(For several years this plant has been cut on a small scale at various times but never before has it been attempted on such a large scale as the present undertaking.

It is a great benefit to clear the land and pastures, not only making it look better but it improves it for grazing purposes. The getting rid of the plant are paid as high as five cents per acre for the privilege of cutting.



In many sections most of the

more observing and careful dairymen, however, having found that winter dairying has many advantages, and are breeding their cows to drop their calves in the fall. The following are some of the advantages of winter dairying:

Second, milk and cream can be handled in cold weather with less danger of souring, so there is little loss on account of milk returned from the creamery.

Third, the amount of labor on the farm is better distributed through the year. If the cows freshen in the spring, they are in full flow of milk and need the best care when the work in the fields is most pressing. On the otherhand, if the cows calve in the fall and are milked during the winter, the farmer can give them close attention, and has more time to study the problem of feeding, and can give his men employment all the year and in shipped from the state in 1914 was that way get better help.

Fourth, the lactation period is lengthened and the amount of milk given during the year is increased. Cows that freshen in the spring milk heavily while grass is good, but as the pasture of Agriculture, makes the following dries up the milk falls off and with the approach of winter the 2.620,000 cows are nearly dry. If they freshen in the fall, they should be started at once on a good winter ration, and when they have been milked six months it is time to turn them into pasture and for a time the flow of milk will be nearly as great as from fresh cows. Recent investigations by experiment stations verify this observation.

> Fifth, fall calves can be raised better than those born in spring.

HE housekeeper has been wishing for the last four or five months to see plenty of fresh vegetables and fruits on her table. Now, since the spring days have appeared, ber wishes are a realization. It is her duty as an efficient housekeeper to have as many and as large a variety of fresh regetables as she can. Vegetables, like fruits, are rich in water, and there fore they do much to quench the thirst. Celery is 95 per cent water. Minerals occur in all vegetables, and cellulose or the woody part is their framework. Some of the vegetables, such as peas potatoes and beans, are especially rich in starch, while beets have a large amount of sugar qualities. In cooking strong juiced vegetables it is necessary to use plenty of water. In vegetables high in sugar and soluble, such as peas and carrots, as little water as possible should be used. In preparing vegetables it is highly important that they should be well cleaned and wash

boiling to soften the cellulose Celery and Cabbage Saled. Hollow out green peppers and fi with chopped celery and cabbage in equal parts. Fill either with mayonnaise or with vinaigrette dressing. Potato Salad.

Use a cupful of diced bolled potatoes. Mix with it a fourth cupful of sliced celery. Garnish with dressing and a hard boiled egg. Enough dress ing should be used to coat and to fia vor the whole.


