The swine should not be turned into this until the crop is from eight to ten inches high, after which each acre with a good stand of the crop will supply 15 spring pigs with forage for the


