BANTA FE ASKS LOWER VALUA-TION AND RATE.

Assessment at Present Stands at \$113, 677.48 for 31,333 Acres Owned by the Road.

Santa Fé. N. M.-W. C. Reid, as solicitor for the Santa Fé in New Mexico, has entered an appeal with the State Tax Commission, urging the reduction of assessment on the Santa 'e's coal lands in San Juan county. The assessment at present stands at

He places a value of only \$1 an acre on the bulk of the Twenty-five hundred 3-year-old and and declares that the value of the steers were loaded out of Turquoise 1,640 acres assessed at \$15 an acre is not to exceed 10 per cent greater than that of the rest of the land, and should, therefore, be assessed at not more than \$1.10 an acre

POULTRY GOSSIP.

The mother turkey enjoys seclusion. Her nest should be in a secluded spot and visited no oftener than is necessary. Strangers should be kept away.

Shipping eggs by parcel post is getting to be quite prevalent now, and the risk is not near so great as it used to be.

Remember, it is the drafts and dampness which kill so many ducks. Also overfeeding is a great cause of fatality in raising

Keeping chicks too many years on the same ground is one great cause of disease. Move the houses or yards around

Make assurance doubly sure by giving the chicks a good dry place to live in. Dampness means Dry breadcrumbs make a good

feed for the first meal of little chicks.

HEADING OFF BABY

After the chicks hatch the mistake is often made of keeping them too warm. which has a tendency to weaken them The best brooders are arranged so the chicks can find the temperature they

The second cause for losses among baby chicks is the feed. Just before the chick is hatched it takes the yolk into its body. This is a little lunch basket given to the chick by nature to supply it with food till it learns how to eat after it comes out into the big world. Much has been said about feeding baby chicks, as to what, when and how to feed. Some people seem to think that because a little chick is picking at everything it sees that it is hungry, so they feed it at once. The little chick is a new creature in a strange land, investigating through curiosity, and is not really hungry. Oth riosity, and is not really hungry. Other people know that the chick has the yolk inside its body and that it contains food enough to last the chick for several days, so do not feed it for three or four days.

These are the extremes, and either of them may do injury to the chick To feed as soon as hatched would gorge the digestive system with too much food, and to wait four or five days the labor required would be too great for its strength.

The better plan is to begin feeding small quantities of food at from twen ty-four to forty-eight hours and in

The third cause for trouble is crowd ing. A chicken cannot sweat like many animals do, for they have no sweat glands in the skin, therefore much of the impurities and moisture must be carried out through the breath. If the chickens are crowded without proper ventilation the air becomes laden with moisture and impurities so that the air cannot do the work it should. This places an unusual strain on the kidneys, which results in a weakened system. The chickens come out in the morning weak and tottery, with little or no appetite. This is often responsible for the weak, low vitality birds aft-

er they get older. If a chick is properly hatched, fed and cared for there are very few disenses which will affect it. - Missouri Experiment Station.

Dip Cattle.

Roswell N. M. -The Cattle Sanitary Bord, co-operating with the Federal Bureau of Animal Industry, has issued an order to cattleman of eastern Chaves county and to the H. O. W. Cattle Company of San Miguel county calling for the dipping of all cattle because of an out break of scabies. The dipping in Chaves county will be under the direction of Inspector Richards, of Roswell, and in San Miguel county of Inspector Street, of Tucumcari. The territory covered by the dipping order is described as follows:

"That of Chaves county lying east of the 104th meridian, locally known as the eastern line of the Hagerman pasture, commencing at the Eddy Chaves county line, extending north to the intersection of the Santa Fe railroad, following the railroad to the southern county line of Roose velt county, following the south ern Roosevelt county line to New Mexico-Texas boundry-thus south to Texas New Mexico state line to intersection of Eddy and Chaves counties-thence west to 104th meridian. Also that territory in southern San Miguel county included in the northern portion of the Antonio Ortiz grant."
