The demand for better stock has grown very fast the last few seasons as the growers are learning that more money is being made from better grade of goods. If the voters of Roosevelt county are ready for a change in the incumbency of the office of Probate Judge, I respectfully ask each of them to give my qualifications and fitness for the office a fair impartial, and unprejudiced consideration before casting his ballot at the Democratic primary. Administration Army Bill.

Washington, March 4 - The senate army bill was introduced today by Chairman Chamberlain of the military committee. It proposes the most thorough measures of military preparedness ever presented to congress in peace times, and is the first of the national defense bills urged by President Wilson to be completed and introduced.

The measures proposed to increase the peace strength of the regular army to 178,000 men of all arms, to federalize the national guard with a peace strength of 217,000 men, to create a federal volunteer army comparable to the continental army proposed by former Secretary Garrison of the war department to provide adequate reserve systems of the regulars and guardsmen under short term enlistments with the colors, to create a far spreading reserve of engineers, doctors, mechanics and all other civilian supporters of the fighting troops and to provide an officers' reserve corps with definite obligations to the government.

Under the senate plan, federalization of the national guard is proposed under military pay bill and the authority of the national government over the local militia times of peace or war widely extended to secure adequate training and discipline.

It is the most comprehensive measure in the way of preparedness ever presented to either house of congress. Senator Chamberlain said: "The essential features comprise a sufficient increase of the regular army to enable the mobilized force to be organized in divisions and brigades and to provide a fully equipped and equipped new battalions. The mobilized force will comprise six hundred battalions, organized into several divisions, twenty five regiments of infantry, organized into two divisions, and the remaining regiments attached to military divisions, twenty one regiments of field artillery, and seven regiments of engineers. This will give proper provision for Panama, Hawaii, and the Philippines and provide four infantry and two cavalry divisions within the United States."

In addition to the organization of the regular army, Senator Chamberlain continued, provision is made for the organization of volunteer forces in each congressional district. Necessary appropriations for the national guard and other features mentioned in this bill have not yet been included. The volunteer force authorized will be strictly federal force and will not be under the control of governors in any way.

Provision is made for an officer reserve corps and for a reserve of training corps intended to embrace students at military and other institutions giving military instruction.

A strict enlistment is provided to insure most of the regular army to enter the service, and a registration \$24 per annum will be made to insure their continuity and war department authority.

Summer camps of instruction will be provided for those who do not find it convenient to attend themselves to any of the services authorized permanently.
