

Unless Young Animals Are Kept Grow-

ing During First Year Final Development is Retarded.

CRy R. M. WASHBURN, Minnesota Ex The first year of a call's life is the most important with respect to its growth. Unless animals are kept growing during this period their final development will be much retarded, and the chances are they never will reach the scale which their inheritance would give them.

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Fast

On the best regulated dairy farms calves are born in the autumn and early winter, and they should receive skim milk in moderate quantities through much, or all, of the summer following birth. On farms having hand separators there is no difficulty in providing the sweet milk for calves. morning and evening; but farmers who patronize whole milk creameries or who still skim by hand should remember that after the first few weeks milk for calves should either be thoroughly sweet or fully sour, that the most dangerous condition is the halfsour stage. If milk is fed to calves when it is in this changing condition it is almost certain to cause indigestion. It should not be half sour, nor sour one day and sweet the next, but always one or the other.


Clean feeding palls must be used, otherwise the germs of fermentation and diarrhea will be brought to the infant cow from the slime of the dirty drinking dish, and with young calves it is important that the temperature at which the milk is fed be nearly that of the body. Older animals may receive milk of the temperature of the milk-holding tank.

While it is very important that heifers should have free access to pasture during the second summer, to develop strong bodies, the calf need not have pasture the first summer. In fact, for calves born after the first of the year, pasturing may be a disadvantage. Most young calves in this country are better of chewing tender hay in the quiet and half-dark stable than fighting flies, panting from the beat, and cropping tough grass in the pasture.

Its appearance is not a sign of disease. Frequently the ruptures are caused by the cow striking her ud-der against something.

Avoid Objectionable Traits. It is best to keep the cows from developing objectionable traits. This will sometimes happen, but the right kind of handling is usually the best







The department of agriculture's annual estimate of farm cattle in the country January 1, shows 21. 988,000 milk cows, an increase of 3.46 per cent over 1915, 39,453,-000 other cattle, an increase of 6.4 per cent; 49,162,000 sheep a decrease of 1.68 per cent, and 68,-047,000 swine, an increase of 5.3 per cent.

Horses numbered 21,166,000, a decrease of one-tenth of one per cent; and mules numbered 4,565,-000, an increase of 1.9 per cent.

The total value of the farm animals was placed at \$6,002,784,000 an increase of \$33,531,000 or sixtenths of one per cent over their value on January 1, 1915.



FEED CHARCOAL EVERY WEEK

Always Advisable to Feed as Early is Morning as Convenient-Shake Up the Litter.

Once a week, or oftener, it may be well to add to the hen's ration a supply of granulated charcoal. In the winter it is always advisable to feed as early in the morning as convenient, and give the evening meal about an hour before dark.

Shake up the litter with a fork, so that the grain will work down into it, which will compel the fowls to hunt for their rations.

Breed for Winter Eggs. The choice of a breed for the production of winter eggs is governed largely by the peculiar requirem of the market in which the eggs are to be sold, and also by the demand for table poultry, which is in many cases an important side line.
