## LARGE APPLE CROP SOLD

Three Thousand Bushels of Fine Apples Produced on Morgan Orchard

### MANY YOUNG ORCHARDS IN VALLE

Making Good Growth And Will Soon Be Profitable To Owners

Each year the Portales Valley and Roosevelt county become more noted for the raising of fruit. Perhaps the most noted orchard in the county is the Morgan orchard west of town, now owned by H. S. Moore. This orchard is a splendid example of what an orchard can be made

This is the first year that this orchard has yielded fruit to any extent but it is now at the age when a good yield may be ex pected every year. This year about 3000 bushels of fine apples have been picked and most of them have been marketed already. More delicious and perfectly formed apples than are raised on the Morgan orchard would be hard to find.

There are a number of other orchards in the Valley which will soon begin to bear fruit. Among these are Buchanan Bros. Smith and Anderson's and Dr. Bailey's. These and several other smaller orchards have made remarkable growths since they have been planted and could not look better than they do at the present time.

The showing that the orchards, have made the past season and the fruit that they have yielded is going to encourage very greatly the planting of more orchards. Roosevelt county can be made a fruit producing section and it will be a big thing in the Por tales Valley ere long.

### Deal on for Maxwell Grant.

Maxwell,-It is probable that the holdings of the Maxwell Irrigated Land Company will pass to Denver parties within a few days.

The closing of the sale will mean that work on the construction of the Hebron dam, which was washed out by the high water in 1914 will begin during the month of October and that the entire irrigation system will be finished in the shortest possible time. Santa Fé.-The land business trans acted by Uncle Sam during the past month of August was fairly good, according to the reports of the U.S. land office here. The area of lands taken up totaled 51,621.9 acres and the sum of \$3.174 was received. There were 249 entries in all, and of these 105 were homestead original under the act of June 11, 1906.

## State Tax Valuation.

Santa Fé. The total full valuation of property in New Mexico, as final ly fixed by the State Tax Commission at its recent meeting is \$305,067. 965.14. This represents a net in crease over the total full valuation returned by the assessors-\$283,276,934 of \$21,791,031.14. It is over \$32,000 000 more than the total full valuation of 1914. To obtain this increase the commission made general raises ag gregating \$18,011,810.66, and placed or the rolls omitted property to the value of \$4,324,199.68.


